The proposed Green Wedge zone must not be supported. The RCZ must stay.

There must be no 'buffer zones' between the RCZ and UGB. The UGB is a boundary, not a buffer.

Any buffer will compromise the integrity of RCZ land and its environmental values.

I am particularly concerned at the proposal to not require permits for some activities. I do not support this.

As a long term Nillumbik resident, it is concerning that a document such as this was even put to the community.

Please reinstate the existing plan. Go back to the drawing board and - please - this time reflect our wishes, instead of trying to railroad us into becoming yet another urban council.

Leadership - Respect for and listening to views from people across the community rather than just small, activist groups who talk the loudest, push their own agenda to the detriment of others and appear to have influence within Council that goes beyond what should be acceptable. Integrity within Council and its officers when dealing with individuals or groups from the community. Landowners act with integrity and collaborate to get things done, by working with facts and quantifiable detail to ensure they succeed, as opposed to green and other activist groups in and out of the Shire who push their ideologies and spread misinformation to get what they want to other detriment. To be successful we need to accept that change is inevitable and adapt with embrace that change.

Whole of Shire approach - The urban community should not control what rural residents do on their land. Rural landowners are responsible stewards of the landscape and this must be acknowledged and, within the framework of a successful GWMP, be supported through proper inclusion, targeting and delivery.

Manage change - The green wedge is in a perpetual state of change and challenges must be dealt with in a responsible way. The pathway to manage change is to acknowledge all those that contribute and value participation which results in a healthy landscape into the future. This does not currently occur as green activists assume the only way is to reject and hold back change and adaptability by the irresponsible policies of locking up the land and removing the human footprint.

Celebrate local identity and the landscape - My family live on land that has been farmed by five generations of our family since the 1870's. We have loved, maintained, managed and protected it for all that time through various agricultural activities. For much of the past four decades we have been impacted, often adversely, by local activists who seem intent on controlling use of property and the lives of people around them. It is time this stopped, the green activists who have had far too much influence for so many years never ask us about what we do but instead make presumptions coloured by their ideology, spread misinformation, are at the least ill-informed, disparage anyone with land as developers and at worst simply lie to get their way.

Safety, wellbeing and resilience - Locking up the land and letting nature takeover again, has been tried throughout the state and has failed, and this failure is evidenced in large fires that have ravaged our national parks. We have seen for decades policies of locking up the bush and not clearing roadsides to make them safe escape routes in a bushfire. Locking up the land is not a solution, landowners in the Shire manage their land and

create a healthy landscape that can keep us all safe.

Conserve and enhance our heritage - As a sixth generation resident of the area our heritage is in my DNA, that includes natural heritage and built heritage. We must value what our area has been to residents over generations, educate the community about what they have preserved and built for us so that we can continue on with that work in preserving our area for the future.

Sustainability and the precautionary principle - Remove all reference to the precautionary principle as the term and its application has been abused for decades as an inappropriate catch-all phrase to refuse permits when all else fails. There are a great number of highly qualified experts, Agencies and consultants that can provide detailed and methodical analysis for any given situation. Let the experts determine what is acceptable and remove ill-informed and unqualified planners and activists the ability to refuse or reject on no valid grounds or the wishful motherhood principle of refusal based on the "you might be held accountable if something adverse happens or some-one dies".

- We need strong and continued engagement as the GWMP is being implemented. Landowners must be valued, included and recognised. Landowners already make a huge contribution to the living landscape and receive no assistance or real recognition that the face of the Nillumbik green wedge is there because we are, the community needs to know this.
- The punitive approach by Council towards rural landowners that has prevailed for decades must cease for the GWMP to be successful.
- Establish lawful authority for landowners to undertake bushfire mitigation works on their own properties, as well as along the road verges adjacent to their properties, without the need for a planning permit. The only access to my property is a 300m driveway to the NNW, and as that is the usual trajectory of a fire in this area it is vital that my only

escape route is clear enough for my family to leave safely.

- Current zoning (RCZ) is not fit for purpose as applied to existing properties, infrastructure and enterprises. The RCZ was introduced to satisfy green activist groups who, improperly, dictate Government policy. The Nillumbik RCZ is not consistent with the principles of a green wedge and is the only application of an RCZ within a green wedge in Victoria.
- The GWMP should advocate and pursue a planning scheme amendment to change the current RCZ to the fit for purpose Green Wedge Zone (GWZ). A GWZ still satisfies all of the requirements that currently exist in relation to a successful green wedge and a healthy landscape, but properly incorporates a more realistic understanding that people should and do legitimately live within the green wedge and within the landscape.
- The GWMP should acknowledge that the term "small lots" is inappropriate, misleading and not applicable for any existing title. Any application to council for any purpose should not be assessed on its area, rather it should be assessed on its merits irrespective of the land area. No policy position has been espoused in the draft GWMP with respect to the above issue. The final GWMP should either, state that it forms no position, or, that the term, in isolation, is irrelevant and will not be used as a means of refusal.
- Improved mobile coverage and elimination of black spots should be a high priority. It is unimaginable that, within the most fire prone area on Earth, Nillumbik still contains these black spots. This a damning indictment on Government (from either side of politics).

- A healthy environment requires realistic fire mitigation and the importance of the Nillumbik Bushfire Mitigation Strategy is crucial to the success of the GWMP. The BMS should take precedence over the GWMP and this needs to be defined in the GWMP.
- The proposed stock takes of assets may be worthwhile but has the potential to be used as a repository for information against landowners. Given the current council and environmental officer attitudes towards landowners when making permit

applications, this type of information library could deliver an increased opportunity for invasive and irrelevant application assessment and be used as a means to impose more excessive controls and requirements.

- There must be an 'as of right to rebuild' in the case of disaster, particularly bushfire. There is a moral obligation and duty of care that is incumbent on Council to minimize the stress and trauma that such a loss can impose on the people, both directly and indirectly affected. "Council supports the premise that people should be able to rebuild" is not enough, the current regime is prohibitive, negative and counter-productive and needs to change. To suggest that "the planning and building controls are in place so that the design and siting of replacement buildings reduce future risks to the occupants, not repeat them. This may mean that another location on the property is a better option to address fire risk" is unacceptable. Those who have lost their home and other buildings should automatically be allowed to rebuild in the same location, not jump through hoops for years waiting for an outcome only to be dragged off to VCAT by objectors and green activist groups and further punitive costs and delays.

Land zoned GWZ retains the ability to properly protect environmentally sensitive areas, whilst being more realistic in relation to existing dwellings and infrastructure as well as enterprise.

Appendix 1 of Council's draft quotes the State Government's 'Plan Melbourne 2017-2050', where the first priority for the Green Wedge is to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation." In addition the 2010 GWMP, recent community panel and the recent community engagement clearly reflect that maintenance, protection and enhancement of the Green Wedge is a first tier priority for the vast majority of Nillumbik residents. Council's draft plan does not clearly state, address and prioritise this key mandate for environmental protection and reinvigoration.

Do you have any comments about the Five Key Moves?

Whilst I support-in-principle some of the Five Key Moves there needs to be a much greater level of detail. In addition is is imperative that the action to be taken provide a clear directive, and each of these must prioritise best environmental practice, ensuring the protection of all native vegetation and fauna across the Shire. Every descriptor needs to clearly indicate how it will contribute to the protection and reinvigoration of biodiversity for the long term. "Information and support service", "whole of organisation approach" and "forum to discuss" are not adequate over-arching key moves as they do not specify actionable and accountable tasks, or in fact that any action at all needs to be taken. "The current GWMP 2010 - 2025 describes in much greater detail (than the new draft) the ways Council and community will ensure the protection of the green wedge. However there has been consistent net loss of vegetation. This demonstrates that any new plan must be stronger and clearer about the actions which will be taken to reverse this ongoing decline. The draft GWMP does not achieve this. The current GWMP aims align better with the recommendations of the community panel and feedback from community engagement than the new drafts key moves. A deviation towards the draft key moves and away from the current GWMP aims would be a clear backwards step in councils responsibilities to its constituents and the state governments Green Wedge framework.

Do you have any comments about the Principles?

Each Principle is a very broad statement and it is unclear how they will be interpreted and applied while ensuring care for the environment. Again there is no clearly defined strategy for implementation, and these principles are often not elaborated on at all within the plan. The Principles need to reflect the community's commitment to protecting the Green Wedge. The GWMP plan must describe how the values of the Green Wedge will be prioritised in keeping with the State Government's policies Plan Melbourne 2017-2050 and Protecting Victoria's Environment – Biodiversity 2037, which is 'Victoria's plan to stop the decline of our native plants and animals and improve our natural environment so it is healthy, valued and actively cared for.' An additional Principle that focuses on Preservation of Environment and Biodiversity, and describes the urgent need to reverse the decline of biodiversity and effects of climate change should be added to the GWMP. As with the 'Five Key Moves', the outlined Principles contain potentially useful ideas but there needs to be greater emphasis on the protection of the environment. For example, the principle that says, 'The green wedge is a changing environment and home to many people. Change will be managed to conserve its values and with a focus on long-term stewardship.' could read, "The green wedge is a changing environment and home to many people. Change will be managed to conserve its biodiversity and environmental values and with a focus on long-term stewardship." Again the current GWMP contains more clearly definable and accountable principles that better align with the communities priorities as reflected in recent community engagement and panel recommendations.

The first Green Wedge priority of conserve and enhance biodiversity and environment is clearly stated in the current principles. Neither biodiversity or environment are headlines in the draft proposal again highlighting the lack of appropriate emphasis on this cherished key Green Wedge element.

Goal 1: Engaged connected communities

The Goal 1 initiative, to engage the community, is important. But it must also highlight the environmental protection aim as stated in 1994 when the Local Government Review Board declared Nillumbik was to be "a conservation Shire with the Green Wedge as its strategic focus". The context for the shires primary goal and mandate needs to be kept at the forefront. The plan must state more clearly that the Shire and Green Wedge areas have particular needs that are different to those in an area not established as a Green Wedge. The new plan presents an opportunity to highlight and expand the role of the whole community in stewardship of the land. This needs to be clearly stated and emphasised, as we ask ourselves, 'How can we maintain and reinvigorate the environment?', rather than 'What can we get out of the land?'. The plan needs to address community engagement and connectivity around Green Wedge specific issues such as maintaining and encouraging biodiversity and natural environment.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 2? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2?

The Objectives and Key Actions for Goal 2 must clearly and strongly focus on ensuring Nillumbik's biodiversity is top priority. As stated in the draft plan, green space is an important determinant of health, not just because it enables physical activity but also

because it has been shown to promote higher levels of mental wellbeing and social connectedness.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3?

The GWMP needs to more strongly acknowledge the importance of all indigenous vegetation and address the urgent need to conserve it throughout the Shire, on private and public land. The community must work together to focus on increasing habitat for wildlife and connectivity; preserving biodiversity; valuing what ecosystems provide; developing a 'systems view' (that all is interdependent); address the climate change and extinction crises, and the need to transform to an ecologically sustainable society. This must become the underpinning ethos that guides the Actions and all other aspects of the plan, without compromise. Goal 3 repeatedly uses the language of 'balance', and this needs to be amended as it indicates that our thinking is oppositional. It implies that there is a need to trade-off environmental health against other considerations, while international, national, and state government reports indicate that we must prioritise the health of our environment. For example, A3.12, p 33, speaks of balancing amenity, environmental considerations, private water extraction and community considerations. What needs to take place is a prioritisation of environmental considerations, as without optimal environmental health, all other activity and considerations will be constrained. The use of stocktakes and studies [see A3.1, p32] that describe some areas of vegetation as more significant or valuable than others is alarming as it can lead to greater degradation of the environment which is already under pressure. The majority of the Shire's ecosystems are already 'disturbed' because of mismanagement, and this means we must change our ways. Every Objective and Action ought to aim for preservation and reinvigoration of the environment. One of the greatest threats to the Shire is 'death by a thousand cuts', where bit by bit land clearing and grazing leave our flora and fauna vulnerable to ever-increasing stress and disappearance. In turn this also places greater pressure on our community's overall well being. An additional Action must be to undertake a massive public education campaign about biodiversity, the value of ecosystems, care for natural landscapes, bushfire risk reduction through understanding the ancient role of fire in the landscape, the significance of the Green Wedge, climate change and their interdependence.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4?

This section must clearly focus on overall environmental protection. Economic activities must be assessed and altered in response to latest science and the urgent need for environmental protections. This must be reflected in the title of the Goal, the Actions, and throughout the plan, for example, 'A prosperous eco-friendly Green Wedge economy'. Support for local agriculture is important but must always provide for the continuing health of the environment. New systems that respect and promote regenerative farming, Indigenous knowledge, and value indigenous flora and fauna must be encouraged. The draft suggests that to start farming in the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) no permit should be required if the land has been previously cleared and used for farming. This definition of 'cleared land' needs greater detail - much of Nillumbik has been cleared at some stage, but thanks to regeneration it holds significant environmental qualities. Permits are essential as they can ensure any agricultural activities respect the land. It also means that residents will be informed about the piggery etc proposed for next door. The permit process allows for suitable new agribusiness whilst ensuring this does not come at a cost to the Green Wedge, its community and its environment.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5? Stewardship of the land is mentioned in the draft plan, and its role must be better defined in Goal 5, Responsible Leadership. It needs to explain that Nillumbik residents have an obligation to care for the land, not degrade it, and this must be for the entirety of their tenure. Responsible stewardship also asks that the land, its diverse ecosystems and waterways, are passed on in a better state. This draft plan suggests the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) is too restrictive of farming practices and this zoning should only be applied to land with higher conservation values. This suggestion puts at serious risk flora and fauna across a significant proportion of the Shire, whether as single trees in paddocks or scattered pockets of remnant bush. These are all vital and in need of greater care and protection, not less. Responsible Leadership should have a section dealing with climate change mitigation in accordance with the precautionary principle. This Goal in its entirety must place much greater emphasis on the need to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation.' (Refer 1st item in Appendix 1 of draft GWMP - Plan Melbourne 2017-2050). Key Action A5.6 and A5.7 [page 40 of the draft] propose changes to how land within the Green Wedge can be used. This has the potential to erode the values of the Green Wedge and effectively increase the spread of residential and commercial development outside the Urban Growth Boundary. The UGB must be treated as a hard boundary. The Victorian government developed the UGB policy to remove the potential for incremental change to the boundary. In particular the

land designated as RCZ is specified to prioritise conservation and enhancement of the landscape ahead of residential development and plays a key role in protecting the Green Wedge from detrimental urban sprawl. In addition the minimum lot subdivision size must be enforced as another fundamental requirement for fire security and environment protection in RCZ and rural areas. The GWMP needs to recognise the leading role that Nillumbik can play; that we can be part of the solution, acting locally to address global problems. We're a relatively affluent population. Nillumbik is the perfect place to start turning things around. If not here and now, where and when?

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

The strongest message from the initial community consultation and the Panel Report is that Nillumbik residents and the population of wider Melbourne cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. This message must lay the foundation for any new GWMP. The current draft does not achieve this. There is a worrying lack of detail throughout the document regarding the protection and enhancement of the Shire's biodiversity in all its forms and varying quality. Clearly defined actions need to be included which will address this problem to ensure the long term health of the Green Wedge. Declines in biodiversity are at critical levels, and there is urgent need for action by all levels of government and society. The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) states that, "The health of ecosystems on which we and all other species depend is deteriorating more rapidly than ever. We are eroding the very foundations of our economies, livelihoods, food security, health and quality of life worldwide. It is not too late to make a difference, but only if we start now at every level from local to global". The impact of invasive species – flora and fauna – is significant and this must be better addressed. The Green Wedge Management Plan must reaffirm the Shire's conservation role. The draft speaks of polarised and diverse views and how conversations must be respectful and robust. It is vital that this is the case, and is supported by current science, particularly in relation to the need for environmental repair and preservation. It is necessary that we uphold the highest of professional standards throughout the Shire and its Leadership. Many of the challenges faced by Nillumbik and is residents as listed in the draft will be accentuated by changes to the UGB or reclassification of RCZ areas. In addition re-classification of RCZ areas to allow residential development would conflict with the state governments UGB requirements. RCZ reclassification to allow more lenient land usage would also increase strain on the UGB boundary exacerbating the impacts of agricultural land usage right next to residential properties. The current GWMP lists a 2030 vision displaying the forward thinking attitudes and long term foresight that the draft plan does not. The community panel also strongly recommended the need for future thinking to ensure actions take now are not short-sighted and destined to adversely affect Nillumbik in the years to come. The draft

plan is lacking in both these areas, the current GWMP is a much more suitable plan for the sustainable long term prosperity and enhancement of the Green Wedge. As a professional working young couple my husband and I are prime examples of desirable residents for the area, bringing in higher disposable incomes, requiring few costly community services and an increase in population diversity balancing out the additional costs of elderly and families with young kids. The Green Wedge is what attracted us to the area, and ultimately determined where we purchased (within a RCZ). Re-zoning and reducing these protected areas will turn away valuable members of the community whose goals and interests align with the Green Wedge and the community that supports it, instead bringing in residents with increased costly needs and posing further challenges in land usage and environment care for council. Climate breakdown poses the greatest long-term threat to the preservation of the Green Wedge. As the world's top scientific bodies (including the IPCC) have identified, drastic and immediate action is required for the world to reach net zero emissions and prevent a catastrophic 2 degrees of global warming. Mitigating climate breakdown must be an overarching Goal for the GWMP and therefore must be an integral part of the Vision. This is not reflected by the Draft. The Green Wedge Management Plan cannot adequately protect Nillumbik's Green Wedge without a comprehensive plan to contribute to the prevention catastrophic climate breakdown, by acknowledging the current climate emergency and completely transitioning the shire's power generation to 100% renewable energy within the 10-year period of the Plan.

Efforts to mitigate climate breakdown must inform all the Plan's objectives and actions, such as regenerative agriculture to draw down carbon form the atmosphere, fire management, creating a carbon neutral economy and broader economic strategy, and protecting our native forests from logging to ensure crucial carbon sequestration is continued. Climate breakdown mitigation must inform all Council policy.

Simply "adapting to climate change" as the Plan constantly refers to will not protect the

Green Wedge. Protecting the Green Wedge from a dangerous and unstable climate will not be possible unless governmental bodies around the world, including the Council, take strong leadership to reach net zero carbon emissions. As the world's top scientific bodies have identified in Trajectories of the Earth System, unless such leadership and stewardship of the earth is taken, the human activities will cause catastrophic climate breakdown by passing the point of no return: the 2 degrees Celsius of global warming tipping point. Crossing this tipping point would lead to up to 6 degrees of warming, which the World Bank has identified as "beyond adaption".

The GWMP must acknowledge that mitigating climate breakdown is essential to the prosperity of the Green Wedge. It is essential that the Green Wedge Management Plan emphasises the dire need for Nillumbik Council to be strong climate leaders, and for Council's policies to always prioritise the achievement of net zero emissions within 10 years, while taking measures to adapt to unavoidable climate breakdown impacts. The GWMP Vision does not state strongly enough the foremost importance of environmental protection and invigoration, nor does it reflect strongly enough the deep cherishment that Nillumbik residence have for the high environmental values of the Green Wedge (as clearly demonstrated by the Council's initial community engagement). The GWMP must reflect that Nillumbik's Green Wedge remaining the most environmentally intact of Melbourne's Green Wedges is highly beneficially for everyone in and around Nillumbik, and for the mitigation of climate breakdown.

