# Climate, capital works boost

More than \$14 million will be spent on capital works projects while Nillumbik's commitment to climate action will be strongly supported in the 2022-2023 Budget.

Under the Budget, endorsed by Council in May, the rates increase will be kept within the State Government-mandated rate cap of 1.75 per cent.

The domestic waste service charge will increase by 21.98 per cent. This is driven by the costs of rehabilitating the former landfill site at Kangaroo Ground – a statutory requirement of the Environment Protection Authority Victoria – as well as a significant increase in the disposal costs for recycling and general waste.

The Budget will deliver a \$14.25 million capital works program with projects including:

- Buildings renewal, including public toilets
- Kangaroo Ground former landfill rehabilitation
- Road and carpark renewal
- Proposed BMX facility in Diamond Creek
- Car park upgrades
- Sports infrastructure renewal.

Nillumbik Mayor Frances Eyre said it was a responsible Budget, funding many positive initiatives with no new borrowings.

"Importantly, it commits funding to our climate emergency response including the implementation of the Climate Action Plan," Cr Eyre said.

Deputy Mayor Ben Ramcharan said waste management was an expensive issue for all councils and Nillumbik had a responsibility to remediate the former Kangaroo Ground landfill, a key driver of the increase in the waste management charge.

"However, once that project is completed, I'm excited about the possible opportunities we could explore for this area." he said.

# Nillumbik takes action on climate change

Council has adopted a new Climate Action Plan, which includes a Declaration of a Climate Emergency.

The Climate Action Plan 2022-2032, adopted in April, will guide Council's response to the challenges posed by climate change over the next decade.

Collaboration with the community will be key to achieving the plan's key climate action aims.

The plan has three key goals:

- 1. Reduce Council's direct contribution to climate change.
- 2. Prepare for, respond and adapt to the risks and impacts of a changing climate on our community, environment, infrastructure and services.
- 3. Support our community to reduce their contributions to climate change and to adapt and be resilient to climate change risks and impacts.

The plan also sets targets of achieving net-zero emissions in Council operations by 2030 and net-zero community emissions by 2035.

It includes eight focus areas:

- Climate action leadership
- Having a climate resilient, adaptive and safe community

- The climate resilience of the natural environment
- Climate-responsive Council services, facilities and infrastructure
- Zero emissions energy use
- Sustainable transport
- Integrated water management
- Achieving a zero waste and circular economy.

Nillumbik Mayor Frances Eyre said the plan was a collective effort involving extensive consultation and collaboration with the community.

"It is the tangible result of Council and our community's shared commitment to taking meaningful and urgent climate action. This is a great community outcome, something about which I am extremely pleased," she said.

Deputy Mayor Ben Ramcharan said the Plan showed the seriousness with which Council and the community viewed this issue.

"The plan demonstrates our shared commitment to doing all we can to address the challenges presented by climate change," he said.

Council continues to roll out projects as part of the Victorian Government COVIDSafe Outdoor Activation Fund so our community can get out and support our local businesses safely.

Outdoor areas across the Shire have been transformed with improvements including street furniture and landscaping.

# Winners have the write stuff

Winners of the Nillumbik Prize for Contemporary Writing have been revealed.

Authors, poets, their friends and families gathered at the Diamond Valley Library on 28 May for the announcement of the prestigious prize.

The prize is awarded every two years and builds on the Shire's strong tradition of supporting contemporary Australian writing.

This year, there were almost 500 entries from across the country for both the traditional Fiction/Alan Marshall Short Story Award category and the rotating category - which this year is Poetry - in the Local, Youth and Open sections.

Entries ranged from Haiku to genre-bending science fiction, intimate reflections on human relationships, as well as social and environmentally inspired themes all splendidly narrated in both poetic and fictional forms.

The works were judged by Tim Richards and Bec Kavanah for the Alan Marshall Short Story Prize and Cassandra Atherton and Paul Hetherington for the Poetry Prize.

1. Radishes

The curious child squatted beside the garden, brushed aside dirt and leaves to reveal ruby protrusions, miniature globes marked with white atmospheric swirls. Tugging one loose, wiping it clean she sampled then spat the peppery flesh onto the ground - but the crunch lingered in tooth and jaw; a signifier of disobedience for this was her father's patch, not to be touched.

