4. Green Wedge Management Plan review process

Joseph Emmanuel presented an overview of the GWMP review process. The project is still very much in the planning phase. Council has placed a request for quote seeking a suitable consultant to assist in the community engagement piece. This will be conducted in two stages:

Stage 1 is a broad scan of the community with a focus on co-designing an engagement process and

Stage 2 will be a deliberative process (citizen's jury) to make recommendations to Council.

It was unanimously agreed that the questions tabled covered the range of concerns expressed by members of the committee and would be presented to Geoff Lawson with minor changes. Questions from ESAC to Geoff Lawler regarding the review of the Nillumbik Green Wedge Management Plan (NGWMP)

Question 1: What are the Terms of reference for the forthcoming review – what will be measured and how?

Question 2: What is the status of the review of the NGWMP by Glossop Town Planning completed two years ago¹ and to what extent will it be included within the scope of the new exiew of the NGWMP?

Question 3: What was the relationship between Council and the State Government in the decision to include the Shire in the Green Wedge Management Plan, and is it still the intention of the GWMP to include it?

Question 4: What communications and engagement processes will support the forthcoming Review of the NGWMP and to what extent will it address the following issues:

- a) How will the proposed 'Citizens' Jury' be constituted and what role will it play?
- b) How will the following groups inform the Review with respect to the strategies, action and priorities for privately owned land within the GW:
 - GW landowners and residents?
 - Other stakeholders?
 - 3. Township landowners and residents

Question 5: Is it envisaged that the Review include consideration of the Melbourne Water land release in Christmas Hills, and, if so, will the communication and engagement plan for the review include consideration of this release?

Question 6: Given the deep divisions that appeared within the GW community regarding proposed amendments to the NGWMP in 2016, how is the review going to ensure that GW landowner and resident values, views and needs are appropriately collected, acknowledged and represented in the review so that proposed changes promote cohesion, not division, across the green wedge?

Question 7: How is the Council going to ensure that the community involved in the review of the NGWMP are aware of the requirements of the State Planning Policy Framework (SPPF), e.g. Plan Melbourne 2017-2050 which all planning authorities must consider?

Question 8: How is the Council going to ensure that the community involved in the review of the GWMP is aware of the Local Planning Policy Framework (LPPF) and, in particular, the Municipal Strategic Statement (MSS), which provides the detailed vision for all future land use and development decisions in the Shire of Nillumbik?

Question 9: How is the Council going to ensure that the review stays focused on the existing NGWMP and addresses the questions about whether the vision, role and purpose, strategies and articulated strategic directions are still appropriate and, if not, why not?

Question 10: How can ESAC help the Review?