It is of vital importance that Nillumbik demonstrates respect of Indigenous peoples, their traditional ownership of the land, their cultural heritage, and their deep knowledge. This barely gets a mention in the GWMP despite the fact that Indigenous people have ensured the vitality of the area's biodiversity for tens of thousands of years. The Green Wedge Management Plan and its Vision must place greater emphasis on specifically deeply listening to, and consulting with, the Traditional Owners of the land, and taking action on their advice.

Council did not follow Planning Practice Note 31, under State Government policy, properly. Mitigation of climate breakdown must be key move for the GWMP. This throws into question the entire document and associated processes. Planning Practice Note 31 describes specific requirements for the development of a GWMP, including the establishment of a Project Steering Group chaired by Council with key stakeholder representatives. This did not occur. This Draft does not include the level of detail that the current Green Wedge Management Plan includes. The current GWMP should be used as a basis for improvement, but with stronger detail added to describe the specific 'actions and measures that need to be undertaken, and identify resource requirements, roles and responsibilities, timelines, outcomes and evaluation.' As the State Government's Planning Practice Note 31 states. The current (2010-2025) GWMP has failed to protect native vegetation and forests (such as the forests in Kinglake), and the new GWMP must right this with strong and specific actions to be taken.

Policy change, climate leadership form Council, and practical action to stop carbon emissions are necessary to protecting the Green Wedge, its residents, and more. Conversations will not prevent catastrophic breakdown. The GWMP must clearly articulate in detail the practical implementation and ACTIONS to be taken to mitigate climate breakdown as a Key Move.

While the Five Key Moves contain ideas that are potentially helpful to protecting the environment, they still do not emphasise caring for the natural environment as the number one priority of Nillumbik Council – the GWMP must prioritise best environmental practice, ensuring the protection of ALL native vegetation and fauna across the Shire.

We have disagreed due to lack of specificity in these Principles. The Principles must be more specific in how they will be applied to care for the environment, as in the Draft they are broad statements. The Principles must reflect the community's strong commitment to protecting the Green Wedge, and the importance of young peoples' involvement in protecting the environment through leading conversations about climate mitigation, and being able to practically care for and maintain the land.

It is essential that that GWMP includes the Principle of a safe climate, and thereby prioritises mitigating climate breakdown. The GWMP must also reflect the need for council policy to reflect the recommendations and risk assessments of climate scientists or researchers.

The Principle of Aboriginal Voice does not meaningfully convey the need for consultation with Traditional Owners of the land, especially in matters to do with environmental action, and does not convey the need respect for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, their voices and knowledge. The Principle of Social Equity also does not provide a clear guideline for inclusion of diverse peoples in projects and actions taken to protect the environment, as it should.

A Principle that focuses on the Preservation of Biodiversity and describes the urgent need to reverse the decline of biodiversity and effects of climate change should be added to the GWMP. Biodiversity Protection should be given the status of a Goal in the Plan

While the ideas of the Principles are useful if implemented in the right way, the vagueness of the Principles allows room for climate mitigation, preserving biodiversity, proper social equity and enshrined Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander voice to not be properly implemented in policy.

In regards to the recognition of Nillumbik's relationship to Metropolitan Melbourne, these principles must be based on protecting the Green Wedge and, rather than try and amalgamate with the metropolitan Melbourne, embrace and flourish the positive natural differences we have.

In particular, the "accountability" and "transparency" detailed in the Leadership section are integral to this plan and should never lose key importance. All decisions must be kept accountable to the preservation, growth, and flourishing of the green wedge, and the global responsibility this flourishing of the green wedge contains in subduing the climate crisis. Transparency is a vital step to ensure accountability is held, as the community voice must have a hand through each step and decision.

Collaboration and connectedness is also essential. As a voice representing the youth, we find that our role as the future of this land and community is of immense importance. Consideration of the future that each decision will bring about is necessary in order to express that the perspective of each and every member of the youth is represented fully.

Reiterating that the climate crisis is all encompassing and therefore all issues in the Green Wedge are enveloped by the climate crisis, and dependent on it being countered.

The general aim of the goal is good, seeking to support those living in rural areas, however there is a severe lack of emphasis on direct protection and regenerate of the Green Wedge. This is important for obvious reasons, but it would also provide opportunity for the creation and growth of groups who seek to have more of a positive effect on the growth of the Green Wedge (such as ourselves). If such action was proposed in the plan, everyday member of the community would theoretically be more

aware of such groups, with the knowledge that they could have an impact on their local environment, should they decide to join one of them. More emphasis should also be placed on the Green Wedge's critical role in protecting the environment, especially in reducing carbon emissions, again, focusing on raising awareness in this area would further perpetuate its protection both politically as well as in a more hands-on way via community action. More detail should be added into the plan when it comes to focusing on protection and rejuvenation.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

Work with those who are most knowledgeable in the area of environmental conservation, communicating not just with "government agencies" and those with technical knowledge, while this is needed, those with a more hands-on understanding on the local land must be had. Specifically, those who have been living in the rural area for many years, preferably even families who have been there for generations, including Traditional Custodians of the area. While the people and groups referenced in the plan will provide help, we believe there can be much to learn from those more deeply immersed in the environment which is trying to be protected. Biodiversity must also be more strongly expressed in this goal, as it essential for providing the mental health benefits which are stated in the goal.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3? "Overall biodiversity improvement over the next 20 years" is truly essential and this needs to be held accountable.

"Climate change risks are most effectively addressed by those who are directly affected"

- This should be elaborated on by saying that those who contribute the most to the climate crisis are those who have the greatest ethical and social responsibility to remedy and counter it. The responsibility should not necessarily fall on those who are potentially suffering the effects of the climate crisis now, but on those who will be magnifying the suffering in the future due to their actions today.
- We must not only be "capable of meeting the challenges of climate change", but be a driving force in defeating these challenges. Though it's a technicality based on the use

of language, strong and committable language needs to be employed in order to be held accountable for the responsibility that this plan has in preserving our planet.

A.36 is not clear enough in defining what actions will take place to combat climate change, nor does it contain enough urgency and foresight that is appropriate to the topic of the climate crisis. Overall, there needs to be a greater presence of indigenous vegetation and its protection. Preservation and growth are key.

Another note on language - the use of the term "balance" in regards to our needs is, in the context, implicative that creating a flourishing state for biodiversity and making all decisions with both the climate crisis and the youth that will be the future in mind would seem to be counterproductive to sustaining the green wedge. It must not only be the priority, but it can very much be an idea that exists in harmony with the other actions occurring to sustain the Green Wedge. The climate crisis will clearly infringe on the quality of economy, tourism, and countless other aspects of the Green Wedge's sustainability, therefore in protection of these factors as well, the climate crisis must be at the forefront of the issue.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

"Promoting growth by attracting new investment and businesses" should not hinder the environmental needs. All environmental concerns must take precedence over emerging businesses that have the potential of causing any amount of damage or negative long-term effects on the land and the climate. The GWMP must clearly prioritie the need for environmental protection over economic growth. A carefully created acceptance process must be made for businesses requesting entry in ensuring they will be sustainable - education to these businesses on how they can reduce their footprint and help flourish the area would be a viable step that we would encourage. Economic activities must reflect the latest science and urgent need for environmental protections. The title of this Goal should reflect the need for environmental protections, such as, "a prosperous, environmentally-friendly Green Wedge economy'.

Both excerpts: "This means that agriculture needs to co-exist comfortably with nature conservation. For example, livestock should not be grazed where they might damage areas with high biodiversity values..." and "...This also means that the land available for soil-based based agriculture needs to be protected for the future, that farming is able to take place without unnecessary interference, that the possibility of diversification into related activities, such as tourism is allowed and that the emergence of non-soil based agriculture can be made possible..." are of incredible importance. Accountability must be held to these statements. Good stuff.

The language used should indicate the position that all business and economic growth exists under the umbrella of the environment in the Green Wedge - the "Green" in the Green Wedge.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Neutral

Leadership exists with the responsibility to train the community as leaders themselves.

They should be educated on how they can lead the movement of sustainability and lend a powerful hand in eternalising the Green Wedge rather than letting it waste away to the climate crisis

Other thoughts include further education on the community for individual-based methods of flourishing the Green Wedge and becoming sustainable, as well as selling the personal benefits that can bring to people. Recycling, growing own food or buying from farmers' markets (promotes local economy), etc.

Overall, Nillumbik can be a leader in truly putting the Green in Green Wedge first. Understanding, acknowledging, and acting appropriately to the fact that without the land and a healthy climate, nothing else can exist. Solutions must be made and diligence must be formed in order to combat the biggest crisis that has faced humanity, and sleep soundly knowing that all steps were taken so that there is a future for the children like us. I, writing, am a seventeen year-old boy still in school. It is essential to me to know that the council is undergoing each process in its innerworkings on the basis of questions such as "how will this impact the environment?" and "how could we use this to create a positive change in our community?"

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

The GWMP draft does not emphasise the need for strong, immediate climate mitigation. The GWMP needs to set clear, detailed actions to rapidly transition the shire to 100% renewable energy generation and reach net zero emissions in order to protect the Green Wedge.

The current draft lacks the detail necessary to protect the Green Wedge's biodiversity. Declines in biodiversity are at critical levels, and there is urgent need for action by all

levels of government and society. The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) states that, "The health of ecosystems on which we and all other species depend is

deteriorating more rapidly than ever. We are eroding the very foundations of our economies, livelihoods, food security, health and quality of life worldwide. It is not too late to make a difference, but only if we start now at every level from local to global". Clearly defined actions need to be included which will protect and increase the Green Wedge's biodiversity to ensure the long-term health of the Green Wedge.

The current draft also does not properly reflect the strongest message from the initial community consultation and the Panel Report, that Nillumbik residence and the population of wider Melbourne cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. This message must lay the foundation for any new GWMP.

The voices and involvement of young people in protecting the Green Wedge, and mitigating climate breakdown should be included in the actions set out in the future GWMP. Young people are the future of the Green Wedge's sustained, thriving existence.

My comments to Council:

As a ad and as a grandfather I want to see the Green Wedge protected. As a man I want to see the Green Wedge protected. My kids sing a song, "We love the Earth. It is our planet. We love the Earth. It is our home". Quite simply we need ensure we are leaving our kids a better Earth than what have inherited. Today's focus on money and the pursuit of the individual above all else is not a legacy that enriched our community ... local or global.

As local leaders & decision makers I ask that you make this Green Wedge Management Plan decision in good conscience considering the long term future for all not the quick wins for a few.

There are plenty of comments that can be made able who benefits most out of this draft plan but at the end of the day the natural environment MUST be the winner. This is not a competition about who writes the best document. This is about where we live, why we choose to live here and how we want to leave it for those who come after us.

The anxiety my son has about "death by climate change" is real. His disillusion with political leadership is real. As an adult I can vote. As a child he is powerless. As a Council you have an obligation to protect our community assets and ensure appropriate policy is framed for us to live by. Since the 1830's when Europeans first came to Nillumbik, it has changed dramatically. As a Council I implore you to investigate how we can restock or return our Shire so that its natural beauty, its indigenous land and farm land can be protected.

I work in construction on major projects mainly in the CBD. We are so obsessed with the built form that we are removing our natural world at record rates. From 2014-2017 I worked to construct the new Australian Post Entry Quarantine Facility at Mickleham. It is environmental vandalism to weaken the Green Wedge protections.

However the plan appears to be removing the boundaries from within by focus and statements that 'Council has identified that a new housing strategy is required for the whole of the shire' and will re-examine constraints for the green wedge 'to accommodate incremental growth and support housing diversity for young and elderly people' with the shire's 'population growth...concentrated in and around Eltham and Diamond Creek.'

I reside in Wattle Glen and I see what the development around Diamond Creek has done to the environment, our native flora and fauna. It has been urbanised. The very pictures that are used within the plan are not or urbanised areas but of trees, open areas, grasses and native flowers.

The engaged connected communities are already happening with the weekly community walk at Diamond Creek, the local community centres holding classes and exercises, the Lions Club holding festivals and other community festivals in the area specific to Nillumbik such as the Wattle Festival and local farmers' markets. Developing land to accommodate homes further simply takes away the attraction of the Green Wedge. Today alone I saw tourist pull up on the side of the road to take happy snaps with the beautiful native landscape behind them, last week I saw the excitement of people watching the kangaroos from the train that are in threat of being displaced by this plan. I say no to change any of the uses for Rural Conservation zoned land along the Urban Growth Boundary and around townships. EG: as we have in Wattle Glen with vacant

rural land between Mannish Rd and Clarke Ave and also on the west side of the Diamond Creek in Wattle Glen. There is a great aged care facility at the beginning of Yan Yean Road. Learn from other councils. The Shire of Yarra Ranges recently was challenged. The people in favour of developing the area were residents who were aged and had lost sight of the attractiveness and importance of the area from the time they moved some years earlier in but now focussed purely on their own needs to profit off their land. The plan is not intended to introduce possibilities that the council has considered the needs of further housing development for increased profit from payment of rates but to preserve the very thing that makes this area unique and highly valued by all Victorians.

There is no need for improved transport or traffic management (beyond maybe the railway pass at Diamond Creek). It is the very nature of the roads, the single train station at Wattle Glen that creates a special place for tourists to appreciate, an ambience of a more relaxed, go slow, breathe and see the beauty of the very native area near your developed zones. The goal appears to be heavily disguised as simply a means of increasing housing - what does A1.6 imply - why does council seek to acquire the small rural lots adjacent to public land...for development? The objectives and key actions here have lost sight of the key purpose of having a green wedge and current community engagement but are focussing on development of buildings and removal of trees - for every building development there is the ability to remove native vegetation to protect from fire...the impact radius is larger than the development.

The review of potential hinders is focussed purely on agriculture and tourism. Generalised statements presented that appear to use the draft plan as a means to bring urban change...greed! Where is the continued protection of this beautiful and naturally diverse area. Disappointed that council are considering to effect change. The draft plan suggests that council is seeking to change from within rather than tackling along the boundaries i.e. encouraging urbanised creep within to meet the urban boundaries.

Aboriginal voice There is indeed much to learned from the indigenous people, particularly in relation to land management and land fit for purpose. Whole of shire approach The urban community should not control what rural residents do on their land. Rural landowners are responsible stewards of the landscape and this must be acknowledged and, within the framework of a successful GWMP, be supported through proper inclusion, targeting and delivery. Manage change The green wedge is in a perpetual state of change and challenges must be dealt with in a responsible way. Social Equity Supported. Safety, Wellbeing The key to resilience is to maintain a healthy landscape which provides the best ongoing opportunity for the landscape to survive. The solution to resilience is not to lock up the land, remove human involvement and let "nature take its course". This is a very short road which leads directly to the next bushfire

disaster. Conserve and enhance our heritage I fully support this principle. Conservation involves human input as this provides the only pathway to long term survival. Landowners already make a huge contribution to the living landscape and receive no assistance in delivering the face of the Nillumbik green wedge to the community. • To date the only contribution council makes to landowners is to punish, pursue and penalize. This must change if the GWMP is to be successful. • Establish lawful authority for landowners to undertake bushfire mitigation works on their own properties, as well as along the road verges adjacent to their properties, without the need for a planning permit. • Current zoning (RCZ) is not fit for purpose as applied to existing properties, infrastructure and enterprises. The RCZ was introduced to satisfy green activist groups who, improperly, dictate Government policy. The Nillumbik RCZ is not consistent with the principles of a green wedge and is the only application of an RCZ within a green wedge in Victoria. • The GWMP should advocate and pursue a planning

scheme amendment to change the current RCZ to the fit for purpose Green Wedge Zone (GWZ). A GWZ still satisfies all of the requirements that currently exist in relation to a successful green wedge and a healthy landscape, but properly incorporates a more realistic understanding that people should and do legitimately live within the green wedge and within the landscape. • The GWMP should acknowledge that the term "small lots" is inappropriate, misleading and not applicable for any existing title. Any application to council for any purpose should not be assessed on its area, rather it should be assessed on its merits irrespective of the land area. • No policy position has been espoused in the draft GWMP with respect to the above issue. The final GWMP should either, state that it forms no position, or, that the term, in isolation, is irrelevant and will not be used as a means of refusal. • I do not advocate for any change to the Urban Growth Boundary and I acknowledge and agree that within the GWMP council does not either. In any advent, it is the sole responsibility of State Government to determine any matters that relate to this issue, not council. • There should be a discussion with Government in relation to the concept of buffer zones, but I have no immediate position on the positives or negatives. • Improved mobile coverage and elimination of black spots should be a high priority. It is unimaginable that, within the most fire prone area on Earth, Nillumbik still contains these black spots. This a damning indictment on Government (from either side of politics).

This is despite the increased number of dwellings and enterprises. This is supported by historical aerial photography, as well as the empirical evidence from local

CFA brigades and Government Agencies who all attest that ground fuel and vegetation cover once again exceed the levels from pre 2009 Black Saturday fires. • As a consequence of the above, a healthy environment requires realistic fire mitigation and the importance of the Nillumbik Bushfire Mitigation Strategy is crucial to the success of the GWMP. The BMS should take precedence over the GWMP and this needs to be defined in the GWMP. • The proposed stock takes of assets may be worthwhile but has the potential to be used as a repository for information against landowners. Given the current council planning and environmental officer attitudes towards landowners when making permit applications, this type of information library could deliver an increased opportunity for invasive and irrelevant application assessment and be used as a means to impose more excessive controls and requirements. • As of right to rebuild – see comments at the head of this response. • Planning provisions – see comments at the head of this response.

However, unless council can demonstrate that council officers can genuinely work with landowners and not against them, the effects of good governance and engagement will have very limited success. Regulations and enforcement actions (including penalties) are not the way forward for landowners, irrespective of the situation, as this line of action will only increase mistrust and will not deliver improved council / community relationships. • Land Use Planning The current zoning of RCZ across the green wedge is not fit for purpose. The GWMP should advocate strongly to rezone the green wedge as a GWZ – as is the situation with every other green wedge in the State. I have no issue with the Special Use Zone for Bend of Isles , in fact a Special Use Zone should also be applied to the Christmas Hills area to protect existing uses across the Melbourne Water Land. Land zoned GWZ retains the ability to properly protect environmentally sensitive areas, whilst being more realistic in relation to existing dwellings and infrastructure as well as enterprise. A GWZ is fit for purpose, but does not involve any change to the existing

controls in relation minimum lot sizes for subdivision. However, a GWZ recognizes and acknowledges a greater range of uses befitting the rural part of the Nillumbik Shire being the land within the green wedge. Rather than fiddle around the edges of the existing RCZ in an attempt to protect the "right to farm", micro applied to specific areas only, a rezoning to GWZ is a superior general fit for purpose, whilst simultaneously protecting sensitive vegetation areas. A GWZ does not diminish the protection offered to environmentally sensitive areas, but does offer a more comprehensive, appropriate zoning which also covers the farming, agricultural, hobby farming and micro-enterprise businesses that either exist or may be proposed into the future.