A hefty yield, a fine growing season taught the cows to assemble at the fence to await their meal of ponytailed stalks and heads macheted into edible pieces, barging each other for better offerings tossed from the full tractor trailer. A dull vegetable best ignored, so thought the child until, years later, it became an instant favourite when cooked into a simple winter's stew.

3. Chokos

Furry, pendulous oddities their vines offered the most interest: invasive, squirrely tendrils with singular purpose curled around anything sturdy and fixed; a kind of ambition that belonged in science fiction. They also provided a lesson on relationships: a full pail left by a door meant a settled debt, and such abundance meant so much more than blue-ribboned show pride.

# BMX bike park proposal jumps to next stage

Wheels in motion for concept plans and feasibility study.

So far, two rounds of community consultation have been undertaken on the Diamond Creek proposal including location and design, resulting in more than 400 submissions.

Specialist BMX consultancy 'The Trail Collective' has been engaged to develop concepts for the park. Our teams are now reviewing the community feedback and will prepare reports for Council on concept plans and location feasibility.

Ellis Ward Councillor Peter Perkins said the feedback would really help inform what would go ahead.

"I'm keen to see stuff on the ground happen as soon as possible. We've got the money allocated, we need to get on with it," he said.

Ellis Ward Councillor Natalie Duffy thanked the community for their extensive feedback.

"There's two sides to this, there's the protecting our biodiversity and our environment, and there's also creating a place of fun, and that's what we are trying to achieve with this project," she said.

# Missing link now complete

Thousands of locals and visitors alike have been enjoying the extension of the Diamond Creek Trail.

The final stage of the extension of the trail from Wattle Glen to Hurstbridge opened in March.

The 3.2km section is a shared path for pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders and runs from Wilson Reserve to the Graysharps Road Open Space Precinct. It continues on from the first stage of the project which starts at Luscombe Drive in Diamond Creek.

It's now possible to travel along the trail from Hurstbridge to Eltham, then join the Main Yarra Trail all the way into the CBD.

Cr Eyre said the completion of the trail extension from Diamond Creek to Hurstbridge was exciting news for the community.

"This is something our community and Council championed for over many years and it's wonderful to see the dream finally become a reality." Cr Evre said.

"I would like to thank the Victorian Government and our local MPs Danielle Green and Vicki Ward for their tireless advocacy and support, which has been critical in making this project happen.

"This has been one of the biggest capital works projects we've undertaken in the Shire and it's been a fantastic collaborative effort between the Victorian Government, Council

# New home for Men's Shed

A funding boost will see the Hurstbridge Men's Shed get a permanent home of its own.

The Victorian Government and Council will jointly fund the construction of a new workshop and meeting place at 4 Hurstbridge-Arthurs Creek Road, near Araluen, Allwood House and the Hurstbridge Tennis Courts.

Council has received a \$364,000 grant through the Victorian Government's Growing Suburbs Fund to complete the project. Council will also contribute \$300,000. Preliminary designs have been completed and construction is expected to start in early 2023.

Mayor Frances Eyre said the Men's Shed, which was first established in 2005 and meets in a small storage room in the Hurstbridge Community Hub, was a vital part of the community.

"Not only does the group provide benefits to the members themselves including friendship, social connection and support, but to the wider community through their local projects and initiatives,"Cr Eyre said.

### Sports lighting

Sports clubs will soon be able to play and train for longer with new lighting at five sports grounds.

So far the upgrades have been completed at the Eltham Lower Park front oval and Bridge Street Reserve in Eltham.

Fittings are being finalised at the Diamond Creek Netball Courts while power connection works being undertaken at Diamond Hills Reserve and Hurstbridge High Oval.

The upgrades have been funded with \$1.48 million from Sport and Recreation Victoria and \$148,000 from Council.



### Hurstbridge Multi-Use Facility

Kicking goals for sport - this \$1.7 million redevelopment was completed in February.

