



Celebrating our citizens of the year

Recognising and rewarding some of our most outstanding citizens with the 2019 Nillumbik Australia Day Awards.

On a beautiful sunny day in January, the community was welcomed to our Australia Day Awards by the Diamond Valley Brass Band playing a range of iconic tunes and classic Aussie anthems. The Eltham Community and Reception Centre was packed with families, friends and well wishers as we acknowledged some of the community members who help make Nillumbik such a great place to live.

The 2019 Nillumbik Citizen of the Year is Eltham's Leon Higgins. Leon received the award for displaying incredible leadership skills and his unwavering dedication to various community organisations.

Some of these include the Eltham Men's Shed; Eltham Older Men, New Ideas (OM:NI); Hurstbridge OM:NI; Council on the Ageing (COTA) Victoria; the Judge Book Residents' Association of the Eltham Retirement Centre (now SVCS Eltham); Montmorency/Eltham RSL, and the Rotary Club of Eltham. He also spent a number of years as a senior referee with Eltham Wildcats Basketball.

Leon has volunteered his time to assist elderly and disabled residents at the Judge Book nursing home in Eltham, in between being the primary fundraiser for Eltham Men's Shed, where he is vice-president and responsible for public relations. He was

also instrumental in helping to establish the Hurstbridge OM:NI in the wake of the Black Saturday bushfires.

Leon's nomination was supported by representatives from a range of community groups and organisations – a testament to his efforts for the Nillumbik community.

Wattle Glen resident Glen Ferrarotto is Nillumbik's Volunteer of the Year. After serving in the army for 11 years and twice being deployed to Afghanistan with Special Operations, Glen now focuses on representing veterans of Nillumbik and Australia at community events, and educating young people about veterans' experiences. He has been senior vicepresident of the Montmorency/Eltham RSL since 2017.

After his career in the army finished, Glen founded Ironside Recruitment – Australia's leading recruitment agency for veterans and ex-service personnel. He has previously been awarded Australia's Most Outstanding Contributor to Veteran Employment.

Glen is a passionate speaker who donates his time to helping others. He has spoken at Remembrance services and ANZAC Day events in Nillumbik, as well as schools and community gatherings.

Cameron Sibeijn of Diamond Creek has been named Young Citizen of the Year (aged 16-30). Cameron, 27, is the Captain of Yarrambat CFA, where he has been a member for 13 years. Nominated by CFA 3rd Lieutenant Mark Gravell, who said Cameron is "an outstanding example of today's youth," Cameron has demonstrated leadership skills within the brigade, from training new members to educating the community about fire safety. He has received a 10-year CFA service medal and National Emergency Medal for his efforts during the 2009 Black Saturday fires.

Regarded among his colleagues for helping people for no reward and being the first to put his hand up to assist when needed, Cameron has established himself as a respected member of the CFA.

Our Senior Citizen of the Year for 2019 is 75-year-old Barry Backman of Mernda. Barry was nominated for his commitment to the Diamond Creek Men's Shed over the past eight years and the Diamond Valley Lions Club for more than 30 years. Barry was instrumental in the formation of the Men's Shed in Diamond Creek in 2011.

A well-known and respected member of the community, Barry was responsible

for organising the Diamond Creek Twilight Market for 22 years; a role he only relinquished in 2018. As membership secretary for the Diamond Creek Men's Shed, Barry's efforts saw member numbers arow to 90. His role within the Diamond Valley Lions Club has encompassed events such as Clean Up Australia Day, Arbour Day, ANZAC Day, selling Lions Club Christmas cakes, coordinating catering and lunches, Bunnings sausage sizzles, clean-ups of the Diamond Creek cemetery, fundraising, publicity and membership promotion, working bees and more.

Now residing at Mernda Retirement Village, Barry is an active member of the men's consultative group, organising social events and outings for residents. Described as thoughtful, patient, inclusive and with "a wicked sense of humour" by nominators from the Diamond Creek Men's Shed, Barry's commitment to the community has had an immeasurable impact over many years.

The 2019 Community Group of the Year is the Diamond Creek Opportunity Shop. Run by a team of committed volunteers, all proceeds from sales go towards the purchase of equipment for Austin Health sites. The team is always happy to go the extra mile and assist customers in finding that special something in the shop. Since it opened in 1981, the shop has raised approximately \$3 million for Austin Health sites, funding a broad range of medical equipment that has helped countless patients.

Welcoming our newest citizens

Following the award presentation, the crowd warmly welcomed our 43 newest Australian citizens, before everyone joined in heartfelt renditions of the national anthem and I Am Australian.