An acknowledgement that all views should be considered unlike the green activist view that only their view should be considered. • Collaboration Necessary component to deliver good outcomes, unlike the green activist view that only their position and viewpoints are worthy. • Integrity Landowners are the main contributors that act with integrity by relying only on facts and truths and not misleading information and false accusations. • Adaptability A successful green wedge, like its inhabitants, has to be adaptable and flexible and conducive to a changing environment. • Community Essential to establish a sense of community which can only be achieved with realistic goals and community inclusion. Aboriginal voice There is indeed much to learned from the indigenous people, particularly in relation to land management and land fit for purpose. Whole of shire approach The urban community should not control what rural residents do on their land. Rural landowners are responsible stewards of the landscape and this must be acknowledged and, within the framework of a successful GWMP, be supported through proper inclusion, targeting and delivery. Manage change The green wedge is in a perpetual state of change and challenges must be dealt with in a responsible way. The pathway to manage change is to acknowledge all those that contribute and value participation which results in a healthy landscape into the future. This does not currently occur as green activists assume the only way is to reject and hold back change and adaptability by the irresponsible policies of locking up the land and removing the human footprint. Collaboration The draft GWMP is absolutely accurate here and I fully support this initiative. Celebrate local identity and landscape I fully support this principle. There is much to love about our existing landscape, which has been delivering a successful green wedge to the community for generations. When combined with strong local identity the result is a much-loved area on the fringe of suburban Melbourne. The main danger here is the divisive, misleading and inaccurate opinions and misinformation broadcast by ill-informed green activists which seek to destroy what we have held dear for generations, a sense of a great place to live and of living within a great landscape. Social Equity Supported. Safety, Wellbeing The key to resilience is to maintain a healthy landscape which provides the best ongoing opportunity for the landscape to survive. The solution to resilience is not to lock up the land, remove human involvement and let "nature take its course". This is a very short road which leads directly to the next bushfire disaster. Conserve and enhance our heritage I fully support this principle. Conservation involves human input as this provides the only pathway to long term survival. Embrace human input and interaction with the landscape. Exclusion equals extinction. Sustainability and precautionary principle The key factor to sustainability is a healthy landscape that incorporates all of the differing components that when added together, deliver the best overall green wedge. Remove all reference to the precautionary principle as the term and its application has been abused for decades as an inappropriate catch-all phrase to refuse permits when all else fails. There are a great number of highly qualified experts, Agencies and consultants that can provide detailed and methodical analysis for any given situation. Let the experts determine what is acceptable and remove ill-informed and unqualified planners and activists the ability to refuse or reject on no valid grounds or the wishful motherhood principle of refusal based on the "you might be held accountable if something adverse happens or some-one dies".

• Implementation is the key. Without strong and continuing engagement delivered through the implementation phase the GWMP will fail. • Landowners must be valued, included and recognized. Landowners already make a huge contribution to the living landscape and receive no assistance in delivering the face of the Nillumbik green wedge to the community. • To date the only contribution council makes to landowners is to punish, pursue and penalize. This must change if the GWMP is to be successful. • Establish lawful authority for landowners to undertake bushfire mitigation works on their own properties, as well as along the road verges adjacent to their properties, without the need for a planning permit. • Current zoning (RCZ) is not fit for purpose as applied to existing properties, infrastructure and enterprises. The RCZ was introduced to satisfy green activist groups who, improperly, dictate Government policy. The Nillumbik RCZ is not consistent with the principles of a green wedge and is the only application of an RCZ within a green wedge in Victoria. • The GWMP should advocate and pursue a planning

scheme amendment to change the current RCZ to the fit for purpose Green Wedge Zone (GWZ). A GWZ still satisfies all of the requirements that currently exist in relation to a successful green wedge and a healthy landscape, but properly incorporates a more realistic understanding that people should and do legitimately live within the green wedge and within the landscape. • The GWMP should acknowledge that the term "small lots" is inappropriate, misleading and not applicable for any existing title. Any application to council for any purpose should not be assessed on its area, rather it should be assessed on its merits irrespective of the land area. • No policy position has been espoused in the draft GWMP with respect to the above issue. The final GWMP should either, state that it forms no position, or, that the term, in isolation, is irrelevant and will not be used as a means of refusal. • I do not advocate for any change to the Urban Growth Boundary and I acknowledge and agree that within the GWMP council does not either. In any advent, it is the sole responsibility of State Government to determine any matters that relate to this issue, not council. • There should be a discussion with Government in relation to the concept of buffer zones, but I have no immediate position on the positives or negatives. • Improved mobile coverage and elimination of black spots should be a high priority. It is unimaginable that, within the most fire prone area on Earth, Nillumbik still contains these black spots. This a damning indictment on Government (from either side of politics).

• A safe environment includes proper works and management of public places. • A healthy environment is determined by a healthy landscape. • The proper and balanced approach to vegetation needs to combine the importance of environmentally significant areas with the existing rural landscapes, both of which join to give us the green wedge we all enjoy now. • It is noted that, despite the misinformation circulated by green activist groups, vegetation cover has significantly increased since the initial green wedge was created. This is despite the increased number of dwellings and enterprises. This is supported by historical aerial photography, as well as the empirical evidence from local

CFA brigades and Government Agencies who all attest that ground fuel and vegetation cover once again exceed the levels from pre 2009 Black Saturday fires. • As a consequence of the above, a healthy environment requires realistic fire mitigation and the importance of the Nillumbik Bushfire Mitigation Strategy is crucial to the success of the GWMP. The BMS should take precedence over the GWMP and this needs to be defined in the GWMP. • The proposed stock takes of assets may be worthwhile but has the potential to be used as a repository for information against landowners. Given the current council planning and environmental officer attitudes towards landowners when making permit applications, this type of information library could deliver an increased opportunity for invasive and irrelevant application assessment and be used as a means to impose more excessive controls and requirements. • As of right to rebuild – see comments at the head of this response. • Planning provisions – see comments at the head of this response.

• Governance and Engagement The principles and objectives are supported. However, unless council can demonstrate that council officers can genuinely work with landowners and not against them, the effects of good governance and engagement will have very limited success. Regulations and enforcement actions (including penalties) are not the way forward for landowners, irrespective of the situation, as this line of action will only increase mistrust and will not deliver improved council / community relationships. • Land Use Planning The current zoning of RCZ across the green wedge is not fit for purpose. The GWMP should advocate strongly to rezone the green wedge as a GWZ – as is the situation with every other green wedge in the State. I have no issue with the Special Use Zone for Bend of Isles , in fact a Special Use Zone should also be applied to the Christmas Hills area to protect existing uses across the Melbourne Water Land. Land zoned GWZ retains the ability to properly protect environmentally sensitive areas, whilst being more realistic in relation to existing dwellings and infrastructure as well as enterprise. A GWZ is fit for purpose, but does not involve any change to the existing

controls in relation minimum lot sizes for subdivision. However, a GWZ recognizes and acknowledges a greater range of uses befitting the rural part of the Nillumbik Shire being the land within the green wedge. Rather than fiddle around the edges of the existing RCZ in an attempt to protect the "right to farm", micro applied to specific areas only, a rezoning to GWZ is a superior general fit for purpose, whilst simultaneously protecting sensitive vegetation areas. A GWZ does not diminish the protection offered to environmentally sensitive areas, but does offer a more comprehensive, appropriate zoning which also covers the farming, agricultural, hobby farming and micro-enterprise businesses that either exist or may be proposed into the future.

VISION Look at the first statement of the Green Wedge Vision on page 5 of the Draft GWMP. 'Management of the Nillumbik green wedge will lead the way in supporting a vibrant, resilient, connected and diverse community; living in the landscape to enhance the environmental social and economic sustainability of the Shire.' By clumping together in the Vision Statement, a bunch of sub-values not focussed on Green Wedge protection, maintenance or revitalisation, the Vision Statement conflates a mass of issues, confusing, missing and ultimately distracting from what should be its first and primary point according to the Victorian Government's Plan Melbourne 2017-2015: "Protect and enhance environmental and biodiversity assets...maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats..." "Vibrant, resilient, connected, diverse community and social and economic sustainability" are laudable goals for Nillumbik Shire in general. But they do not belong in a Green Wedge Vision Statement which is meant to be a statement for the primary focus, direction, commitment and inspiration for the whole Green Wedge Plan. Without that strong, sharp focus on preserving the Green Wedge in the Vision Statement, the subsequent principles, objectives, goals and actions based on the Vision Statement easily become 'soft and fuzzy' on absolute commitment

to maintaining and reinvigorating the environmental values thus distracting from this primary goal. Such distraction and fuzziness are exhibited in much of the wording of the draft key moves, principles, objectives, goals and actions and will inevitably lead to encroachment on and deterioration of the currently very fragile Green Wedge. With this lack of focus and commitment it becomes likely that in a very short time there will no longer BE a Nillumbik Green Wedge. It was agreed in the consultation process: Protecting the environment should be CLEARLY the NUMBER ONE focus of Nillumbik's Green Wedge Plan, and in its current draft form the Vision and the Plan is clearly NOT focussed on protecting the environment. The lack of this focus creates concern about trust in the Council's intentions and process. Instead the Green Wedge Vision should state clearly it is about: Protecting and reinvigorating the native environment and the biodiversity of its flora and fauna. And the Green Wedge Vision statement should very clearly spell out what that means, and provide guidelines for the principles, goals, objections and actions. For example: 1) maintaining and enhancing the Green Wedge as refuge for humans, native flora and fauna 2) counteracting climate change which would undermine the Green Wedge 3) committing to utilising in action, the cultural knowledge of indigenous peoples, the experience of local conservation groups, government departments specialising in environmental conservation and enhancement, and the latest scientific research and data in protecting and reinvigorating the natural environment 4) reviewing, researching and building upon the previous GWMP: what worked, what didn't and how we can Improve in our updated GWMP

KEY MOVES From my experience as an organisational change management consultant, I am not sure how these moves actually represent organisational change, particularly since they don't refer to what has or hasn't been done in these areas previously. Changing from what? For example, one has to wonder, "has there never been a stocktake of environmental assets? "That doesn't seem to be the case. The Key Moves are all very general and could provide useful movement towards achieving the Vision, if the Vision itself was more focussed and these moves more specifically reflected that focus. For example: Key Move 1: A comprehensive landowners' information and support service. The word 'comprehensive' is quite vague and could be replaced by words that actually point to the type of information and purpose of the support service for landowners. A reference to support in recognising the environmental assets on their land and how best to preserve and enhance them, for example, would give meaning to the move. This lack of clarity along with the fact that the GWMP Draft is demeaning of a 'regulation based' approach creates erosion of confidence that landowners will be supported in preserving the Green Wedge rather than being supported in pursuing their own personal economic and social objectives. Key Move 2: A whole of organisation approach to community resilience. This move needs clarification of its intention by adding the words like "community resilience to bushfire, climate change and environmental deterioration." Key Move 3: A Green Wedge Conversations program This statement should include the proposed outcome of what is referred to later in the draft – a 'robust conversations program.' An actual result such as "a better understanding of and shared commitment to action enhancing habitats for flora, fauna and biodiversity," is required. Key Move 4: A comprehensive planning and place management service for the townships. This move doesn't even mention the Green Wedge, which gives rise to more questions about the intentions of the services proposed. An intention that points to how planning regulations and boundaries will be upheld and tourism development (for example) focussed within townships is required. Again, what does 'comprehensive' mean in this context? Key Move 5: Stocktakes of environmental assets and agricultural practices This move fails to even mention stocktakes of environmental assets management practices, only agricultural practices. Again, the question "to what purpose" arises and this Key Move needs a phrase pointing towards something like: 'better achieving the vision of counteracting climate change and deterioration by uninformed use." This failure increases doubts about the understanding and actual intentions of the Council in regard to environmental assets management for the purpose of enhancement of these assets.

Many key recommendations of the Community Panel (including the one pointed out in my comment on the Vision) have been ignored in this GWMP or sidelined, so it cannot be claimed that these Principles include those recommendations, as it is claimed on page 19 of this Draft GWMP. Another key recommendation was that the current GWMP should serve as a basis for an updated plan. This did not happen. If it had there would have been included in this Draft New GWMP details revealed by review of the previous GWMP which would point to successful principles, goals and actions of the past GWMP that ought to be acknowledged and included in the current GWMP, as well as those which did not produce the intended outcomes and how they could be improved. The ten Principles listed are mostly vague, 'feel good' terms which give little or no information on how implementation will occur, by whom, how and by whom they will be monitored and evaluated. The values of the Council mentioned in the headings are equally vague. In fact, some of these values, as they are revealed in various parts of the document, are of concern, as they seem to repeatedly divert from the main purpose of a GWMP as directed by the State Government. Leadership Again, these are just a list of fuzzy, feel good statements, some of which have already been demonstrated not to be true of this Council. Particularly nothing is said about Council's intention to lead the community in the preservation and enhancement the Green Wedge. An important part of Leadership is to acknowledge people's dedicated commitment and service to the shared vision. In

this document there is no acknowledgement of the many years of committed scientific and anecdotal research, knowledge gained and "hard yakka" working with the land, it's soil, waterways, flora and fauna by a range of community groups and government departments, in or surrounding Nillumbik that have tirelessly preserved and enhanced the Green Wedge. There is no clear statement of intention to draw upon this knowledge and experience. And in fact, many of these groups were not even consulted in the preparation of this Draft GWMP, or if they were, they were not acknowledged. Who did prepare the GWMP is also not acknowledged. This belies the stated intention to demonstrate transparency, respect, collaboration and strong relationships with community and other levels of government. It ignores the well identified actions and policies already known to prevent irreversible harm to the environment and those currently being developed, not mentioned in the Sustainability and the Precautionary Principle section. This gives rise to questioning the grasp that Council and the preparers of the GWMP have on the preservation of the Green Wedge. The State Government's guiding principles for preparation of a GWMP (PPN 31) are also in many respects, have been ignored in the preparation of this Draft GWMP. This belies the statement under the Whole of Shire Approach section that the Council accepts that "overall planning is controlled by the state government," as well as statements under Collaboration and Connectedness claiming "recognition of dependencies between Nillumbik, other communities and other levels of government." No other Green Wedge communities or groups are mentioned as having been consulted. Manage change for future benefits and Social Equity raise the question of what kinds of changes are being referenced and who receives the benefits? The references to changes to planning regulations and what is called "balance" of environmental and private needs that occur later in the GWMP under objectives and actions are very concerning. Aboriginal Voice There is not even a hint how this learning is intended to take place, or from whom. No mention of Aboriginal groups or individuals working in this field of bushfire management, or environmental flora and fauna preservation and enhancement. Safety, well-being and resilience as are described are of course desirable as is Conserving and Enhancing Heritage.

Goals Goal 1: Engaged connected communities (preserving the Green Wedge) The words 'preserving the Green Wedge' should be added. There a many flowery words about people, but very little demonstration that the Council or the preparers of the GWMP have any idea of who are the people and groups already committed and having acted for years and years with many thousands of hours of volunteer work preserving the Green Wedge to date. Not a single one of the many volunteer organisations is mentioned. Most of the Objectives and Actions under Goal 1 are reasonable. However, of great concern and unacceptable is the dot point on page 21 "brokering opportunities with state government...to leverage change." The same goes for the following statements on page 22 regarding, "change and land uses, including housing or economic development, and 're-examining constraints concentrating any new housing within townships." These are statements which flag Council intends to work toward planning regulation changes which would weaken Green Wedge protections, even though the Council states, "Changes to Municipal laws are not proposed," and even though consideration of such planning changes were not cited or recommended by the majority of the Community Panel as needing to be considered for preserving and enhancing the Green Wedge.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

Goal 2: Active and creative people I'm not quite sure why this is the title of this section. It could more appropriately be titled something like "Preserving our Green Wedge supports active and creative people" Most of the Objectives and Actions are fine. Key action A.2.7 is unacceptable, in its inclusion of the phrase "allowing prohibited uses" which should be edited out.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments Goal 3 should read: Safe and healthy biodiverse environments "Healthy and safe communities enjoy living in our iconic green wedge environment." This statement below the goal should read something like: "Our iconic Green Wedge environment contributes to the health and well-being of residents and visitors alike." On page 29 "no net loss to biodiversity, deer management strategy" – all

good, (but what is meant by "balance between protection and how we use the land?") Page 29 is fine except for this reference to this kind of 'balance' concept raises alarm bells warning of a Council's intention to weaken protections. This has been encountered again and again in Green Wedge Councils. Again, page 31 brings in "thinking differently" but how? "adaptive yet balanced in outcomes" again raises alarm bells. Usually when Councils talk about balance, they mean balancing private interests in promoting development with environmental protections. With this kind of thinking, environmental deterioration is virtually guaranteed. A3.9 indicates Council intends "a future review of the Nillumbik Planning Scheme consider identified landscape character and quality through the current policies and overlays that apply." I'm not even sure what that statement means? It doesn't make sense. The only meaning I can gather is that Council intends to review the Nillumbik Planning Scheme in order to make changes mentioned on page 29 and 31. This is a subversion of what a GWMP should be supporting.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4? Goal 4: A prosperous economy Again, I'm confused as to why this is a goal for the GWMP. It is certainly desirable for the Shire. Perhaps it should read, "Preserving the Green Wedge contributes to a prosperous economy." O.4.4 Certainly, the effect of horses on land should be well documented and managed, so the Council developing a sustainable management of the equine community is welcome. A4.8 is of great concern and is another point which confirms Council's intention to weaken environmental protections in favour of business interests by 'altering planning controls.' This is a section requiring detailed clarification as to which planning controls the Council proposes altering and in which way and why? Again, this was not a recommendation of the majority Community Panel.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership Should read something like: Responsible leadership towards preserving the Green Wedge and proactively preventing climate deterioration "Collaborative and consultative leadership that builds trust and makes the best use of available resources to the benefit of all in the pursuit of excellence." This phrase appearing under Goal 5 is also strange in that it proposes to build trust but contains nothing about what is most important in a GWMP – the environment – and it ends in a

virtually meaningless phrase "the pursuit of excellence," a phrase so vague as to increase distrust. The issue of polarisation of strongly held views was stated as if these views were equally represented in the community, whereas the greater majority argues for maintaining regulation and enforcement because this is how the Nillumbik Green Wedge has been successfully maintained to the level it is so far. The word 'many' used in this paragraph is too vague and misleading. In this respect this is not "Responsible Leadership" and increases polarisation and misunderstanding of the value of regulation and enforcement to all in the community. Regulation has been sustainable, contrary to the statement on page 40. Definitely education, raising awareness and facilitation are in themselves empowering. However, empowering a minority of landowners with private visions for their own benefit over that of the greater good, is not desirable and not "Responsible Leadership" for an inclusive and cooperative management of the Green Wedge. Definitely bringing people together and providing them with knowledge skills and a shared understanding - particularly of Green Wedge fragility and complexities - in a humanistic way is very desirable in helping them accept the regulations and the values they support and how they are personally benefited by the greater good produced by the preservation and enhancement of environmental natural spaces, flora, fauna and biodiversity, and how they can contribute to these values. Contrary to the statement on page 40, "Places are created by people" the opposite is true. Places draw people to them. Especially Green Wedge places. People can maintain and enhance Green Wedges, but they already existed naturally and were 'created' by people only in the sense of recognition of their value, naming and protecting them. Very concerning is the statement: "Further examination is warranted to determine whether the current application of the zones to private land hinders any of the objectives of this plan, particularly in relation to the promotion of agriculture and tourism, the consolidation of population around townships and the management of the rural areas on the fringe of the Urban Growth Boundary. "If the GWZ is working, as is subsequently stated, why is further examination warranted? Also very concerning is the statement that requiring a planning permit for cleared land is an inhibitor to the GWMP's objectives. This is not true. Requiring a planning permit does not remove people's right to farm or have a tourism activity in conjunction with farming. It just means these people, like everyone else in the Shire require a planning permit for development activities on the land – even private property. Even renovations require planning permits, so why not changes to land use? If the changes are positive according to protections then - no worries the permit will be approved. A planning permit process allows neighbours and Council to assess the possible broader effects of such changes and if they are desirable, not invasive or destructive. Removal of requirement for planning permits opens the door to unwanted land use changes. Actions A5.6, A5.7, and especially A5.8 are very concerning, not recommended by the Community Consultation and again pointing to Council's intention to make changes not supportive to preserving the environment . At the very end of a very long and complex document A5.8 states outright and most specifically Council's intention to 'reform of green wedge policy and planning provisions." How many individuals attempting to give feedback would have the stamina to engage with all these complexities right to this very final revelation? This statement and revelation of Council's intention undermines all the positive statements for preserving and enhancing the Green

Wedge, made previously in this Draft GWMP. It runs counter to all previous effective Green Wedge protections. It gives rise to questioning what is really meant by 'management.' My dictionary states the meaning of the word is 'control.' It also states the original, underlying or 'archaic' meaning of the word 'management' is 'trickery' or 'deceit.' Hopefully this interpretation will be corrected by a more transparent process, involving more input by environmental protection specialists in community and government bodies into the next draft of the GWMP.