The project involved the extension and renovation of the pavilion to include four change rooms, female-friendly amenities, new umpires' change rooms, public amenities and increased social space.

The project was funded with \$705,000 from the Victorian Government's Growing Suburbs Fund, \$150,000 from Sport and Recreation Victoria and \$849,000 from Council.



### **Andrew Pocket Park**

In a first for Nillumbik, the new Andrew Pocket Park will have active ageing exercise equipment for older adults.

Work has started on the park in Diamond Street. Eltham, which will also include public toilets, two 3x3 basketball courts, a netball ring, bike racks and repair station for users of the Diamond Creek Trail. drinking fountain, shelter and seating.

The park has been funded with \$1.3 million from the Victorian Government's Suburban Parks Program and \$61,000 from Council.



### Diamond Valley Sports and **Fitness Centre**

Rest your feet - new retractable seating for 512 people valued at \$380,000 has now been installed at the new centre courts, which opened in February following a \$16.5 million extension and refurbishment.

The new-look centre features four new sports courts, new reception and café area, new and refurbished change rooms and toilets and expanded gym.

Outside, the centre features a 40m mural by Indigenous artist Fiona Clarke.

# More big wins for sport

Funding boost for new projects as facilities officially open.

Two outside courts at the Diamond Creek netball facility will go under cover following Victorian Premier Daniel Andrews' announcement of \$1 million in funding for the project.

Mr Andrews visited Diamond Creek in May to make the announcement with Minister for Community Sport Ros Spence, Eltham MP Vicki Ward and Yan Yean MP Danielle Green.

The all-weather covers are the icing on the cake for the precinct which features eight newly resurfaced courts and a new pavilion, which were officially opened in March. Meanwhile, the three new multi-use courts

in Andrew Park, Eltham, were officially opened in May.

Deputy Mayor Ben Ramcharan, Edendale Ward Councillor Natalie Duffy and Wingrove Ward Councillor Geoff Paine joined Eltham MP Vicki Ward for the ribbon cutting ceremony, held during the Eltham Tennis Club's open day.

The courts, funded with \$1.4 million from the Victorian Government's Growing Suburbs Fund, are line marked for tennis, including the junior HotShots program, and futsal. The public can hire the courts for a game via the club's website.

The park's been funded with \$275,000 from the Victorian Government's Suburban Parks Program and \$450,000 from Council.



### Research public toilets

We've been busting to tell you – the new public toilets have been completed next to the shops on the corner of Main and Research-Warrandyte roads.

The toilets are fully accessible and gender neutral with an access ramp for people with disability. The \$255,000 project has been complemented with landscaping and new pathways.

We're now investigating opportunities to incorporate local art into the completed project.



### Plenty Solar Farm

Construction of a 1.5MW solar farm planned for the former landfill site in Yan Yean Road is anticipated to start late 2022/early 2023.

Public notification of our intent to enter a lease with LMS Energy for part of the land on the site to operate and maintain a solar farm has been released.

### **Bible Street**

Council has awarded the tender for traffic improvements in Bible Street, Eltham, to MJ Construction Group, in the first phase of the implementation of the \$5 million Eltham Urban Congestion Fund Project.

The works will include the installation of raised intersection treatments and pedestrian crossings, kerb works, footpaths, line marking and signage along the street as well as changes to parking.

The Department of Transport has approved a speed limit drop in Bible Street from 50km/h to 40km/h between Cecil and Taylor streets.



# Roll up to our new skate park

Do you like to skate, ride or scoot? Whichever way you roll, the expanded Eltham Skate Park is for you.

The park, on the corner of Bridge and Susan streets, has reopened following a revamp funded with \$512,000 from Council and \$300,000 from the Victorian Government through a Parks Revitalisation grant.

It has doubled in size and includes a combination of features for rider styles of all ages and abilities. There is also a shelter, seating and drinking fountain.

# Solar system cutting emissions

More than 170 tonnes in greenhouse gas emissions have been saved over the past year since the installation of a major new solar system at the Eltham Leisure Centre.

In May, Mayor Frances Eyre and Cr Natalie Duffy joined Eltham MP Vicki Ward and Yan Yean MP Danielle Green for the official launch of the new system, which includes four electric vehicle charging stations.