Prior to the citizenship ceremony, guest speaker Gillian Essex of Eltham delivered a thoughtprovoking and beautiful speech.

As president of Welcome to Eltham and an active member of the Jagajaga branch of Grandmothers Against Detention of Refugee Children, Gillian is a wonderful reflection of how compassionate and welcoming our community can be. She has worked closely and developed relationships with a number of refugees and asylum seekers, and is a passionate advocate for those without a voice.

Gillian was once principal of Strathewen Primary School, has been a creative writing tutor for U3A, and is a keen bushwalker.

Highly regarded as a poet, writer, and singer-songwriter, Gillian also reflects the passion for the arts and creativity that is so entwined in Nillumbik's identity.



It's hard to believe that February marked 10 years since Victorians experienced the worst recorded bushfires in our history. We reflect and remember those who died in the bushfires, learn about how the fires changed the lives of many, and how our resilient communities have rebuilt.

A number of local events were held in commemoration, including a visit by Victorian Governor the Honourable Linda Dessau AC to some of the worst affected sites in our Shire.

As we move into autumn in what has already been a busy year, there is much to look forward to. As a Council, we face a number of decisions of great significance in shaping our Shire's future.


This year, Council will hold four of its public meetings at various locations across the Shire as part of our efforts to encourage public participation.

Green light for Hurstbridge recreational precinct

Council has officially approved an ambitious plan to turn a large open area in Hurstbridge into a valuable recreational precinct.

This means rezoning of the area can go ahead after the Council unanimously adopted the final precinct plan to transform the old Hurstbridge high school site into a valuable open space precinct.

Mayor Karen Egan said after extensive consultation, Council approved plans for the site which include a new natural amphitheatre, expanding the stadium, and the courts and creating a contemplative space.

The top three priorities identified through consultation were expanding the stadium improved use of the East Oval and optional outdoor courts.

"This plan reflects what the community wants - now we need to apply for funding to make it happen."

It also will serve as the gateway to the start of the Diamond Creek Trail, which when completed is set to attract 360 000 visitors visitors annually.

Green Wedge Management Plan

Council's review of its Green Wedge Management Plan is set to move into its next phase with the imminent release of a draft plan.

The draft plan will draw on Council's response to the Community Panel's recommendations as well as on community feedback from the earlier phases of consultation and input from various experts.

In addition, Council has engaged the services of former Emergency Management Commissioner Craig Lapsley in order to assist it develop a comprehensive Bushfire Mitigation Strategy. This work will also help inform the updated Green Wedge Management Plan.

With Council's endorsement, the draft plan will be put out for community consultation with this engagement phase expected to last six weeks.

Just 12 months after the original playground was tragically destroyed by fire, Mayor Karen Egan cut the ribbon at the new adventure playground, letting an eager crowd of kids run in and explore.

Council and the community worked tirelessly together to rebuild this amazing new playground, which is attracting families from all over the region. There are areas in the playground for younger children like a small slide and sandpit, while older kids have higher climbing walls, a rope ladder and bigger slides.

We worked closely with the designers to ensure the playground is accessible, by widening doorways, adding ramps and connecting all the play spaces with paths. Before the official opening, a group of children from Diamond Valley Special Developmental School visited to plant trees and play. It was wonderful to see how inclusive the playground is.

Thanks go to the State Government and the Eltham and District Branch of the Bendigo Community Bank who supported the rebuild. We would like to acknowledge local organisations such as Bunnings of Eltham, The Eltham Men's Shed and the Diamond Valley Baptist Church who donated time, energy and equipment to the project. Taking democracy on the road in 2019

As part of its 2019 schedule Council is holding four of its meetings at venues other than the council chambers.

The first of these was held in St Andrews on 26 February. Other out-of-chambers meetings will be held in Hurstbridge. Eltham and Diamond Creek this year.

Mayor Karen Egan said the meeting schedule was part of an overall aim to encourage community engagement with Council's decision-making process.

"We know how passionate Nillumbik residents are about the issues that affect them and the broader community," Cr Egan said.

"Council is committed to ensuring that they are sufficiently engaged with the process through which we as their elected representatives make key decisions.

"As a councillor who represents a ward which includes our Shire's northernmost reaches, I'm very aware of the importance of ensuring that the whole community is engaged and included as we make our decisions.

"The aim in holding these meetings is to make it easier for people to attend by bringing it closer to home, quite literally.

"It will enable a cross section of our community, whether it be those who are busy with family and work commitments or those for whom access and mobility may be an issue, to better engage with our local democratic process.'