I own a 20 Acre block on and would like to thank Nillumbik Council for this opportunity that allows the land owners and the other residents of Nillumbik to give feedback on the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan. To maintain focus, this response will only attempt to address my four primary concerns that I believe should be more rigorously addressed by the new Plan. 1) I congratulate council for involving the community in the formulation of the plan and for clearly identifying to all readers that 79 per cent of our green wedge is actually privately owned by landowners who represent 25% of the total community. Surely in a democratic society such as ours shouldn't the rural land owners therefore have 79% representation to the Council for issues concerning the overall green wedge with a potential 100% involvement with purely rural green wedge matters? 2) From my experience, since buying my property almost 7 years ago, without exception, all the land owners I have met have demonstrated an overwhelming level of care for the environment, in its entirety, not just for the endangered flora and fauna that can be found on their land. They also fully recognise that the preservation of human life should be of paramount importance in a bushfire prone area such as ours. This attitude should be of paramount importance throughout the Plan. The draft plan makes reference to many of the issues facing rural residents, including bushfire mitigation and climate change, however there appears to be little identification of specific actions, directions or assurances that residents will have the right to rebuild their home should it be destroyed by a disaster. As stated on page 30 of the Plan: "Victoria is becoming hotter and drier, facing more periods of extreme heat and drought, reductions in annual rainfall and increases in intense rainfall events. Extreme weather events such as bushfire and flooding are becoming more frequent and severe." The above statement strongly reinforces my next issue. 3) The need for an immediate change in the current legislation that is being used to prevent or prolong the rebuilding of disaster damaged homes and should: • mitigate the existing risks presented to the owners and residents of green wedge properties of not being able to attain planning permission to rebuild • improve and simplify the permit application process for green wedge properties and • reduce the time and cost of the permit application processes across the entire rural green wedge The full trauma of bushfire risk must be hard to envisage by just watching the television news. The true reality was brought into stark relief for me and my family during the three occasions when we chose to evacuate our home, not knowing if it would be there on our return!!! On one of these occasions the fire passed less than 300m from our house. It was therefore very disturbing for me to read just recently that since the destruction of their home on Black

Saturday, now over 10 years ago, that one Nillumbik family is still striving to rebuild their family home. This is a disgrace and the legislation preventing their reconstruction should obviously be removed or severely modified. Since moving into our property, without doubt, the most negative overall aspect has been that generated by the "green activists" who seem to be totally focused on the removal of all landowners' rights to manage their own properties, increasing the likelihood of home loss due to bushfire whilst reducing the possibility of rebuilding (for example C81 and C101) and ultimately turning Kangaroo Ground into a national forest. Since Aboriginal times, the area has been managed to be a mix of open plain/pasture and bush which accounted for the first white settlers naming it Kangaroo Ground because of the ideal combinations of shelter and pasture which allowed the animals to flourish. Therefore: 4) Finally, I also believe the new plan should endeavour to: • reduce and reject the number of malicious and distressing objections currently received by council and VCAT to rural green wedge planning permit applications. • reduce the number of permit applications that are being referred to VCAT and • ensure that the bureaucratic processes associated with living in the rural green wedge are made more simple and fit for purpose. The rural landowners are those who are burdened with the bulk of responsibility for resourcing most actions associated with the management of the green wedge. Those same residents and landowners should be supported by the law to enable them to carry out those incumbent responsibilities.

Engaging the community is important but should be framed in the context of environment protection. The shire was set up to be a conservation shire with the Green Wedge as its strategic focus. 'How can we maintain and reinvigorate the environment?' should be the focus rather than 'What can we get out of the land?' Working together to mitigate climate change is important. Green Wedge areas have

specific needs different to land in a normal rural shire and this must be made clear.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 2? Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2? Green space is an important determinant of health. The shire's biodiversity is an important feature of this and should be given high priority. Dialogue with traditional custodians is important.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

The importance of conserving all indigenous vegetation, both on public and private land, should be stressed. 'Balance' is used widely, however if environmental values are not uppermost other activities will inevitably suffer in the longer ter. Bit by bit land clearing and grazing leaves plants and animals vulnerable to ever increasing stress and disappearance. Most land is 'disturbed' which does not mean it should be allowed to further degrade. An extensive public education campaign regarding biodiversity, ecosystems, bushfire reduction strategies, climate change etc and their interdependence should be included here.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Neutral

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4?

Overall environmental protection must be the clear focus. Economic activities must be assessed and altered in response to latest science and the urgent need for environmental protections. Goal 4 should be renamed A prosperous Green Wedge economy. Support for local agriculture is important but the obvious link between sustainable agricultural practices, climate change mitigation and a healthy Green Wedge must be central to the GWMP. This draft does not clearly show how sustainable land management practices will be encouraged as is required by State Planning. This draft suggests that no permit would be required to start farming in the Rural Conservation Zone if the land has been previously cleared and farmed. Terminology needs to be

clearer defined. Permits should be required. The draft must state that tourism developments must be 'in conjunction' with agricultural uses. This is stated in the Planning Scheme and is necessary to lessen the likelihood for inappropriate development. Horses and other hard hoofed animals have a negative effect on the environment. Actions, including education of those involved with those animals must be implemented.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

Responsible stewardship requires that the land, its diverse ecosystems and waterways are passed on in a better state. Council must educate residents and lead the way.

This draft suggests that the Rural Conservation Zone be redefined to only cover areas of higher conservation values putting at risk scattered pockets of remnant bush or sole trees which are actually in greater need of protection. Climate change mitigation should be included. Council should provide education on a range of sustainable, environmentally friendly living practices. It is council's role to significantly contribute to educating residents regarding the protection and care of biodiversity and to provide the resources to enforce policy standards. The draft proposes changes to land uses in the GW which could erode the values of the GW and effectively increase the spread of residential and commercial development outside the urban Growth Boundary. The UGB should remain as a hard line. The draft should recognize the role Nillumbik can play

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

As the Green Wedge has been the best maintained out of all of the Green Wedges outside of Melbourne it needs to be protected and enhanced. The strongest message from the initial community consultation and the panel report was that Nillumbik residents and the population of wider Melbourne cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. This message must lay the foundation for any GWMP. This draft does not. The GWMP must reaffirm the shire's conservation role with the GW as its strategic focus. This draft consistently fails to do this. It lacks significant detail and omits significant objectives, relevant actions and accountability measures that would ensure the long term health and purpose of the GW. There is concerning lack of detail throughout the document regarding the protection and enhancement of the shire's biodiversity in all its forms and varying quality.

Clearly defined actions need to be included to ensure the long term health of the GW. Invasive species must be better addressed — It is essential that discussion be backed by current science, particularly with regard to the need for environmental repair and preservation and urgent climate mitigation.

It appears that Council has failed to follow State Government policy requirements in the preparation of the GWMP. This throws into question the entire document and associated processes. Planning Practice Note 31 describes specific requirements for the development of a GWMP, including the establishment of a Project Steering Group chaired by Council with key stakeholder representatives. This did not occur. • This draft fails to clearly articulate an Implementation Plan based on clearly stated Objectives and Actions and the Council Department responsible for implementation. As stated in the State Government's Planning Practice Note 31, 'Each GWMP will set out a series of actions and measures that need to be undertaken, and identify resource requirements, roles and responsibilities, timelines, outcomes and evaluation.' The current GWMP has much greater detail than this new draft, and should be used as a basis for improvement. Click here for Planning Practice Note 31. For a comparison to the draft GWMP, Click here for the current GWMP . • • • • Each of the 'Five Key Moves' contain potentially useful ideas depending on how they are applied, and there needs to be much greater emphasis on the care of the natural environment. The document needs to describe in much greater detail the ACTIONS to be taken, and each of these must prioritise best environmental practice, ensuring the protection of ALL native vegetation and fauna across the Shire. Every descriptor needs to clearly indicate how it will contribute to the protection and reinvigoration of biodiversity for the long term. The current GWMP 2010 -2025 describes in much greater detail (than the new draft) the ways Council and community will ensure the protection of the green wedge. However there has been consistent net loss of vegetation. This demonstrates that any new plan must be stronger and clearer about the actions which will be taken to reverse this ongoing decline. The draft GWMP does not achieve this.

Each Principle is a very broad statement and it is unclear how they will be interpreted and applied while ensuring care for the environment. The Principles need to reflect the community's commitment to protecting the Green Wedge. The GWMP must describe how the values of the Green Wedge will be prioritised in keeping with the State Government's policies Plan Melbourne 2017-2050 and Protecting Victoria's Environment - Biodiversity 2037, which is 'Victoria's plan to stop the decline of our native plants and animals and improve our natural environment so it is healthy, valued and actively cared for.' An additional Principle that focuses on Preservation of Environment and Biodiversity, and describes the urgent need to reverse the decline of biodiversity and effects of climate change should be added to the GWMP. Biodiversity Protection should be given the status of a Goal in the Plan. As with the 'Five Key Moves', the outlined Principles contain potentially useful ideas but there needs to be greater emphasis on the protection of the environment. For example, the principle that says, 'The green wedge is a changing environment and home to many people. The thrust of Goal 1, to engage the community, is important but must be framed in the context of the environmental protection aim as stated in 1994 when the Local Government Review Board declared that the new Shire of Nillumbik was to be a conservation Shire with the Green Wedge as its strategic focus. • The plan must state more clearly that the Shire and Green Wedge areas have particular needs that are different to those in an area not established as a Green Wedge. The new plan presents an opportunity to highlight and expand the role of the whole community in stewardship of the land. This needs to be clearly stated and emphasised, as we ask ourselves, 'How can we maintain and reinvigorate the environment?', rather than 'What can we get out of the land?'. • The community as a whole must come together to ensure serious action is taken to mitigate climate change and draw down carbon emissions. This is a top priority for how we live together as a community – our collective wellbeing depends on it, as does the environment.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

• The Objectives and Key Actions for Goal 2 must clearly and strongly focus on ensuring Nillumbik's biodiversity is top priority. As stated in the draft plan, green space is an important determinant of health, not just because it enables physical activity but also because it has been shown to promote higher levels of mental wellbeing and social connectedness. • In order to better manage the natural environment of the Shire, greater

dialogue must be generated and maintained with the Traditional Custodians of the area. This is vital for the health of the whole community and the environment in which we live. A Key Action of Goal 2 must focus on this.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3? The GWMP needs to more strongly acknowledge the importance of ALL indigenous vegetation and address the urgent need to conserve it THROUGHOUT the Shire, on private and public land. The community must work together to focus on increasing habitat for wildlife and connectivity; preserving biodiversity; valuing what ecosystems provide; developing a 'systems view' (that ALL is interdependent); address the climate change and extinction crises, and the need to transform to an ecologically sustainable society. This must become the underpinning ethos that guides the Actions and all other aspects of the plan, without compromise. • Goal 3 repeatedly uses the language of 'balance', and this needs to be amended as it indicates that our thinking is oppositional. It implies that there is a need to trade-off environmental health against other considerations, while international, national, and state government reports indicate that we must prioritise the health of our environment. For example, A3.12, p 33, speaks of balancing amenity, environmental considerations, private water extraction and community considerations. What needs to take place is a prioritisation of environmental considerations, as without optimal environmental health, all other activity and considerations will be constrained. • The use of stocktakes and studies [see A3.1, p32] that describe some areas of vegetation as more significant or valuable than others is alarming as it can lead to greater degradation of the environment which is already under pressure. The majority of the Shire's ecosystems are already 'disturbed' because of mismanagement, and this means we must change our ways. Every Objective and Action ought to aim for preservation and reinvigoration of the environment. One of the greatest threats to the Shire is 'death by a thousand cuts', where bit by bit land clearing and grazing leave our flora and fauna vulnerable to ever- increasing stress and disappearance. In turn this also places greater pressure on our community's overall well being. • An additional Action must be to undertake a massive public education campaign about biodiversity, the value of ecosystems, care for natural landscapes, bushfire risk reduction through understanding the ancient role of fire in the landscape, the significance of the Green Wedge, climate change and their interdependence.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

This section must clearly focus on overall environmental protection. Economic activities must be assessed and altered in response to latest science and the urgent need for environmental protections. This must be reflected in the title of the Goal, the Actions, and throughout the plan, for example, 'A prosperous eco-friendly Green Wedge economy'. • Support for local agriculture is important but must always provide for the continuing health of the environment. New systems that respect and promote regenerative farming including water conservation, Indigenous knowledge, and indigenous flora and fauna must be encouraged. The obvious link between sustainable agricultural practices, climate change mitigation and a healthy Green Wedge, must be central to the GWMP. • The need for a framework that encourages sustainable land management practices is described in the State Government's Planning Practice Note 31, entitled 'Preparing a Green Wedge Management Plan', and so this has to be clearly demonstrated in any GWMP. This current draft does not achieve this requirement. • The draft suggests that to start farming in the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) no permit should be required if the land has been previously cleared and used for farming. This definition of 'cleared land' needs greater detail - much of Nillumbik has been cleared at some stage, but thanks to regeneration it holds significant environmental qualities. Permits are essential as they can ensure any agricultural activities respect the land. It also means that residents will be informed about the piggery etc proposed for next door. • This draft must mention the fact that tourism developments in the Green Wedge need to be "in conjunction" with agricultural uses, as stated in Section 55 of the planning scheme. This clause of the planning scheme decreases the likelihood of inappropriate development. • Horses and other hard-hoofed animals have a negative impact on the environment - none of Australia's native animals have hard hooves. Impacts on habitats include erosion, water quality degradation, damage to flora, and spreading of weeds. Actions must be implemented to prevent these impacts. These must include education of the equine sector and other graziers. There needs to be greater understanding and responsible ownership of animals, ensuring that animals do not enter waterways and are not allowed to graze in the bush. This focus on environmental care must also be reflected in the proposed Nillumbik Equine Strategy.

Responsible stewardship also asks that the land, its diverse ecosystems and waterways, are passed on in a better state. Council must educate residents about

these matters, and lead the way by increasing revegetation of indigenous flora throughout the Shire. • This draft plan suggests the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) is too restrictive of farming practices and this zoning should only be applied to land with higher conservation values. This suggestion puts at serious risk flora and fauna across a significant proportion of the Shire, whether as single trees in paddocks or scattered pockets of remnant bush. These are all vital and in need of greater care and protection, not less. • Responsible Leadership should have a section dealing with climate change mitigation in accordance with the precautionary principle. • Council ought to provide education and free, easily accessible advice to residents on a range of topics such as 'avoid - reduce - reuse - recycle', reducing meat-consumption, buying local produce and growing your own, responsible waste disposal, reduction of car-dependence, benefits of native vegetation etc. • This Goal in its entirety must place much greater emphasis on the need to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation.' (Refer 1st item in Appendix 1 of draft GWMP - Plan Melbourne 2017-2050). It is Council's responsibility to make significant contributions to the education of residents for the protection and care of biodiversity. Alongside education, it is essential that appropriate resources are allocated to the enforcement of policy standards. Nillumbik's Biodiversity Report outlines the ongoing loss of native vegetation and part of the problem is inadequate enforcement. • Key Action A5.6 and A5.7 [page 40 of the draft] propose changes to how land within the Green Wedge can be used. This has the potential to erode the values of the Green Wedge and effectively increase the spread of residential and commercial development outside the Urban Growth Boundary. The UGB must be treated as a hard boundary. • The GWMP needs to recognise the leading role that Nillumbik can play; that we can be part of the solution, acting locally to address global problems. We're a relatively affluent population. Nillumbik is the perfect place to start turning things around. If not here and now, where and when?

Other comments

The strongest message from the initial community consultation and the Panel Report is that Nillumbik residents and the population of wider Melbourne cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. This message must lay the foundation for any new GWMP. The current draft does not achieve this. • The Green Wedge Management Plan must reaffirm the Shire's conservation role with the Green Wedge as its Strategic Focus. This draft consistently fails to do this. It lacks detail and omits significant objectives, relevant actions, and accountability measures that would ensure the long-term health and purpose of the Green Wedge. • Declines in biodiversity are at critical levels, and there is urgent need for action by all levels of government and society. The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) states that,

"The health of ecosystems on which we and all other species depend is deteriorating more rapidly than ever. We are eroding the very foundations of our economies, livelihoods, food security, health and quality of life worldwide. It is not too late to make a difference, but only if we start now at every level from local to global". • There is a worrying lack of detail throughout the document regarding the protection and enhancement of the Shire's biodiversity in all its forms and varying quality. Clearly defined actions need to be included which will address this problem to ensure the long term health of the Green Wedge. • The impact of invasive species – flora and fauna – is significant and this must be better addressed. • The draft speaks of polarised and diverse views and how conversations must be respectful and robust. It is vital that this is the case, and is supported by current science, particularly in relation to the need for environmental repair and preservation, and urgent climate change mitigation. • It is necessary that we uphold the highest of professional standards throughout the Shire and its Leadership.

I have a lifelong connection to Nillumbik and the Green Wedge, having grown up on a semi-rural property in Hurstbridge. I now live just outside the Green Wedge but visit it regularly to see friends, family, and to enjoy the shire's unparalleled parks and waterways. I support the Council having a development plan, but am concerned that the plan as currently drafted is largely expressed in generalities, reducing its utility as a document to guide future planning in the shire. On the whole, the plan lacks in detail and substance, and it is difficult to discern where Council's priorities lie. This gives the impression that through the plan, the Council is attempting to be "all things to all people", rather than identifying Council's priorities for the future of the shire. This is a missed opportunity. I also believe that Council has missed an opportunity to focus on the Green Wedge's key asset (the environment), and set out a clear and concise vision of how the council will prioritise the natural environment and ensure it is maintained for the benefit of future generations. I am particularly concerned by open-ended references to "balancing" environmental protection against other factors, for example the reference to the "need" to "find the right balance between protection and how we use land" (Goal 3). Failing to make environmental protection the Council's first priority creates a risk that the

Green Wedge's key asset is irreversibly damaged at the cost of pursuing an elusive, poorly defined "balance" between environmental protection and other factors.

We need only look at the large scale development in nearby growth suburbs, such as South Morang and Whittlesea, to see how quickly open spaces can be closed in, to the ever lasting detriment of native flora and fauna.