The \$540,000 project was jointly funded by Council and the Victorian Government's Growing Suburbs Fund.

Cr Eyre said that since the solar system was installed last May, 174,000kg in greenhouse gas emissions have been saved.

"That's equivalent to planting 3349 trees or taking 50 cars off the road," she said.

"And more than 1000 cars have been charged at the EV stations, saving more than 2600kg in greenhouse gas emissions."

The rooftop solar system is one of the largest in Nillumbik. It comprises 267 kilowatts of rooftop solar panels, which have generated 290 megawatt hours since commissioning last June, directly supplying 16.5 per cent of all electrical needs for the building.

Two battery backup systems ensure continuous power to the toilets and change rooms, and systems in reception, allowing the centre to remain operational even during times of power outages.

# Preschool set to sparkle

The Diamond Hills Preschool will undergo a \$3.69 million redevelopment, boosting the number of funded preschool places for local children.

The 35-year-old preschool will be rebuilt, providing a much-needed second classroom and other facilities.

Mayor Frances Eyre said the new preschool would ensure access to funded programs for more local families.

"Many families would have fond memories of Diamond Hills Preschool. However, with only one classroom,

there is not enough space to cater for modern preschool programs including the introduction of 15 hours of funded three-year-old kinder without affecting total enrolments," Cr Eyre said.

"This new building will allow for both three and four-year-old kinder programs, boosting enrolments from 80 to 120."

The project is funded with \$2.9 million from the Victorian Government's Growing Suburbs Fund, \$700,000 from Council and \$75,000 from the preschool.

# Court restored to former glory

The historic Eltham Courthouse has been officially reopened following a major \$385,000 restoration.

Mayor Frances Eyre opened the former courthouse, which is Nillumbik's oldest public building, at celebrations in March along with Cr Geoff Paine and Cr Natalie Duffy.

The building, part of the Eltham Justice Precinct in Main Road, is home to the Eltham District Historical Society and Eltham U3A, whose members were also in attendance.

The works involved meticulous restoration inside and out.

The original furniture has been refurbished and the courthouse returned to how it would have looked when it first opened in 1860 following the influx of people to the area in search of gold.

The building operated as a courthouse until the 1980s.

# Broken items get a new lease on life at Repair Cafe

New project saves hundreds of items from going to landfill.

The Nillumbik Repair Cafe is held on the second Saturday of the month at the Hurstbridge Community Hub.

It's a labour of love for locals Jules Jay from SHIFT and Rosie Morgan, who met last year while taking part in Council's Placeshapers and Nillumbik Women's Community Leadership and Connections programs.

They have brought together a dedicated group of volunteer 'fixers' including members of the Hurstbridge Men's Shed and Boomerang Bags.

People can bring along their broken items
– ranging from electronics, bikes, clothes,
tools, computer, toys, furniture and mowers
– to see if they can be repaired.

"We weren't sure if it would be popular but it's been hugely successful," Jules says. "We can fix almost anything – or at least have a crack at it. We just want to get the word out that you don't have to throw things out. Our fixers or repairers are all volunteers who have the skills from a trade or they are just really handy people."

Jules, who also runs the Edible Hub community garden at the Hurstbridge Hub, is passionate about sustainability.

"Both Rosie and I have a real desire to keep things out of landfill and help people learn some simple skills that have been lost," she says. "There are social economic benefits, too – not everyone can afford to buy new when something is broken."



Great news out of the Federal election is the promise an Albanese Government will provide \$1.5 million to upgrade our much-loved outdoor pool, which was built in 1983.

To help slow traffic and make the area safer, we've also just awarded the contract for traffic management works in Bible Street.


The upgraded Eltham Skate Park has now opened and it's great to see so many young people – and the young at heart - enjoying this new facility.



# (V) Service satisfaction remains solid

The results of the 2022 Annual Community Survey have been released with Council's overall performance rated as "solid".

Independent research company Metropolis Research undertook the survey in February this year, measuring community satisfaction with a range of Council services, facilities and activities. The company conducted telephone interviews with 508 randomly selected community members.