Wastewater management

The 2019-2021 Nillumbik Domestic Wastewater Management Plan (DWMP) is currently in development.

The Plan's primary purpose is to prevent environmental pollution from on-site wastewater treatment systems (septics) at the source, and where this is not possible, wastewater issues that are important to minimise the potential impacts on human health and the environment.

Council is responsible for developing and implementing the Nillumbik DWMP. As part of this process we are consulting and engaging with the community and Yarra Valley Water to ensure that the plan is relevant, integrated and achievable.

In early December 2018, we conducted a series of drop-in information sessions

across the Shire, to open a conversation with community members about domestic wastewater management and the to them. We made note of the issues raised during conversations and surveys completed at these sessions, which have helped to inform the draft Plan.

The draft Plan will be open for public comment in March 2019 and we are seeking your feedback. You will be able to view the draft and provide your comments at our Participate Nillumbik site.

Meeting our children's growing needs

All Victorian councils are reviewing the way we do things to ensure that early years buildings and services continue to meet the changing needs of families and children. along with the Government's future direction for childhood education and care.

It's now more common than ever for both parents to have jobs. This means parents need education and care services that fit in with their work demands.

Secondly, more than half the buildings where these services are provided in Nillumbik, are over 50 years old. They struggle to meet the needs of current day education and care programs.

Recently, in recognition of the importance of Early Years education and care, and the changing needs of families, the State Government committed to fund 3-year-old kindergarten.

This funding will be implemented over the next 10 years. This may change what services are available and how families use them. Nillumbik needs to plan for this.

What's our plan? Well, last December we invited representatives from Early Years services across the Shire to form a reference group, which meets this March to brainstorm the challenges and give feedback later this year to help us develop a new Early Years Infrastructure Plan.

This plan aims to change the way we deliver early years services to ensure our children have the best possible facilities, care and education into the future.





Time to register your pets

Pet registration renewals are due on 10 April 2019. If you currently have a registered pet, you should receive a renewal notice in the mail soon.

Registration fees go toward the provision of numerous animal management services and programs throughout the Shire, including the local pound service, dog parks, and a free boarding service for pets of families experiencing family violence.

Registration fees are also used to help us educate the community about responsible pet ownership. Ensuring your pet is microchipped and registered increases the chances of being reunited if it goes missing. The Community Safety team strives to reunite owners with their lost pet within 24 hours if the pet is both microchipped and registered.

Plenty of us are pet owners: there are currently 3,530 cats and 12,144 dogs registered within the Shire. In 2018 we cared for 189 Nillumbik registered dogs at the pound. More than 94 per cent of these dogs were either returned to their owners or rehomed through our partnership with the Save a Dog Scheme.

Remember that we can assist if you want to know more about responsible pet ownership. If you have a question, feel free to chat to one of our friendly Community Safety officers when you see them. Potential development of 895 and 903-907 Main Road, Eltham

Work continues on the next phase of an urban renewal planning process aimed at revitalising the area which takes in 895 and 903-907 Main Road Eltham.

These Council-owned sites consist of the former Eltham Shire offices - vacant since 1996 - and the Eltham War Memorial buildings complex.

Having received strong interest from the private sector through the Expression of Interest phase, Council invited shortlisted proponents to participate in the Request for Proposal (RFP) phase with a submission received in December and which is now being assessed by a Council appointed panel of experts. The panel will assess the submission against

the criteria reflecting Council's vision and principles for the area.

Depending on Council consideration of the submission's feasibility, it will be subject to an extensive process of broader community engagement across the entire development proposal to inform future Council decisions on the project.

Brand new playground – and tram

A state-of-the-art playground and a historic tram will be the centre pieces of a new iconic precinct for Diamond Creek.

Construction of the playground is set to start mid-vear and will complete the Diamond Creek Regional Park, which is home to a number of parks, the Marngrook and Coventry ovals, an outdoor pool and recreational open space.

Mayor Karen Egan said Council was successful in obtaining State Government funding of \$2.5 million to build the playground after highlighting both its local and regional patronage potential and its proximity to the Diamond Creek Trail.

"This will complete the regional park as a family destination and be the jewel in the crown for Diamond Creek," Cr Egan said.

The project will include a car park, playground equipment, picnic areas and educational apps that support augmented A solar system, air conditioner, plumbing reality discovery learning experiences.

The tram will be the focal point of the playground area. The decommissioned historic Melbourne tram was secured

by community groups after the State Government announced it had around 127 trams to rehome.