Move 1: Sounds reasonable but I'd need to know what the main purpose of the service would be. Move 2: Completely downgrades the importance of the natural environment and implies it will be traded-off against other considerations like, emergency management, economic development, agriculture etc. "Robust conversations", under the current council, implies a tough new line on environmental matters in favor of development/landowner interests. Move 3: Sounds reasonable, but given the draft Vision statement I'd be worried how the 'conversations program' would be managed and directed; what its priorities would be; whether the main purpose would be environmental sustainability or something else. Move 4: Given some other objectives and actions in this draft Plan, I'm wary about how this service for townships would be used. i.e. would it include a township expansion plan which would mean an erosion of the Green Wedge? Move 5: A stock-take which suggests that agricultural activity and hobby farming are just as valuable and in need of protection as 'environmental assets', where the purpose of the RCZ zone prioritises conservation, is highly provocative. This 'Key Move' seeks to undermine the purpose of a state-mandated land use zone which has helped to protect our Green Wedge for many years. Neither 'agricultural activity' nor 'hobby farming' are in any way whatsoever under threat and in need of 'protection'. If the Vision statement unambiguously prioritised environmental sustainability, then I wouldn't question this Principle. But it does need to be questioned. Likewise, what does 'future benefit' mean? Benefit for who or what? Benefit for a noisy minority who own land in the Green Wedge; benefit for all Nillumbik residents; benefit for Melbourne, the Green Wedge landscape and biodiversity? Further information is needed.

Again, the objectives and key actions are mostly uncontroversial but with several important exceptions: There is nothing in this section about discouraging further residential development of undersized lots, and nothing about not compromising environmental, landscape or neighborhood character values; and nothing about retaining township character and boundaries. Action A1.6 assumes that land in our green wedge of sufficient size, should be developed with a dwelling. This ignores the zone requirements that makes dwellings conditional on environment protection. Action A1.7 opens the way for 'buffer' areas around the UGB on rural land which must be rejected because it would compromise the amenity of our Green Wedge. Action A1.9 should emphasize that infrastructure and transport improvements must not urbanize what is meant to be a non-urban area.

Further information required: Mostly the objectives and key actions are uncontroversial with one exception: Action A2.7 includes, 'allowing prohibited uses of heritage places if....."(they) are in line with planning policy objectives." What objectives would justify allowing a prohibited use? This lacks transparency and obviously needs further clarification. Why the ambiguity?

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3? 03.1: Protection and enhancement of biodiversity and habitats needs to extend beyond just what is 'valuable'. 03.2: This objective should be under Goal 1 because it's about communities. 03.3: This is about community safety so it should also be under Goal 1.

03.4: ditto 03.5: A worthy objective but should include biodiversity, and should have a matching Action which achieves this objective. It doesn't. 03.6: Council should share responsibility for catchment improvement. Why not? A3.1: See comments on Five Key Moves, Move 5. There is no explanation as to why agriculture and hobby farming in the Green Wedge need to be protected. From what? A3.2: The ESOs have already been reviewed under previous council. Why waste more money in another review? A review should not be "subject to the findings of A3.1". Action 3.2 suggests agriculture and hobby farms should not be subject to the requirements of the zone control - i.e. conservation ensured by an ESO overlay. Where significant habitat exists, 'protecting' hobby farms from ESOs undermines Planning Scheme provisions and the Rural Conservation Zone. A3.3: See previous comments on Move 2 (above). Suggests decisions will be made by officers in a non-transparent manner, where 'community resilience' is the priority. 'Robust discussions' are sure to downgrade the importance of environment protection given all the competing considerations. A3.5: Worthy actions when taken at face value, but, in the context of the limit placed on ESO applications (A3.1 and A3.2) and the reluctance to use regulation as a control, this action is very unlikely to address the extent of biodiversity decline. A3.6: Why isn't climate change mitigation a part of this action? The Green Wedge acts as a carbon sink so vegetation protection and wise management could assist to slow climate change. Why no mention of mitigation? A3.9: Landscape protection won't be achieved through 'the current policies and overlays that apply'. This action responds to the demands of a small minority of shire residents who campaigned against C81. It sells out the public interest.

Farming in the Green Wedge is permitted of course, so why do we need 'a right'? This is really about avoiding environment protection conditions of permit which is necessary in the RCZ zone. So it's an attack on our planning scheme. This is not the role of a Green Wedge Management Plan. A4.3: See comments on Key Move 5 (above). Agriculture and hobby farming are compatible with the RCZ zoning where biodiversity and habitat are protected as well. That's what the zone is for. A4.8: See previous comments about the 'right to farm'. This action is an attack on zone controls which are fundamental for a sustainable green wedge. This action seeks to undermine Planning Scheme provisions which is not the role of a GWMP.

A5.3: See previous comments on Key Move 3. A5.5: See previous comments on Key Move 5. This action seeks to undermine zone provisions/controls which is not the role of a GWMP. A5.6: A review of current zoning will undermine sustainability of the green wedge. This attacks the Planning Scheme. Provocative! A5.7: This action is questioning the UGB as a hard edge. The UGB is a fundamentally important element of the Green Wedge. A5.8: It's inappropriate to be advocating radical changes to our Planning Scheme.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

It's been disappointing in the extreme to see council officers ignoring community feedback and survey results which clearly showed the majority wanting to see environmental protection for the Green Wedge. Council ended up turning the community panel process into something of a farce when a submission (it wasn't a minority report) by just 5 panel members was given more credibility than the community panel report supported by 80% and more. It's been clear that council has been determined to bring in a GWMP which will get the approval of a small group of landowners, regardless of how the rest of the community feels. Government guidelines (Plan Melbourne and Practice Note 31) appear not to have been complied with, and there's been no external oversight of the review process. The community panel repeatedly requested that the panel should be reviewing the current GWMP. This request was listened to, then largely ignored by the consultants. Senior management clearly approved of this. A disillusioning process all round.

I am most concerned about the many references to "ageing in place" peppered throughout the draft Plan. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention defines aging in place as "the ability to live in one's own home and community safely, independently, and comfortably, regardless of age, income, or ability level. Most adults would prefer to age in place that is, remain in their home of choice as long as possible. In fact, 90 percent of adults over the age of 65 report that they would prefer to stay in their current residence as they age". The minority group of 5 and the author of the draft Plan have hijacked the term to suit their own purposes. If you take Hurstbridge for example, there is very little flat land, close to transport and facilities suitable for diverse housing, and I would imagine this would also apply to the other green wedge townships. Developers are not attracted to lower their profit margin by building single storey, accessible housing, so all recent developments have been multistorey units, unsuited to retirement living. The assumption is that land outside the Urban Growth Boundary will need to be rezoned to accommodate building diverse housing or retirement living, when in fact very few would be seeking this sort of accommodation "Dependent Persons Unit Ageing in place is hampered by a lack of housing diversity. The planning provisions state that for both Green Wedge Zone and the Rural Conservation Zone only a single dwelling is allowed per lot. The State's planning policy encourages new housing to be developed in existing urban areas that have access to services, facilities and are accessible by public transport. Councils are now expected to produce a housing strategy for the whole municipality that identifies its housing needs and how it intends to meet them. For Nillumbik, this will need to consider the specific housing needs of an ageing population and different housing options to allow people to remain in the Shire (age-in-place). Additional housing in rural areas beyond subdivision controls would be contrary to State policy. Council regularly receives enquiries regarding subdivision of land which is prohibited as the lots are below the minimum sub-division requirements. In some cases the enquiry has been raised to support ageing residents remain in place with adult children moving into the family home, and taking responsibility for managing the land and buildings. In these cases, a potential solution may be the use of a Dependent Persons Unit (DPU) defined in the planning scheme as - "a moveable building on the same lot as an existing dwelling and used to provide accommodation for a person dependent on a resident of the existing dwelling" In reality the Positive Ageing Strategy has not come to grips with preparing a diverse housing plan and certainly has not taken into account that Ageing In Place refers to older residents remaining in their existing homes as long as possible, probably with the assistance of a Commonwealth Care package. Any subdivision by stealth on RCZ land should be banned Any discussion of ageing in place should be removed from the draft Plan until a Shire wide Housing policy is formulated. Living in Nillumbik was a deliberate choice for my husband and I. We moved here in December 2008 from Fitzroy with a 10 month old baby and a second due only months away.

The green wedge was the attraction. We wanted to live in an area that had the benefits of both access to 'the big city' and the bush.

I grew up in country NSW and had lived on a hobby farm for part of my childhood outside Bathurst. My father commuted into Bathurst to his job and my siblings and I would catch two buses for the hour plus trip to school and then the hour plus trip home at the end of the day.

I loved the trees, the kangaroos, the possums, the goannas, the shingle backs and blue tongue lizards and all the birds. We had horses, a milking cow, chickens, a vegetable garden, and neighbours who were fulltime farmers. We had plenty of fresh air and open space.

I learned the importance of conserving water (as we drank and bathed and washed in what fell from the sky). I learned the importance of community during the hardship of bushfires and drought. I learned about nature and native fauna and flora. I learned about the environment and the beauty of the bush. I learned about the importance of standing up to protect what you love. In the 1980's the Federal Government wanted to turn much of the land between Bathurst and Orange into an Army Base to be used for Army training and military and munitions exercises. This was thwarted by the public protest of a small group of farmers and families like mine who cared deeply for where we lived and the lifestyle we loved.

Now all these years later, I feel that where I live and the lifestyle we love is under threat. When we moved to Nillumbik, I believed we were living in the Green Wedge, the lungs of Melbourne. I felt a strong connection to the rural townships, the residents on properties and the 91% of the shire that is zoned Green Wedge. I felt that Eltham was part of the Green Wedge and was surprised to discover only last year that it technically it wasn't. Despite the various definitions of zones, (urban, green wedge, green wedge A, special use and rural conservation zones) Nillumbik residents I speak with feel strongly about protecting the Green Wedge especially it's rural conservation zones.

1. I am very concerned with this draft Green Wedge Management Plan and it's push to "new productive land uses". This fear is based on witnessing the accelerated urban growth in neighbouring Whittlesea Shire in Doreen along Yan Yean Road right across Donnybrook Rd to Kalkallo and the replacement of rural land with housing. 79% of our Nillumbik Green Wedge is under private ownership. I believe there is an intention by many of these private owners to push for rezoning of their land to cash in on this development bonanza. I believe there is push by this Council for rates revenue over Green Wedge protection.

This draft plan and its' goals, objectives and key actions, to me reads more of enhancing human activity in the Green Wedge than of protecting the Green Wedge. Of major concern to me are statements that look to weaken the Rural Conservation Zones in Nillumbik. p40 "Further examination is warranted to determine whether the current application of the zones to private land hinders any of the objectives of this plan, particularly in relation to the promotion of agriculture and tourism, the consolidation of population around townships and the management of the rural areas on the fringe of the Urban Growth Boundary". Will Council be adding a statement to the GWMP to enshrine the Green Wedge boundary? In the 1970's it was said that Eltham North Primary School would only ever be a small rural school. That could be said now of Christmas Hills Primary School. What will it be like in 40years time? Will the land around it be built up built out as have been the orchards, chicken, pig farms and natural landscapes of Templestowe, Eltham, Eltham North, St Helena, Sherbourne, Diamond Creek? Eltham North Primary School is now an overcrowded suburban school. It is up to us to protect our valuable natural assets.

2. I am enormously worried about the removal of tree canopy across Nillumbik, especially in our urban areas following the 2009 bushfires. Whilst I understand the need

to mitigate for bushfires I see in reality the removal of trees on a daily basis for increased housing, roads and lifestyle. The lungs of Melbourne are slowly being chopped down and our ground is being cemented over affecting water absorption back into the soil. There are plenty of reports regarding the importance of trees to lowering temperatures, providing habitat and oxygenating our air. Melbourne has the lowest tree canopy of Australian capital cities with a canopy of only 13%. I don't believe this draft plan provides adequate protection.

- 3. The first statement in this draft plan is an Acknowledgement of traditional owners. "Nillumbik Shire Council acknowledges the Wurundjeri people who are the Traditional Custodians of Land known today as Nillumbik. We pay respect to the Elders both past and present and extend that respect to other Indigenous Australians." This draft plan concerns me as I see no evidence of involvement of Wurundjeri in the development of this plan. Whist the plan speaks of collaboration and connectedness, unlike Yarra Ranges Shire, Nillumbik Shire Council has no Indigenous Advisory Committee. I see Wurundjeri and other First Nations people as significant stakeholders critical to the management of the Green Wedge. On p19 the draft plan states "Aboriginal Voice: We have much to learn from our First people, particularly about caring for country" yet there appears no way for First Nations people to have input into how land in Nillumbik is managed into the future. I relish the natural landscape in Nillumbik especially around Watson's Creek and Christmas Hills. The GAWA Trial is located at Watson's Creek and my visits to this special space which honours Wurundieri cultural history is routinely impeded by the sounds of motorbikes from the property across the road. What efforts has Council undertaken to involve Wurundjeri and Aboriginal Voice in the development of this plan and the implementation of zone changes and "new productive land uses"? Protection of cultural heritage, especially indigenous heritage is important to me and many others in Nillumbik. Plan Melbourne 2017-2050 re Cultural Heritage requires the plan "Provide for the protection and management of sites of Aboriginal and post-European settlement cultural heritage to ensure that links with the past are preserved for present and future generations to appreciate". I don't see adequate provision for this in the draft plan.
- 4. Environmental and biodiversity assets once gone cannot be replaced. Nillumbik Shire Council proudly states on Facebook that 400 native wildlife species call Nillumbik home. I have concerns that this draft plan fails to ensure adequate protection for native and endangered flora and fauna. What efforts have been taken to include input from Water authorities, Environmental & biodiversity authorities and the relevant State Government planning departments into this draft plan?
- 5. As the Green Wedge Management Plan will "inform the future of the Council Plan, Municipal Health & Wellbeing Plan and the Municipal Strategic Plan", I have great concerns over the way this draft plan could be interpreted by current and future Councillors and Council Officers in ways that damage our Green Wedge by pushing for commercial and economic advantage over environmental leadership. This is a time for local leadership for global advantage as our world faces a climate crisis. Below is an

article reported in The Guardian 8 August 2019 titled Climate crisis reducing land's ability to sustain humanity, say IPCC. UN report finds ecosystems never before under such threat and restoration is urgent.

"The climate crisis is damaging the ability of the land to sustain humanity, with cascading risks becoming increasingly severe as global temperatures rise, according to a landmark UN report compiled by some of the world's top scientists.

Global heating is increasing droughts, soil erosion and wildfires while diminishing crop yields in the tropics and thawing permafrost near the poles, says the report by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

Further heating will lead to unprecedented climate conditions at lower latitudes, with potential growth in hunger, migration and conflict and increased damage to the great northern forests.

The report, approved by the world's governments, makes clear that humanity faces a stark choice between a vicious or virtuous circle. Continued destruction of forests and huge emissions from cattle and other intensive farming practices will intensify the climate crisis, making the impacts on land still worse.

However, action now to allow soils and forests to regenerate and store carbon, and to cut meat consumption by people and food waste, could play a big role in tackling the climate crisis, the report says.

Such moves would also improve human health, reduce poverty and tackle the huge losses of wildlife across the globe, the IPCC says".

6. My final concern has been the push by this Council to fast track a new GWMP when a current plan is in place. I believe this plan needs to have a long-term view like the Plan Melbourne Plan 2017-2050. This draft GWMP states that "It is intended that it provide direction over the next decade" p43 and p43 also states "the plan is intended to be one of the most important in Council's strategic planning hierarchy and will be intrinsic to its way of doing business rather than standalone as yet another plan competing for resources." On this basis, the GWMP needs to have a long-term view and one that focuses on our climate crisis.

Where is the detail or key actions? One cannot make an informed decision when there is a worryingly lack of detail. Environmental protection and reinvigoration must be central to the Vision for the Green Wedge. The draft does not state this strongly enough, despite it being a Strategic Focus for the Shire. Appendix 1 of Council's draft quotes the State Government's 'Plan Melbourne 2017-2050', where the first priority for the Green Wedge is to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation." Council's initial community engagement clearly demonstrated that the large majority of Nillumbik residents cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it maintained, protected and enhanced. This view was also expressed by the majority report of the Community Panel. Council's draft does not reflect strong enough support for the Community's position.

The thrust of Goal 1, to engage the community, is important but must be framed in the context of the environmental protection aim as stated in 1994 when the Local Government Review Board declared that the new Shire of Nillumbik was to be a conservation Shire with the Green Wedge as its strategic focus.

The Objectives and Key Actions for Goal 2 must clearly and strongly focus on ensuring Nillumbik's biodiversity is top priority. As stated in the draft plan, green space is an important determinant of health, not just because it enables physical activity but also because it has been shown to promote higher levels of mental wellbeing and social connectedness. In order to better manage the natural environment of the Shire, greater dialogue must be generated and maintained with the Traditional Custodians of the area. This is vital for the health of the whole community and the environment in which we live. A Key Action of Goal 2 must focus on this.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

The GWMP needs to more strongly acknowledge the importance of ALL indigenous vegetation and address the urgent need to conserve it THROUGHOUT the Shire, on private and public land. The community must work together to focus on increasing habitat for wildlife and connectivity; preserving biodiversity; valuing what ecosystems provide; developing a 'systems view' (that ALL is interdependent); address the climate change and extinction crises, and the need to transform to an ecologically sustainable society. This must become the underpinning ethos that guides the Actions and all other aspects of the plan, without compromise.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

Not enough detail outlined to make an informed decision. This section must clearly focus on overall environmental protection. Economic activities must be assessed and altered in response to latest science and the urgent need for environmental protections. This must be reflected in the title of the Goal, the Actions, and throughout the plan, for example, 'A prosperous eco-friendly Green Wedge economy'. Support for local agriculture is important but must always provide for the continuing health of the environment. New systems that respect and promote regenerative farming including water conservation, Indigenous knowledge, and indigenous flora and fauna must be encouraged. The obvious link between sustainable agricultural practices, climate change mitigation and a healthy Green Wedge, must be central to the GWMP

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

Not enough detail outlined to make an informed decision. Stewardship of the land is mentioned in the draft plan, and its role must be better defined in Goal 5, Responsible Leadership. It needs to explain that Nillumbik residents have an obligation to care for the land, not degrade it, and this must be for the entirety of their tenure. Responsible stewardship also asks that the land, its diverse ecosystems and waterways, are passed on in a better state. Council must educate residents about these matters, and lead the way by increasing revegetation of indigenous flora throughout the Shire. This draft plan suggests the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) is too restrictive of farming practices and this zoning should only be applied to land with higher conservation values. This suggestion puts at serious risk flora and fauna across a significant proportion of the Shire, whether as single trees in paddocks or scattered pockets of remnant bush. These are all vital and in need of greater care and protection, not less. This Goal in its entirety must place much greater emphasis on the need to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation.' (Refer 1st item in Appendix 1 of draft GWMP - Plan Melbourne 2017-2050). It is Council's responsibility to make significant contributions to the education of residents for the protection and care of biodiversity. Alongside education, it is essential that appropriate resources are allocated to the enforcement of policy standards. Nillumbik's Biodiversity Report outlines the ongoing loss of native vegetation and part of the problem is inadequate enforcement.