A joint submission by Diamond Creek CFA member Joshua Allen, Diamond Creek Rotary Club's Kerry Jones and Diamond Creek Men's Shed stalwart assisted by Council - was the best of 1500 applications. As a result. the trio got the pick of the trams. They formed the Diamond Creek Tram Project and extended the committee to eight members.

The tram is going to be refurbished into a community-run coffee shop, with a latte opportunity for different local groups to run it throughout the year. All profits will be donated back to those community groups.

and building supplies have been donated for the tram, but the group is looking to get more community involvement in setting up the project, keep an eye on our Facebook to get involved.

International Women's Day

Held around the world on 8 March. International Women's Day (IWD) seeks to drive gender equality and celebrate women in our community. Nillumbik will be celebrating this year with a dinner at Eltham Community and Reception Centre on Thursday 7 March.

The 2019 theme is #BalanceForBetter; a topic our guest speakers – Executive Director of Victorian Women's Trust Mary Crooks AO and author Bev Brock OAM will address.

There will also be musical performances by local women artists, and a women in business marketplace.

The celebrations are part of our commitment to the Nillumbik Gender Equity Policy, which seeks to challenge gender stereotypes, promote women's independence and decision making, strengthen positive, equal and respectful relationships, and challenge the condoning of violence against women.

New playground a hit with youngsters

Kids are loving the newly opened \$1.2 million Civic Drive Playground

The project transformed two largely unused grassy areas near the Civic Offices on Civic Drive, Greensborough into a state-of-the-art playground.

It includes tower play and boulder climbing units, accessible swing, ropes and a totem pole course, flying fox, spinner, inclusive sand play and musical play elements.

A giant mosaic snake has been created with ceramic tiles hand-painted by local school children. Another attraction is the half basketball/netball court with a hoop which can be used as a stage, with tiered grassed seating creating an amphitheatre.

There will be picnic tables and shady trees, and space to kick the ball around and have fun.

Government lobbying paying off

Council is continuing to lobby both levels of governments to fund much needed improvements to roads, sporting pavilions and community upgrades.

The extension of the Diamond Creek Trail from Diamond Creek to Hurstbridge is one of the main priorities, along with a regional art gallery and extending mobile phone coverage to minimise black spots.

Already the Federal Government has committed \$5 million to congestion busting at Main Road and Fitzsimons Lane, Eltham. Council will also receive \$8 million from the State Government toward the next stage of the Diamond Valley Sports and Fitness Centre (DVSFC) redevelopment. The funding will enable the construction of three additional indoor multi-sports courts, change room and office upgrades, along with other improvements.

Mayor Karen Egan said she looked forward to meeting all candidates for the upcoming Federal election to advocate for better community outcomes.

The future of housing in Nillumbik

Council's vision is for Nillumbik to be Australia's most liveable Shire. A key component to achieving this is to ensure the availability of quality housing, suited to community needs.

The characteristics that make Nillumbik such a great place to live, also present some of the major challenges in ensuring the ideal mix of housing.

To identify and meet these needs Council is developing a comprehensive Housing Strategy to address the combination of characteristics and issues faced by the Shire. These include:

- An ageing population (it is forecast that by 2036 one third of the Shire's residents will be 55 and older):
- 91 per cent of the Shire is zoned Green Wedge, which restricts the options for housing locations under State Government policy (i.e. preference for housing in urban areas);
- Affordability (Nillumbik's median house valuation is significantly higher than the statewide median).
- Detached dwellings comprising a large proportion of housing in the Shire with 90 per cent of these comprising three or more bedrooms.

In light of these challenges, council's Housing Strategy will be a critical tool to direct its actions to house Nillumbik's population to 2036.

The Housing Strategy will impact a number of other far-reaching Council initiatives including the extensive work underway on Positive Ageing in the Shire.

Not surprisingly, many of our long-time residents want to remain in their community as they grow older. However, to do so could mean finding more accessible housing requiring less upkeep. At the other end of the spectrum, the lack of housing diversity and affordability also means it is difficult for younger people to remain or be attracted to the Shire.

The combined challenges of an ageing population, the need for more affordable (including rental) housing and maintaining the neighbourhood character that makes the various parts of the Shire so beloved by the community, will be addressed in the Housing Strategy.

A century of caring

Marjorie Taylor had a hundred good reasons to smile on her birthday.

The Eltham great-grandmother turned 100 on Thursday 10 January and received congratulations from the Queen, as well as a visit from Nillumbik Mayor Karen Egan who brought with her a framed letter of congratulations, a bunch of flowers and good wishes from all of the councillors.