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

I want my children to grow up in a clean environment, with clean energy, clear air and an abundance of natural wonder. Please do not take this away from future generations. The strongest message from the initial community consultation and the Panel Report is that Nillumbik residents and the population of wider Melbourne cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. This message must lay the foundation for any new GWMP. The current draft does not achieve this. The Green Wedge Management Plan must reaffirm the Shire's conservation role with the Green Wedge as its Strategic Focus. This draft consistently fails to do this. It lacks detail and omits significant objectives, relevant actions, and accountability measures that would ensure the long-term health and purpose of the Green Wedge. Declines in biodiversity are at critical levels, and there is urgent need for action by all levels of government and society. The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) states that, "The health of ecosystems on which we and all other species depend is deteriorating more rapidly than ever. We are eroding the very foundations of our economies, livelihoods, food security, health and quality of life worldwide. It is not too late to make a difference, but only if we start now at every level from local to global". There is a worrying lack of detail throughout the document regarding the protection and enhancement of the Shire's biodiversity in all its forms and varying quality. Clearly defined actions need to be included which will address this problem to ensure the long term health of the Green Wedge.

I do not support this, as I once again am not given enough detail to make an informed choice. The thrust of Goal 1, to engage the community, is important but must be framed in the context of the environmental protection aim as stated in 1994 when the Local Government Review Board declared that the new Shire of Nillumbik was to be a conservation Shire with the Green Wedge as its strategic focus. The community as a whole must come together to ensure serious action is taken to mitigate climate change

and draw down carbon emissions. This is a top priority for how we live together as a community – our collective wellbeing depends on it, as does the environment.

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2? I do not support this, as I once again am not given enough detail to make an informed choice. The Objectives and Key Actions for Goal 2 must clearly and strongly focus on ensuring Nillumbik's biodiversity is top priority. As stated in the draft plan, green space is an important determinant of health, not just because it enables physical activity but also because it has been shown to promote higher levels of mental wellbeing and social connectedness. In order to better manage the natural environment of the Shire, greater dialogue must be generated and maintained with the Traditional Custodians of the area. This is vital for the health of the whole community and the environment in which we live. A Key Action of Goal 2 must focus on this.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3? I do not support this, as I once again am not given enough detail to make an informed choice. The GWMP needs to more strongly acknowledge the importance of ALL indigenous vegetation and address the urgent need to conserve it THROUGHOUT the Shire, on private and public land. The community must work together to focus on increasing habitat for wildlife and connectivity; preserving biodiversity; valuing what ecosystems provide; developing a 'systems view' (that ALL is interdependent); address the climate change and extinction crises, and the need to transform to an ecologically sustainable society. This must become the underpinning ethos that guides the Actions and all other aspects of the plan, without compromise. An additional Action must be to undertake a massive public education campaign about biodiversity, the value of ecosystems, care for natural landscapes, bushfire risk reduction through understanding the ancient role of fire in the landscape, the significance of the Green Wedge, climate change and their interdependence.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

I do not support this, as I once again am not given enough detail to make an informed choice. This section must clearly focus on overall environmental protection. Economic activities must be assessed and altered in response to latest science and the urgent need for environmental protections. This must be reflected in the title of the Goal, the Actions, and throughout the plan, for example, 'A prosperous eco-friendly Green Wedge economy'. Support for local agriculture is important but must always provide for the continuing health of the environment. New systems that respect and promote regenerative farming including water conservation, Indigenous knowledge, and indigenous flora and fauna must be encouraged. The obvious link between sustainable agricultural practices, climate change mitigation and a healthy Green Wedge, must be central to the GWMP.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5?

I do not support this, as I once again am not given enough detail to make an informed choice. Stewardship of the land is mentioned in the draft plan, and its role must be better defined in Goal 5, Responsible Leadership. It needs to explain that Nillumbik residents have an obligation to care for the land, not degrade it, and this must be for the entirety of their tenure. Responsible stewardship also asks that the land, its diverse ecosystems and waterways, are passed on in a better state. Council must educate residents about these matters, and lead the way by increasing revegetation of indigenous flora throughout the Shire. This draft plan suggests the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) is too restrictive of farming practices and this zoning should only be applied to land with higher conservation values. This suggestion puts at serious risk flora and fauna across a significant proportion of the Shire, whether as single trees in paddocks or scattered pockets of remnant bush. These are all vital and in need of greater care and protection, not less. This Goal in its entirety must place much greater emphasis on the need to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation.' (Refer 1st item in Appendix 1 of draft GWMP - Plan Melbourne 2017-2050). It is Council's responsibility to make significant contributions to the education of residents for the protection and care of biodiversity. Alongside education, it is essential that appropriate resources are allocated to the enforcement of policy standards. Nillumbik's Biodiversity Report outlines the ongoing loss of native vegetation and part of the problem is inadequate enforcement. Key Action A5.6 and A5.7 [page 40 of the draft] propose changes to how land within the Green Wedge can be used. This has the potential to erode the values of the Green Wedge and effectively increase the spread of residential and commercial development

outside the Urban Growth Boundary. The UGB must be treated as a hard boundary. The GWMP needs to recognise the leading role that Nillumbik can play; that we can be part of the solution, acting locally to address global problems. We're a relatively affluent population. Nillumbik is the perfect place to start turning things around. If not here and now, where and when?

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

As a young woman concerned by the climate emergency, I urge the Council to please take leadership in conservation and protect our future. The strongest message from the initial community consultation and the Panel Report is that Nillumbik residents and the population of wider Melbourne cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. This message must lay the foundation for any new GWMP. The current draft does not achieve this. The Green Wedge Management Plan must reaffirm the Shire's conservation role with the Green Wedge as its Strategic Focus. This draft consistently fails to do this. It lacks detail and omits significant objectives, relevant actions, and accountability measures that would ensure the long-term health and purpose of the Green Wedge. Declines in biodiversity are at critical levels, and there is urgent need for action by all levels of government and society. The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) states that, "The health of ecosystems on which we and all other species depend is deteriorating more rapidly than ever. We are eroding the very foundations of our economies, livelihoods, food security, health and quality of life worldwide. It is not too late to make a difference, but only if we start now at every level from local to global". There is a worrying lack of detail throughout the document regarding the protection and enhancement of the Shire's biodiversity in all its forms and varying quality. Clearly defined actions need to be included which will address this problem to ensure the long term health of the Green Wedge. The impact of invasive species – flora and fauna – is significant and this must be better addressed. The draft speaks of polarised and diverse views and how conversations must be respectful and robust. It is vital that this is the case, and is supported by current science, particularly in relation to the need for environmental repair and preservation, and urgent climate change mitigation. It is necessary that we uphold the highest of professional standards throughout the Shire and its Leadership

Thank you for the opportunity to give feedback on the Green Wedge Management Plan. I applaud council for involving the community in shaping the future plan and for recognising that 79 per cent of the green wedge is privately owned. Council has referenced many issues facing rural residents, including bushfire mitigation and climate change although it appears there is little in the way of direct action proposed, rather a lot of 'robust conversation' anticipated. Moving into the idyllic rural area of Kangaroo Ground over six years ago my family were somewhat naïve about the inherent dangers of a bushfire prone area. We have since had a dramatic learning curve involving several evacuations and become more proficient in identifying risks through CFA home assessments and workshops. Not knowing if you will have a house to return to when evacuating because of bushfire certainly sharpens the mind to risks and ways to mitigate them! We have found our fellow landowners to be as passionate as ourselves in their care for their environment, their knowledge of flora and fauna and their desire to preserve our precious piece of paradise. Slashing, weeding, and maintaining our 20 acres of land has given an excellent understanding and appreciation of those we share it with – the kangaroos, swamp wallabies, wombats, kookaburras, wedge tails eagles, the list goes on. I believe that working hands on with our properties gives us a unique relationship with our land, something that those who live outside the wedge cannot share, no matter how 'green' they may believe themselves to be. We want to know that council is doing everything it can to save lives, human and animals, in the event of a bushfire. Should the worst happen and we lose everything in a fire we want to know we have the right to re-build on site without the trauma of planning permits and consents which could leave us homeless for years. Therefore the two issues I want council to address more thoroughly are the mitigation of bushfire risks and housing security. One of the five goals for managing the green wedge is 'Safe and Healthy Environments' and one of the challenges cited in the plan is 'The risk of bushfires and the need to manage land to reduce its impacts.' I support the creation of a comprehensive landowners information and support service as one of the five key moves. I am heartened to see on page 29 under Environmental Conservation that council wishes to promote and support environmental care and stewardship by assisting private landowners in best practice

land management, acknowledging they own the majority of land and vegetation in the green wedge. Council clearly accepts and understands the dangers posed by climate change as stated on page 30 'Adapting to a changing climate and our bushfire prone environment, Victoria is becoming hotter and drier, facing more periods of extreme heat and drought.. Our biggest natural threat within the green wedge is bushfire and it extends beyond our boundaries.' I believe reducing those dangers is the greatest responsibility council needs to address in the Green Wedge Management Plan. Formulating policies to help landowners safeguard their homes and properties and providing a fast track to re-building and recovery in the event of disaster. As council so clearly recognises, the green wedge covers 40,000 hectares and 79 per cent of it is owned by 25 per cent of Nillumbik's population. Objective 1.1 recommends 'enabling our people to take greater shared responsibility for the future of the green wedge.' As responsible landowners privately owning almost 80 per cent surely that combined shareholding should have an equally large voice with council on the future care of the green wedge whilst non-green wedge residents should have a proportionately smaller involvement? We live in the wedge, we are the ones impacted by the decisions made for its future. We need to have a major voice in that future whilst being trusted to continue maintaining and preserving its natural beauty and providing safe homes and environments for our families

I further believe that the distinction between urban dwellers and landowners should be made right up front not simply in (perhaps) 'engaged, connected communities'. Why do I say this, because in your own Plan the Green Wedge is largely owned privately (p.12 and 79% in key data) and yet has far fewer residents than the urban areas. Consequently, it will always be seen as a minority voice in important decisions that will impact on their way of life, their amenity, their concern for the environment, and their ability to maintain the landscape in a changing climate with an increased threat of larger and more severe bushfires. This is not about community consultation but about endangered human life, and that of our wild animals.

The principles are fine. The conservation and enhancement of our heritage of the Green Wedge is particularly important in that includes recognition of our heritage in relation to culture and art and to the open spaces, largely made up of agricultural land interspersed with bushy slopes, with state parks, creeks, and the Yarra River and the people and fauna and flora who inhabit them. These points must not be forgotten. It is our heritage not the green wedge of imagination, or recently settled urban people, and even of so-called 'friends' who have no part in the heritage at all, but who fill in a name and an outside address at a tourist event. While we are providing hay for wombats and their babies in broad daylight because it has been such a difficult year in terms of rain and subsequent lack of nutritious feed, tourists are apparently without control shooting wombats for sport in an adjoining municipality. Feral deer must be controlled as they have destroyed flora in so many of our rural areas, for example, orchids and understorey in Smiths Gully. This requires to be included more explicitly in Key Actions.

These are generally reasonable, except perhaps for 'off setting' in dot point 4 of rural living, which can become an impost in monetary terms which could then be open to abuse and not achieve the intended outcome. I strongly support protection of human life from bushfire (under state planning framework in Goal 1). In Key Actions A1.6: I strongly support this objective and Council being enabled to carry it out. Could a similar Key Action be put in place for those people who lose their house through bushfire so that they are assisted by Council Planners to rebuild within a reasonable time and at a sensible cost should the planning demands have been changed, the dwelling might be smaller to accommodate new requirements and so reduce cost in consultation with the owners. The Plan mentions resilience often but resilience is not always possible after such a traumatic experience. Council must assist this resilience not condemn it and consequent reduced mental health.

I do have some problem with, in dot point two of A3.5, the actual designation of Friends Groups which as I have explained above can be meaningless in actual commitment and local residence and knowledge. There should be a requirement that friends groups are recognised to the extent that they are made up of residents who have a legitimate say in the Green Wedge Plan. The Bushfire Occurence map and timeline is particularly useful as are all of the maps provided in the

Plan.

Similarly, an explanation for the need for such 'stocktaking' and data gathering and maintaining, is not really provided. I am not aware of this coming up in the session I attended. It will also be expensive and not necessarily conducive to better practices, and from whose point of view. I strongly oppose this key action as it is written. Surely existing laws cover inappropriate behaviour on private land.

For this to occur there must be an emphasis on protecting human life and a tolerance for the knowledge and love about and for the life styles and undertakings of those who actually live there. 



There are several problems I have with the Vision. One is that the statement seems to be solely Nillumbik-resident focused by the use of "...living in the landscape...". The Nillumbik Green Wedge, being one of the most intact of all the 12 Green Wedges, should be framed as a region for all Melbournians (and others) to experience and enjoy, especially given the desire to foster tourism to the region. Another problem is that the statement lists 'environmental' together with other considerations as if they are of equal importance. In fact social and economic well being in the shire depend upon the well being of the natural environment. Thus environmental sustainability (which, given the deterioration currently occurring, should mean its reinvigoration) must be central to the Vision for the Green Wedge. Highlighting this would make the Vision more consistent with the State Government's 'Plan Melbourne 2017-2050', referenced in Appendix 1 of the draft GWMP, which states the first priority for the Green Wedge is to "Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation."

Key Move 2 - It is becoming clearer as time goes on that Climate Change is the main driver of increased frequency and intensity of natural extreme events, droughts, heat waves, biodiversity loss etc. As a result Key Move 2 on resiliency should give far more prominence to mitigating Climate Change rather than just 'addressing' it as part of a list of different natural phenomena. There is much that the GWMP can do to improve awareness and encourage action on ways to improve Shire resilience in the face of climate change and this key move should reflect this.

Key Move 3 - The idea of a conversations forum is very worthwhile, but, given that this action is repeated several times throughout the draft plan, I think the wording needs to emphasise the aim of achieving what is in the best interests of the Nillumbik green wedge as a whole, and the important facilitation and moderation role of council in such a forum, as part of the leadership it provides.

Key Move 4 - Agree with the idea but needs further articulation as 'planning and place management service' is not obviously understandable.

Key Move 5 - It appears somewhat disingenuous that this information is not already available to council, given the number of studies that have been commissioned or referenced in the previous GWMP. This move would sound more credible if it were to say that the wealth of disparate information from previous studies will be updated and

consolidated into a database that will be maintained into the future. Also that the information contained within the database will be available not just to landowners but to shire residents generally. Everyone being informed can only lead to better policy formulation.

Do you have any comments about the Principles?

Some of these principles are good but wherever the natural environment is mentioned as part of a principle, it is usually in tandem with some other aspect, as if it only has significance as a sub-component combined with something else to make up a larger principle. Not only that but the use of the term 'environment' is somewhat open to interpretation for these principles (E.g. within Manage change for future benefit,

Conserve and enhance our heritage, Sustainability and the precautionary principle). Given that we are living in a time and country where climate change is on balance having a deleterious effect on our natural environment and biodiversity, there should be a standalone principle stating 'Conserve and enhance our natural native environment and biodiversity'. The three other principles mentioned previously should be reworded as follows:

Manage change for future benefit: "The green wedge is home to many people. Change will be managed in keeping with its conservation values and with a focus on long-term stewardship of the natural environment."

Conserve and enhance our cultural heritage: "The green wedge cultural heritage is an irreplaceable resource for the local and metropolitan community that needs to be conserved and enhanced."

Sustainability and the precautionary principle: "Solutions to problems need to be tailored to meet Nillumbik's unique social, economic and environmental needs now and into the future. We need to anticipate and avoid any actions that may cause serious or irreversible harm to the natural environment and the people who live within it."

Goal 1: Engaged connected communities

The thrust of Goal 1, to engage the community, is important but would be better framed in the context of the environmental protection aim as stated in 1994 when the Local Government Review Board declared that the new Shire of Nillumbik was to be a conservation Shire with the Green Wedge as its strategic focus.

The Draft GWMP would be better to state more clearly that the Shire and Green Wedge areas have particular needs that are different to those in an area not established as a Green Wedge. The new plan presents an opportunity to highlight and expand the role of

the whole community in stewardship of the land. This needs to be clearly stated and emphasised, as we who live in the region ask ourselves, 'How can we maintain and reinvigorate the environment?'.

The statements: "Outside of the major townships, housing is limited to one dwelling per allotment (plus a dependant person's unit) but is not always possible because the size and location of many smaller allotments will not allow compliance with state planning requirements to manage bushfire risk, retain vegetation, manage effluent or protect agricultural uses. Consolidation of lots is likely to become increasingly necessary to assemble sufficient land to manage all of the requirements for a new dwelling" is not obviously clear in meaning or intent to the reader and should be rewritten. Given that aggregation of lots is generally seen as a good thing in the context of a green wedge, and the population growth of Nillumbik shire as stated in this goal section is only 0.4% p.a., the issues being raised in these statements are not immediately obvious. Please make it clearer.

Key Action A1.2 - Implement Council's Nillumbik Volunteer Development Strategy 2015-2020. - Given that we are well into the second half of 2019 it would be good to elaborate a little on what this action point is about. What has happened since 2015 and what remains to be done through to next year? Otherwise this AP just looks late and outdated.

Key Action A1.6 - What is the rationale behind the statement: "Where appropriate and with owner consent, consider government purchase of such lots where they are adjacent to public land."? Do you mean for lots that can't be combined with other lots in order to have a dwelling? Please make this clearer.

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3? In Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments the Draft GWMP makes reference to Victoria's Climate Change Adaptation Plan 2017-2020 (the Adaptation Plan) which lays out a blueprint for action that will help our state meet the challenges and act on the

opportunities of climate change. The Draft GWMP states "The Victorian Government has put in place a new Climate Change Act 2017, established the Victorian Climate Change Framework and released Victoria's Climate Change Adaptation Plan 2017-2020. It will lead and broker regional and local response to climate change, including research and new partnership agreements with local government."

With respect to Victoria's Climate Change Framework Document, under 'The four pillars for emissions reduction', one of these pillars is 'Reduce non-energy emissions and increase carbon storage', further described as 'Change industrial processes and increase carbon storage in our natural environment'. One of these is 'Forestry and Soil'. Also, a critical part of this framework is a new Climate Change Act for Victoria, referred to as the cornerstone for action to 2050. In there it states "The proposed Act, replacing the Climate Change Act 2010, will create a strong and robust framework to help us achieve our 2050 vision. It will be the strongest state- based climate legislation in Australia." An essential part of this is Carbon Sequestration, involving soil and forest carbon sequestration on public and private land. It urges everyone to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and increase carbon sequestration in Victoria as far as possible.

Now, 20% of Nillumbik Green Wedge land area is categorised as agricultural land. The Draft GWMP makes much mention of Climate Change adaptation but very little if any mention of Climate change mitigation. There is significant potential for the GWMP to support CO2 sequestration in soil on Agricultural land, especially if regenerative farming techniques are encouraged to be used throughout the shire. The Draft GWMP places much emphasis on the 'Right to Farm' on existing agricultural land, which rightfully acknowledges the recommendation by the Community panel, yet despite the obvious win-win potential for farmers, environment (including soil, atmosphere), and consumers of the food or stock grown, there is no mention of this beneficial mitigation measure anywhere in the Draft GWMP. This is a serious omission and I suggest needs to be rectified. I would refer the GWMP author to the work of the Mulloon Institute(Tony Coote AM), Nicole Masters(The Regenerators), Charles Massy (Call of the Reed Warbler -A New Agriculture A New Earth), Stan Parsons(RCS), Allan Savory(ecologically based holistic grazing systems), Bruce Maynard('No Kill Cropping'), Colin Seis and Darryl Cluff and others in the regenerative farming area.

I would also point out that there is mention of CO2 sequestration in the council's 'Climate Change Action Plan 2016 – 2020', but it erroneously places this as a principle towards the bottom of the Carbon management hierarchy (Page 13) based on cost, and also narrowly concludes "There is insufficient land in Nillumbik available for planting to sequester significant quantities of greenhouse gases. Some sequestration projects are supported through the purchase of carbon offsets.". This conclusion completely ignores soil sequestration potential over the 20% of land area that is existing agricultural land in the Green Wedge.