Cr Egan said Nillumbik had one of the highest life expectancy rates in Victoria and she expected many more residents to reach the three digit milestone.

"Huge congratulations to Mrs Taylor and her family. She's a shining example of ageing positively," Cr Egan said.

Marjorie was born in Footscray on 10 January 1919. She qualified as a hairdresser and ran her own salon in the city during WWII before she married Benjamin Taylor, a former Shire Councillor, and moved to Eltham.

The mother of four has always lived up to her motto "there's no such thing as being bored."

Over the years Marjorie has volunteered at St Margaret's Anglican Church in Eltham, Anglicare, Link, Foodshare and a host of other community groups.

Meanwhile residents over the age of 55 are being reminded to keep an eye out for their local Positive Ageing Advisory Committee member who will be representing them to help them live healthy active lives.

Twenty committee members have been appointed to support Council in reviewing the 2013-2018 Positive Ageing Plan and provide Council with feedback to help form the new 2019 - 2022 action plan, due to be released early this year.

The committee is a diverse group from townships across the Shire and represents a wide variety of ages, backgrounds and interests.

Help reduce impact of feral animals

Feral deer are proving a major problem in both rural and urban areas of the Shire – they've even been spotted walking down Eltham's Main Street.

Deer, along with rabbits and foxes, degrade natural areas, waterways, farmland and suburban gardens, and threaten the survival of the Shire's most vulnerable species.

To help better understand the problem, we are calling on landowners and the community to report all feral deer sightings on a central website:

DeerScan.org.au

An important step in tackling the problem is our new Sugarloaf Link project. Register to find out more about how we hope to reduce the impact of feral deer (and foxes and weeds) on the amazing biodiversity and habitat corridor of the Christmas Hills and Bend of Islands area, and to stop deer from spreading further south.

When it comes to feral rabbit and fox control, late summer to early autumn is a crucial time for action when population numbers are lowest. We are currently undertaking rabbit control in our bushland reserves, as well as targeted fox control to help protect the vulnerable Brush-tailed Phascogale.

None of these animals respect boundaries, so we all need to work together to tackle the problem. Coordinate with your neighbours and local Landcare group and visit our website for some simple tips. This is important for both rural and urban areas.

Community Bank Stadium's new solar photovoltaic panels

Community Bank Stadium solar upgrades

Community Bank Stadium in Diamond Creek now has one of Victoria's largest solar battery systems, which will provide up to 75 per cent of the stadium's electricity.

The system includes solar photovoltaic rooftop panels, a rechargeable battery system and an electric vehicle charging station. As well as powering the stadium when the sun goes down, the battery system can provide up to eight hours of electricity in a power outage, including in an emergency and when functioning as a relief centre.

The State election result will see an \$8 million commitment towards the redevelopment of the Diamond Valley Sports and Fitness Centre (DVSFC), as identified in the masterplan approved by Council. In addition to Council funding and \$6.5 million from the Growing Suburbs Fund for priority works, this will be the second-largest infrastructure outlay in the Shire's history. The Civic Drive playground opened in time for Christmas. Council applied for a Growing Suburbs Fund allocation and jointly contributed to this \$1.285 million project. Thanks to Friends of Apollo Parkways (FoAP) for its 11-year advocacy effort to save community space for park and recreational use.

The State Government Activity Centre planning zone which our Council inherited, was creating poor development outcomes and a lack of appropriate controls.


I have made it a priority to both, protect and enhance, the Eltham Town Centre.

SERVICE DASHBOARD -

Council is committed to transparent reporting and accountability to the community.

The Nillumbik Annual Community Survey results from 2018 reinforced that residents rank core service delivery as important. The key service indicators on this dashboard provide a comparison between current and previous performance, and some results have been measured against the collective average of all Victorian Councils based on 2017-2018 data.

SERVICE IMPROVEMENT HIGHLIGHT

In 2017, Council provided residents with 3 separate green waste vouchers with their rates notice to use over the 2017-2018 financial year. Over the course of that financial year, Council received 499 requests to re-issue lost, misplaced or vouchers not received, leading to significant follow up for residents and staff.

Council has now introduced a QR (Quick Response) scannable code for the vouchers on the 2018-2019 rates notice. This means ratepayers who receive their notices via email do not need to print their vouchers, and the code can be scanned directly from a mobile phone when visiting Council's Recycling and Recovery Centre. This improvement has meant a reduction in requests to re-issue the vouchers which allows Council to reinvest the time into other service requests, providing a better customer experience.