What is even more surprising is that later in the same document (Page 41) under 'Residual Emissions' it states that Council would be willing to purchase products according to the National Carbon Offset Standard (NCOS). These products fund third party projects including those that sequester (remove) emissions from the air through

storage in vegetation or soil.

I strongly feel that in Goal 3 of the Draft GWMP (and in an updated Climate Action Plan) there should be a strong statement of council using the money they otherwise would have given to purchasing these offsets to encouraging, educating and supporting local GW farmers (or owners of existing agricultural lands) to regenerate their soils, get carbon credits (financial reward) via the NCOS scheme for doing so, and providing benefits for the environment, the community and their customers. I believe the criteria listed in the current Climate Change Action Plan would be satisfied for such activity, which are:

- o The project must provide abatement additional to that which would have occurred anyway, such as a requirement of a legislated scheme.
- o The project must provide permanent abatement of greenhouse gases.
- o The emission reductions must be measurable.
- o The emission reductions must be verifiable by an independent party.
- o Information about the project, methodologies used in calculations and monitoring of progress must be transparent and accessible to consumers.

I believe this would also be a a wonderful way of tapping into the Nillumbik Shire volunteer landcare and environmental groups to help resource programs to encourage, educate and assist farmers to implement regenerative farming techniques, improve soils and contribute to mitigating climate change, rather than just adapting to it. This could be one of the first agenda items for the proposed Green Wedge Conversations program.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Do not Support

This section should clearly focus on overall environmental protection as befits the GWMP. Economic activities must be assessed and altered in response to latest science and the urgent need for environmental protections. This should be reflected in the title of the Goal, the Actions, and throughout the plan, for example, 'A prosperous eco-friendly Green Wedge economy'.

This section should mention the fact that tourism developments in the Green Wedge need to be "in conjunction" with agricultural uses, as stated in Section 55 of the planning scheme. This clause of the planning scheme decreases the likelihood of inappropriate development.

For Objective O4.7 suggest change wording to "Strongly advocate government to make reliable mobile phone and internet access available across the Shire." Telecommunication and internet access infrastructure is a critical enabler of

allowing people to age in place within their communities, especially when transport constraints exist as they do in our shire.

For Action point A4.8 Bullet point 1 please refer to my feedback comments for Goal 5. If this bullet point implies removal of the RCZ overlay I do not agree with it. Instead there should be a streamlining of the permit allocation process. Also the definition of 'pre-existing cleared agricultural land' needs further qualification so as to exclude agricultural land that was once cleared but due to regeneration of natural flora over time now would require another round of clearing to make it suitable for new agricultural practice.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5? My main concerns with the content of Goal 5 are:

- This section highlights issues around regulation and its enforcement, then devotes almost all the rest of the preamble section to the objectives and actions, painting responsible leadership as being all about Land use planning and specifically advocating to the state government that removing the RCZ zoning and replacing it with something else (presumably GWZ) is the solution to regulation issues in the Green Wedge. This is certainly not what responsible leadership is about. In my view the entire section needs to be rewritten focusing on what characterises responsible leadership per se, and how Council will behave in exercising this style of leadership across the range of issues the GWMP is meant to address.
- On the issue of advocating for a change to the planning scheme it seems to me that in spite of the negatively toned wording in the draft GWMP, if the RCZ classification still allows for agricultural practice on previously cleared land provided a permit is obtained, then surely first the permit process should be looked at being made less onerous, before consideration given for more drastic measures such as a complete rezoning, especially if the RCZ overlay has so far served to protect areas of conservation value on private land. Also, the permit process provides a data recording mechanism so that changes in GW land use over time can be monitored and inform future review and formulation of policy as it applies to land use. The way this issue is discussed in Goal 5 unfortunately wreaks of throwing the proverbial baby out with the bathwater.
- I am also worried about the potential for further ill-feeling and community division that would likely result from council advocating for any RCZ rezoning. Observing what has recently unfolded in neighbouring Manningham local council area with regard to similar issues should be cause for reflection and caution on the part of our council, if they are wanting to exercise responsible leadership.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

As a general comment the draft GWMP structurally and content-wise does not place enough priority on protecting and enhancing the natural environment and biodiversity, in my view the most important reason why the state government set up the Green Wedges (GW) in the first place, and probably the most important reason for why most Nillumbik shire residents want to live in this region.

The fact that the 'The green wedge key data' section of the draft GWMP has no quantitative graphics showing environmental health-related statistics, such as historical trends in biodiversity, rainfall, vegetation cover, temperatures, soil health, pest plants and animals, humidity, GW land use types, habitat corridors etc., but overwhelmingly provides resident-related statistics, suggests an anthropomorphic bias, and I believe puts the draft GWMP out of step with the spirit and intent of having green wedges and GW Management plans. It also leaves the impression that not enough effort has been put into obtaining these important metrics that indicate the health of the Green Wedge environment, and that would have informed where priorities should be placed in the GWMP. I believe this is further reinforced by the fact that there is no dedicated section in this online form to provide feedback on the 'The green wedge key data' section.

Appropriate statistical graphics can be very informative and they catch the reader's eye. The absence of natural environment health-related statistics is a significant failing of this draft GWMP.

A Vision for Nillumbik's Green Wedge

'Management of the Nillumbik green wedge will lead the way in supporting a vibrant, resilient, connected and diverse community; living in the landscape to enhance the environmental, social and economic sustainability of the Shire.'

Do you agree with the vision for Nillumbik's Green Wedge?

Do you have any comments about the Vision?

I am concerned about the major lack of detail within the vision and the replacement of a better strategy with this much weaker "vision". I am frustrated that the council has sought out community engagement to understand what residents want for the green wedge but instead of appropriately basing the new vision on the feedback provided (by individuals generously donating their time, expertise, and travel costs to this exercise) they have chosen to largely ignore the feedback and develop a strategy which responds to a minority offshoot. Environmental protection and reinvigoration should be central to the Vision for the Green Wedge. The draft does not state this strongly enough, despite it being a Strategic Focus for the Shire. Appendix 1 of Council's draft quotes the State Government's 'Plan Melbourne 2017-2050', where the first priority for the Green Wedge is to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation." • Council's initial community engagement clearly demonstrated that the large majority of Nillumbik residents cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it maintained, protected and enhanced. This view was also expressed by the majority report of the Community Panel. Council's draft does not reflect strong enough support

for the Community's position. • The GWMP must reflect the fact that Nillumbik's Green Wedge is the most environmentally intact of Melbourne's Green Wedges, is a significant part of the wider Green Wedge system, and is for the benefit of everyone, whether they live in the area or not. • Climate change mitigation must be an overarching Goal for the GWMP and therefore must be addressed in the Vision. It must inform all objectives and actions such as regenerative agriculture, fire management, waste management, bush regeneration, education, and economic strategy. Throughout the draft, the repeated mention of just adapting to climate change leaves the reader with the impression that Council has basically thrown their hands up in the air suggesting there is nothing that they nor Nillumbik residents can do to tackle climate change. This is not true and must be part of every day action. • It is vital that Nillumbik demonstrates its respect of Indigenous people, their cultural heritage and knowledge. This barely gets a mention in the GWMP despite the fact that Indigenous people have ensured the vitality of the area's biodiversity for tens of thousands of years.

Do you have any comments about the Five Key Moves?

• It appears that Council has failed to follow State Government policy requirements in the preparation of the GWMP. This throws into question the entire document and associated processes. Planning Practice Note 31 describes specific requirements for the development of a GWMP, including the establishment of a Project Steering Group chaired by Council with key stakeholder representatives. This did not occur. • This draft fails to clearly articulate an Implementation Plan based on clearly stated Objectives and Actions and the Council Department responsible for implementation. As stated in the

State Government's Planning Practice Note 31, 'Each GWMP will set out a series of actions and measures that need to be undertaken, and identify resource requirements, roles and responsibilities, timelines, outcomes and evaluation,' The current GWMP has much greater detail than this new draft, and should be used as a basis for improvement. Click here for Planning Practice Note 31. For a comparison to the draft GWMP. Click here for the current GWMP . • Each of the 'Five Key Moves' contain potentially useful ideas depending on how they are applied, and there needs to be much greater emphasis on the care of the natural environment. • The document needs to describe in much greater detail the ACTIONS to be taken, and each of these must prioritise best environmental practice, ensuring the protection of ALL native vegetation and fauna across the Shire. • Every descriptor needs to clearly indicate how it will contribute to the protection and reinvigoration of biodiversity for the long term. • The current GWMP 2010 - 2025 describes in much greater detail (than the new draft) the ways Council and community will ensure the protection of the green wedge. However there has been consistent net loss of vegetation. This demonstrates that any new plan must be stronger and clearer about the actions which will be taken to reverse this ongoing decline. The draft GWMP does not achieve this

Do you have any comments about the Principles?

• Each Principle is a very broad statement and it is unclear how they will be interpreted and applied while ensuring care for the environment. • The Principles need to reflect the community's commitment to protecting the Green Wedge. The GWMP must describe how the values of the Green Wedge will be prioritised in keeping with the State Government's policies Plan Melbourne 2017-2050 and Protecting Victoria's Environment - Biodiversity 2037, which is 'Victoria's plan to stop the decline of our native plants and animals and improve our natural environment so it is healthy, valued and actively cared for.' • An additional Principle that focuses on Preservation of Environment and Biodiversity, and describes the urgent need to reverse the decline of biodiversity and effects of climate change should be added to the GWMP. Biodiversity Protection should be given the status of a Goal in the Plan. • As with the 'Five Key Moves', the outlined Principles contain potentially useful ideas but there needs to be greater emphasis on the protection of the environment. For example, the principle that says, 'The green wedge is a changing environment and home to many people. Change will be managed to conserve its values and with a focus on long-term stewardship.' could read, "The green wedge is a changing environment and home to many people. Change will be managed to conserve its biodiversity and environmental values and with a focus on long-term stewardship."

Goal 1: Engaged connected communities

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 1? Do not support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 1?

• The thrust of Goal 1, to engage the community, is important but must be framed in the

context of the environmental protection aim as stated in 1994 when the Local Government Review Board declared that the new Shire of Nillumbik was to be a conservation Shire with the Green Wedge as its strategic focus. • The plan must state more clearly that the Shire and Green Wedge areas have particular needs that are different to those in an area not established as a Green Wedge. The new plan presents an opportunity to highlight and expand the role of the whole community in stewardship of the land. This needs to be clearly stated and emphasised, as we ask ourselves, 'How can we maintain and reinvigorate the environment?', rather than 'What can we get out of the land?'. • The community as a whole must come together to ensure serious action is taken to mitigate climate change and draw down carbon emissions. This is a top priority for how we live together as a community – our collective wellbeing depends on it, as does the environment.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 2? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2?

• The Objectives and Key Actions for Goal 2 must clearly and strongly focus on ensuring Nillumbik's biodiversity is top priority. As stated in the draft plan, green space is an important determinant of health, not just because it enables physical activity but also because it has been shown to promote higher levels of mental wellbeing and social connectedness. • In order to better manage the natural environment of the Shire, greater dialogue must be generated and maintained with the Traditional Custodians of the area. This is vital for the health of the whole community and the environment in which we live. A Key Action of Goal 2 must focus on this.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3?

The GWMP needs to more strongly acknowledge the importance of ALL indigenous vegetation and address the urgent need to conserve it THROUGHOUT the Shire, on private and public land. The community must work together to focus on increasing habitat for wildlife and connectivity; preserving biodiversity; valuing what ecosystems provide; developing a 'systems view' (that ALL is interdependent); address the climate change and extinction crises, and the need to transform to an ecologically sustainable society. This must become the underpinning ethos that guides the Actions and all other aspects of the plan, without compromise. • Goal 3 repeatedly uses the language of 'balance', and this needs to be amended as it indicates that our thinking is oppositional.

It implies that there is a need to trade-off environmental health against other considerations, while international, national, and state government reports indicate that we must prioritise the health of our environment. For example, A3.12, p 33, speaks of balancing amenity, environmental considerations, private water extraction and community considerations. What needs to take place is a prioritisation of environmental considerations, as without optimal environmental health, all other activity and considerations will be constrained. • The use of stocktakes and studies [see A3.1, p32] that describe some areas of vegetation as more significant or valuable than others is alarming as it can lead to greater degradation of the environment which is already under pressure. The majority of the Shire's ecosystems are already 'disturbed' because of mismanagement, and this means we must change our ways. Every Objective and Action ought to aim for preservation and reinvigoration of the environment. One of the greatest threats to the Shire is 'death by a thousand cuts', where bit by bit land clearing and grazing leave our flora and fauna vulnerable to everincreasing stress and disappearance. In turn this also places greater pressure on our community's overall well being. • An additional Action must be to undertake a massive public education campaign about biodiversity, the value of ecosystems, care for natural landscapes, bushfire risk reduction through understanding the ancient role of fire in the landscape, the significance of the Green Wedge, climate change and their interdependence.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4?

• This section must clearly focus on overall environmental protection. Economic activities must be assessed and altered in response to latest science and the urgent need for environmental protections. This must be reflected in the title of the Goal, the Actions, and throughout the plan, for example, 'A prosperous eco-friendly Green Wedge economy'. • Support for local agriculture is important but must always provide for the continuing health of the environment. New systems that respect and promote regenerative farming including water conservation, Indigenous knowledge, and indigenous flora and fauna must be encouraged. The obvious link between sustainable agricultural practices, climate change mitigation and a healthy Green Wedge, must be central to the GWMP. • The need for a framework that encourages sustainable land management practices is described in the State Government's Planning Practice Note 31, entitled 'Preparing a Green Wedge Management Plan', and so this has to be clearly demonstrated in any GWMP. This current draft does not achieve this requirement. • The draft suggests that to start farming in the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) no permit should be required if the land has been previously cleared and used for farming. This definition of 'cleared land' needs greater detail - much of Nillumbik has been cleared at some stage, but thanks to regeneration it holds significant environmental qualities. Permits are essential as they can ensure any agricultural activities respect the land. It

also means that residents will be informed about the piggery etc proposed for next door.

• This draft must mention the fact that tourism developments in the Green Wedge need to be "in conjunction" with agricultural uses, as stated in Section 55 of the planning scheme. This clause of the planning scheme decreases the likelihood of inappropriate development. • Horses and other hard-hoofed animals have a negative impact on the environment – none of Australia's native animals have hard hooves. Impacts on habitats include erosion, water quality degradation, damage to flora, and spreading of weeds. Actions must be implemented to prevent these impacts. These must include education of the equine sector and other graziers. There needs to be greater understanding and responsible ownership of animals, ensuring that animals do not enter waterways and are not allowed to graze in the bush. This focus on environmental care must also be reflected in the proposed Nillumbik Equine Strategy. Goal 5: Responsible lead • An additional Action must be to undertake a massive public education campaign about biodiversity, the value of ecosystems, care for natural landscapes, bushfire risk reduction through understanding the ancient role of fire in the landscape, the significance of the Green Wedge, climate change and their interdependence.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5?

• Stewardship of the land is mentioned in the draft plan, and its role must be better defined in Goal 5, Responsible Leadership. It needs to explain that Nillumbik residents have an obligation to care for the land, not degrade it, and this must be for the entirety of their tenure. Responsible stewardship also asks that the land, its diverse ecosystems and waterways, are passed on in a better state. Council must educate residents about these matters, and lead the way by increasing revegetation of indigenous flora throughout the Shire. • This draft plan suggests the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) is too restrictive of farming practices and this zoning should only be applied to land with higher conservation values. This suggestion puts at serious risk flora and fauna across a significant proportion of the Shire, whether as single trees in paddocks or scattered pockets of remnant bush. These are all vital and in need of greater care and protection, not less. • Responsible Leadership should have a section dealing with climate change mitigation in accordance with the precautionary principle. • Council ought to provide education and free, easily accessible advice to residents on a range of topics such as 'avoid - reduce - reuse - recycle', reducing meat-consumption, buying local produce and growing your own, responsible waste disposal, reduction of car-dependence, benefits of native vegetation etc. • This Goal in its entirety must place much greater emphasis on the need to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation.' (Refer 1st item in Appendix 1 of draft GWMP - Plan Melbourne 2017-2050). It is Council's responsibility to make significant contributions to the education of residents for

the protection and care of biodiversity. Alongside education, it is essential that appropriate resources are allocated to the enforcement of policy standards. Nillumbik's Biodiversity Report outlines the ongoing loss of native vegetation and part of the problem is inadequate enforcement. • Key Action A5.6 and A5.7 [page 40 of the draft] propose changes to how land within the Green Wedge can be used. This has the potential to erode the values of the Green Wedge and effectively increase the spread of residential and commercial development outside the Urban Growth Boundary. The UGB must be treated as a hard boundary. • The GWMP needs to recognise the leading role that Nillumbik can play; that we can be part of the solution, acting locally to address global problems. We're a relatively affluent population. Nillumbik is the perfect place to start turning things around. If not here and now, where and when?

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

The strongest message from the initial community consultation and the Panel Report is that Nillumbik residents and the population of wider Melbourne cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. This message must lay the foundation for any new GWMP. The current draft does not achieve this. • The Green Wedge Management Plan must reaffirm the Shire's conservation role with the Green Wedge as its Strategic Focus. This draft consistently fails to do this. It lacks detail and omits significant objectives, relevant actions, and accountability measures that would ensure the long-term health and purpose of the Green Wedge. • Declines in biodiversity are at critical levels, and there is urgent need for action by all levels of government and society. The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) states that, "The health of ecosystems on which we and all other species depend is deteriorating more rapidly than ever. We are eroding the very foundations of our economies, livelihoods, food security, health and quality of life worldwide. It is not too late to make a difference, but only if we start now at every level from local to global". • There is a worrying lack of detail throughout the document regarding the protection and enhancement of the Shire's biodiversity in all its forms and varying quality. Clearly defined actions need to be included which will address this problem to ensure the long term health of the Green Wedge. • The impact of invasive species – flora and fauna – is significant and this must be better addressed. • The draft speaks of polarised and diverse views and how conversations must be respectful and robust. It is vital that this is the case, and is supported by current science, particularly in relation to the need for environmental repair and preservation, and urgent climate change mitigation. • It is necessary that we uphold the highest of professional standards throughout the Shire and its Leadership.

The concept of the Green Wedge Conversations Program is worthwhile but the way that it is implemented is key, These forums could end up becoming a vehicle of we-them conflicts between rural landowners in the community and urban residents just as the overlay campaign prior to the last election was used to divide the community.

Action A1.10 needs considerable re-wording. Te link between internet access and mobile phone coverage and the development of ride-sharing and on-call transport services is very tenuous and probably not relevant to the role of Council. On the other hand advocating for improved internet access and mobile phone coverage are areas where the Council could legitimately play a role.

The Council's work on extension of the Diamond Creek Trail from Diamond Creek to

Hurstbridge receives a mention and the Council is to be commended for its efforts in this direction. However, the Council's consultation on this project appears to have been mainly with bicycle and horse riding groups; yet, the major users of the trail extension, once it has been completed, is likely to be walkers. Nillumbik hosts three bushwalking groups. At least one of the groups was asked for a letter of support for extension of the trail. However, as far as I am aware, there has been no consultation with any of the groups regarding the requirements of bushwalkers. The trail from Eltham to Diamond Creek has a hard surface. Walkers much prefer walking on soft surfaces. The high cost of the trail is partly accounted for by the cost of concreting the trail. The Main Yarra Trail is one of the most used trails in Melbourne and for large sections of that trail has a soft surface. It has been pointed out that it is planned that the Diamond Creek Trail extension will have a horse trail running parallel to the concrete path and that bushwalkers could also use that trail. However, the point being made here is that there has been no consultation with bushwalking groups even though walkers are likely to be the main users of the trail.

Extension of the Aqueduct Trail is also mentioned. The previous Council made significant progress on the Aquaduct Trail, opening up the section from Henley Road through to Calwell Road. However, there has been no further development in the life of the present Council. This is a soft-surface trail, which is much preferred by walkers, and so the cost of extending the trail is significantly less than the cost of extending the Diamond Creek Trail. The Council could therefore consider extending this trail in shorter annual stages rather that waiting until there is sufficient funding to complete several kilometres of trail.

The Nillumbik trails network map on page 28 is not up to date. There is a complete and much used trail around Sugarloaf Reservoir (This is under the control of Parks Victoria rathe than the Council and perhaps that is why it is not shown. However, in that case there should be a third type of trail shown on the map.) There is a trail between St Andrews and Smiths Gully along the Caledonia Goldfields. The part of the Aqueduct Trail in Kangaroo Ground which has already been completed is either not shown or only partly shown. Also, it appears that the planned extension of that trail is shown in the wrong location, unless it is anticipated that the aqueduct trail will depart from the aquaduct. The aqueduct runs south of Sugarloaf Reservoir, not north of it.

The discussion of bushfire risks makes no mention of two common causes of the most destructive bushfires in Victoria's recent history: the failure of landholders to maintain power lines over private property and firebugs. Responses to both of these risks could

be community based. However, the Draft Management Plan more of less assumes that there will be bushfires and seeks to reduce the risks when bushfires occur rather than reduce the risk of their occurrence in the first place.

Key Action A3.8 does not recognise that as a result of the introduction of the NBN communications may fail completely during extreme weather events. The issue that is being addressed here may need to be more thoroughly thought through.

Yet the present Council has distinguished itself by the extent to which it has eroded trust. Building trust is important and the necessity for this should be emphasised.

The section under the heading "Land Use Planning is rather concerning — particularly the comments related to the Rural Conservation Zone. The implication seems to be that whereas residents of the urban parts of Nillumbik require a permit to cut down large trees, landowners in the Rural Conservation Zone ought not to have to apply for a permit to engage in farming activity which might be mu much more destructive to the environment. The fact that a person needs to apply for a permit does not mean that the activity that the permit covers is likely to be disallowed, but it does mean that people can't act in total disregard for the consequences of their actions. The requirement for a permit gives Council the legal means of dealing with landholders who act in ways that disregard the rights of other members of the community.

It is also incorrect to state, as this section does, that one of the objectives of the GWMP is to promote "the right to farm". The objective is to promote farming, which is quite different. It is also not to promote all farming but to promote appropriate farming. This is a good of the lack of precision in wording which is evident throughout the draft plan.

If this is supposed to be the category of Objectives and Key Actions that will articulate the Conservation measures for the natural environment then I find it sadly lacking. Where is the Natural Resource Plan? Streamflow Management Plan? Climate Change Mitigation measures? This GWMP must detail the framework for managing change and prioritise actions that will facilitate the improvement of the environment. It is Councils job to ensure a high level of clarity and greater certainty for all stakeholders, including landowners. If this Plan is going to be effective then you must bring everyone along with it and this can only be achieved with specifics and clarity.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4?

This section failures to acknowledge that a suite of altered discretionary uses and protective measures have recently been added in GW Shires (Refer Amendments VC103, VC105, VC106, VC109). Instead of advocating for more changes to the planning provisions why wouldn't this plan work to find economic opportunities within the changed framework? Further attempts to change or add new Zones is inappropriate for this management plan. Align future directives within the parameters at hand. It is not in Nillumbiks best interests to pursue Actions and Objectives that are inconsistent with State Government policies, strategies and regulations for this GW shire. Seeking funding will be difficult for these aims.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

This Goal appears very similar in detailed content to Goal 4. Cooperatively working with all stakeholders and agencies within the current planning framework would provide for Responsible Leadership. Actively butting heads with the Planning Scheme makes everyone anxious and lobby groups get there expectations up that you'll be able to give them what they want. This is Irresponsible Leadership.

The whole GWMP would benefit from this Goal being applied even handedly across all

categories instead of it being listed as a separate aspiration. Your approach does not make good sense.

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A Vision for Nillumbik's Green Wedge

'Management of the Nillumbik green wedge will lead the way in supporting a vibrant, resilient, connected and diverse community; living in the landscape to enhance the environmental, social and economic sustainability of the Shire.'

Do you agree with the vision for Nillumbik's Green Wedge?

Do you have any comments about the Vision?

Environmental protection and regeneration should be central to the Vision. Nillumbik was originally set up as a conservation shire, with the Green Wedge as its focus. Conservation and regeneration should be emphasised in the GWMP and in this draft it is not.

Appendix 1 of Council's draft quotes the State Government's 'Plan Melbourne 2017-2050', wherethe first priority for the Green Wedge is to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation."

This draft plan does not reflect the community's wishes - and especially has ignored up to 50% of the Community Panel's recommendations. The Nillumbik community wants to see the Green Wedge better protected, and regenerated - this isn't reflected in the plan. Our Green Wedge is also important for the wider Melbourne community, as Victoria continues to lose biodiversity at an alarming rate, protecting Nillumbik's Green Wedge provides environmental and climate related services to all Melbourne communities. The GWMP should emphasis that our Green Wedge is the most intact of all 12, and requires extra conservation and regeneration because of that - as it's significant for

Victorian communities, including plant and animal communities.

Climate Change mitigation should be a much larger focus in the GWMP than it is in this draft. Climate Change is hardly mentioned in this draft, and when it is mentioned - only adaptation is considered, not mitigation. There is plenty that Nillumbik Council and community can do to mitigate Climate Change. For example, as the IPCC has recently emphasised in a report about Climate and land, degraded ecosystems become CO2 emitters, but when healthy provide carbon storage. By protecting and regenerating the Green Wedge, and emphasising regenerative carbon farming practices on Agricultural land, we can help to mitigate climate change and keep the surface of the land cool. It appears that Council has failed to follow State Government policy requirements in the preparation of the GWMP. This throws into question the entire document and associated processes. Planning Practice Note 31 describes specific requirements for the development of a GWMP, including the establishment of a Project Steering Group chaired by Council with key stakeholder representatives. This did not occur. This draft fails to clearly articulate an Implementation Plan based on clearly stated

Objectives and Actions and the Council Department responsible for implementation. As stated in the State Government's Planning Practice Note 31, 'Each GWMP will set out a series of actions and measures that need to be undertaken, and identify resource requirements, roles and responsibilities, timelines, outcomes and evaluation.'The current GWMP has much greater detail than this new draft, and should be used as a basis for improvement.

Each of the 'Five Key Moves' contain potentially useful ideas depending on how they are applied, and there needs to be much greater emphasis on the care of the natural environment.

The document needs to describe in much greater detail the ACTIONS to be taken, and each of these must prioritise best environmental practice, ensuring the protection of ALL native vegetation and fauna across the Shire.

Every descriptor needs to clearly indicate how it will contribute to the protection and reinvigoration of biodiversity for the long term.

The current GWMP 2010 -2025 describes in much greater detail (than the new draft) the ways Council and community will ensure the protection of the green wedge. However there has been consistent net loss of vegetation. This demonstrates that any new plan must be stronger and clearer about the actions which will be taken to reverse this ongoing decline. The draft GWMP does not achieve this

Do you have any comments about the Principles?

The language used across these Principles is too general. It is uncertain how the Principles could be interpreted when it comes to ensuring environmental protection.

The Principles have to be more specific, and represent the community's commitment to protecting and regenerating the biodiversity of the Green Wedge.

The GWMP must describe how the values of the Green Wedge will be prioritised in keeping with the State Government's policiesPlan Melbourne 2017-2050 and Protecting Victoria's Environment –Biodiversity 2037, which is 'Victoria's plan to stop the decline of our native plants and animals and improve our natural environment so it is healthy, valued and actively cared for.'

There should be an additional Principle specific to focusing on preservation of environment and biodiversity. It should describe how protecting the Green Wedge is urgently needed due to the decline of biodiversity state-wide. It should also reflect on climate change, and how biodiverse ecosystems are becoming our last hope at storing carbon, drawing down emissions and reducing fire risk by keeping the land surface cool. As with the 'Five Key Moves', the outlined Principles contain potentially useful ideas but there needs to be greater emphasis on the protection of the environment. For example, the principle that says, 'The green wedge is a changing environment and home to many people. Change will be managed to conserve its values and with a focus on long-term stewardship.' could read, "The green wedge is a changing environment and home to many people. Change will be managed to conserve its biodiversity and environmental values and with a focus on long-term stewardship."

Goal 1: Engaged connected communities

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 1? Do not support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 1?

Whilst the main focus on Goal 1, to engage the community, is important - it's not clear that the aim of such engagement is environmental protection. This should be made clearer, as in 1994 when the local Government review board declared that the new Shire of Nillumbik was to be a conservation Shire with the Green Wedge as its strategic focus. The plan should clarify that this Shire and Green Wedge has needs specific to Green Wedges, and thus different from other areas that are not set aside as a Green Wedge. There is an opportunity in this new plan to engage the community as stewards of the land. This should be clearly and specifically emphasised. We should ask 'How can we maintain and reinvigorate the environment?', rather than 'What can we get out of the land?'.

The community should also be engaged in climate change mitigation and emissions drawdown. This should be a top priority and common goal for our local community as we collectively depend on the environmental services of healthy biodiverse ecosystems (like the ones found in our Green Wedge). How we manage the environment as a community will also play a large part in our resilience as the climate does inevitably change (e.g. halting deforestation helps to reduce fire severity).

Goal 2: Active and creative people

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 2? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2?

The objectives and key actions for this goal must specifically emphasise the protection of biodiversity as a top priority. As it's said in the draft plan, green spaces are integral to our health. Not just because outdoor spaces help to promote physical activity, but also because exposure to nature (specifically wild spaces) has been clinically proven to improve mental health and community social connectedness.

In order to better manage the natural environment of the Shire, greater dialogue must be generated and maintained with the Traditional Custodians of the area. This is vital for the health of the whole community and the environment in which we live. A Key Action of Goal 2 must focus on this.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3?

There needs to be a strong acknowledgment of the urgent need to protect all indigenous vegetation across the entire Shire - including private land (as well as public).

The community should work together to protect, and increase habitat for native wildlife - with an emphasis on maintaining wildlife corridors to improve ecosystem connectivity. When talking about environmental protection, it should be framed through a 'systems view', which acknowledges the connectedness and interdependence of all wildlife and human communities in the Green Wedge.

Due to the climate emergency and mass extinction event we currently find ourselves in, the GWMP should acknowledge that transitioning to a more ecologically sustainable society is not only smart, but imperative for future resilience. This should underpin all Actions in the GWMP, without compromise.

Goal 3 repeatedly uses the language of 'balance', and this needs to be amended as it indicates that our thinking is oppositional. It implies that there is a need to trade-off environmental health against other considerations, while international, national, and state government reports indicate that we must prioritise the health of our environment. For example, A3.12, p 33, speaks of balancing amenity, environmental considerations, private water extraction and community considerations. What needs to take place is a prioritisation of environmental considerations, as without optimal environmental health, all other activity and considerations will be constrained.

The use of stocktakes and studies [see A3.1, p32] that describe some areas of vegetation as more significant or valuable than others is alarming as it can lead to greater degradation of the environment which is already under pressure. The majority of the Shire's ecosystems are already 'disturbed' because of mismanagement, and this means we must change our ways. Every Objective and Action ought to aim for preservation and reinvigoration of the environment. One of the greatest threats to the Shire is 'death by a thousand cuts', where bit by bit land clearing and grazingl eave our flora and fauna vulnerable to ever-increasing stress and disappearance. In turn this alsoplacesgreater pressure on our community's overall well being.

There should be an additional Action to organise a large community-wide education campaign about the value of biodiverse ecosystems, how to care for natural landscapes, proper bushfire risk reduction (eradicate myths of ignorance such as: land clearing reduces fire risk - simply not true), understanding the ancient role of fire in this landscape, and the significance of the Green Wedge for our local community, and wider Melbourne (which fits in again with 'systems' based thinking, where people need to be reminded of the interdependence of all living things) and how protecting and regenerating the Green Wedge is aligned with climate action.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4? Economic activities should be assessed in response to the latest science on the urgency of our situation re biodiversity loss and climate change. There is no sustainable economy or economic future without acknowledgment of - and response to - the ecological crises we are facing.

Environmental protection must be reflected in the title of the Goal, the Actions, and throughout the plan, for example, 'A prosperous eco-friendly Green Wedge economy'. Local agriculture is important, and we should support it - but only within the framework of taking care of the environment and the health of local biodiversity. New systems that respect and promote regenerative farming including water conservation, Indigenous knowledge, and indigenous flora and fauna must be encouraged. The obvious link between sustainable agricultural practices, climate change mitigation and a healthy Green Wedge, must be central to the GWMP.

The need for a framework that encourages sustainable land management practices is described in the State Government's Planning Practice Note 31, entitled 'Preparing a Green Wedge Management Plan', and so this has to be clearly demonstrated in any GWMP. This current draft does not achieve this requirement

The draft suggests that to start farming in the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) no permit should be required if the land has been previously cleared and used for farming. This definition of 'cleared land' needs greater detail —much of Nillumbik has been cleared at some stage, but thanks to regeneration it holds significant environmental qualities. Permits are essential as they can ensure any agricultural activities respect the land. It also means that residents will be informed about the piggery etc proposed for next door. This draft must mention the fact that tourism developments in the Green Wedge need to be "in conjunction" with agricultural uses, as stated in Section 55 of the planning scheme. This clause of the planning scheme decreases the likelihood of inappropriate development.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5?

As stewardship of the land is mentioned in the draft GWMP, it would be best if the role of steward was better defined in this goal. The definition should specify that Nillumbik residents are obliged to care for the land (where care is not only about minimising harm, but regenerating environments), and not degrade it (where degradation is the loss of biodiversity and overall ecosystem health). Nillumbik residents should also be held accountable as stewards of the land for the entirety of their tenure. Responsible stewardship also asks that the land, its diverse ecosystems and waterways, are passed on in a better state. Council must educate residents about these matters, and lead the

This draft plan suggests the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) is too restrictive of farming practices and this zoning should only be applied to land with higher conservation values. This suggestion puts at serious risk flora and fauna across a significant proportion of the

way by increasing revegetation of indigenous flora throughout the Shire.

Shire, whether as single trees in paddocks or scattered pockets of remnant bush. These are all vital and in need of greater care and protection, not less.

This Goal in its entirety must place much greater emphasis on the need to Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation. (Refer 1st item in Appendix 1 of draft GWMP -Plan Melbourne 2017-2050). It is Council's responsibility to make significant contributions to the education of residents for the protection and care of biodiversity. Alongside education, it is essential that appropriate resources are allocated to the enforcement of policy standards. Nillumbik's Biodiversity Report outlines the ongoing loss of native vegetation and part of the problem is inadequate enforcement.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

The strongest message from the initial community consultation and the Panel Report is that Nillumbik residents and the population of wider Melbourne cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. This message must lay the foundation for any new GWMP. The current draft does not achieve this.

The Green Wedge Management Plan must reaffirm the Shire's conservation role with the Green Wedge as its Strategic Focus. This draft consistently fails to do this. It lacks detail and omits significant objectives, relevant actions, and accountability measures that would ensure the long-term health and purpose of the Green Wedge.

Declines in biodiversity are at critical levels, and there is urgent need for action by all levels of government and society. The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) states that, "The health of ecosystems on which we and all other species depend is deteriorating more rapidly than ever. We are eroding the very foundations of oureconomies, livelihoods, food security, healthand quality of life worldwide. It is not too late to make a difference, but only if we start now at every level from local to global".

In light of the IPCC's report on how land management plays perhaps the largest role in climate mitigation, the GWMP draft as it is fails to rise to this occasion. Protecting and regenerating biodiverse environments is now more important than ever; degraded landscapes can become CO2 emitters - leading us down a trajectory of passing climate tipping points; risking the health and wealth of all local and even global communities. Similarly, how we manage agricultural land can either lead us down a path of food security and ecological health, or one of food insecurity and climate breakdown. There should be a clear connection made between stewardship of the land, and food production where agriculture (using regenerative practices) can play a role in environmental reinvigoration and climate mitigation. I'd like to see a much stronger climate change emphasis in the GWMP, and acknowledgement that if we care for the environment in our Green Wedge, we can ensure carbon is stored in the earth, and the

mass extinction event we find ourselves in is slowed down.

This draft GWMP uses too general language when it comes to protecting biodiversity in the Green Wedge, I want to see a much more specific focus on conservation and regeneration.

I think you'll find that my opinions not only align with the majority of the community (especially the community panel) but also with global science on the urgent need to halt emissions, and ecological collapse.

I can see that a lot of hard work went into this. Your values on the environmental side of things seem well-considered. I am concerned about two aspects of this document.

This document says a lot of feel-good things, but does not lay down many specifics. As a guide to future planning on the part of the council, this document could be used as a free pass to do all sorts of things inimical to the desires of our residents and the well-being of this council, this city, this state, this country, and this planet. We may be small, but we are still part of a bigger picture. I do not want to hear a single councillor come back to us saying, "But I was only following what you agreed to in the Green Wedge

Management Plan." What exactly are we agreeing to?

It is understandable that you wish to represent all the wishes of all residents. It is impossible to be all things to all people. Parts of this document are at variance with itself. In particular your framework for a "prosperous economy" would act against your vision for an environmentally thriving Green Wedge that respects its Aboriginal elders.

For about forty years much of the Anglosphere has been following the economic theories of Milton Friedman, Friedrich Hayek, and Ludwig von Mises. As economist Kate Raworth puts it: We have "been told that the market is efficient, that trade is win-win, and that the commons are a tragedy. Given such a cast, the triumph of the market seems almost inevitable in the unfolding plot. However, we were all also told that finance is infallible--but that part of the story unravelled so publicly during the 2008 financial crash that even the scriptwriters had to admit that it rang false. It has become increasingly clear that the neoliberal economic plot...has whipped us into a perfect storm of extreme inequality, climate change and financial crash."

The vision you put forward has clear links to the more than seventy year old theories of Friedman, Hayek, and Mises. Their outlook is treated as common wisdom, fact by much of our media, and was once taught in many schools. So, it is easy for all of us to fall into its grip. However, current economic theories put forward by people, such as Nobel Prize winners Joseph Stiglitz, Andrew Deaton and Elinor Ostrom, are better modelled and dispute this outdated way of thinking.

Until Goal 4 is significantly altered this document does not represent the best interests of Nillumbik and its people, and should not be accepted.

You mention in this goal housing, economic development, transport, aged care, education, etc. It makes a world of difference how this is done. Are we going to achieve this by handing off assets to private entities and giving them money? Are we going to achieve this through community owned services that are subject to public scrutiny and our vote?

If you are looking to the solution of trying to raise council revenue without raising council fees, then we fall into the trap of attempting to over-stimulate our local economy at the loss of community and environmental assets. If raising fees scares you, then it is completely possible to put forward resolutions upon which people can vote. "Do we all pay \$0.50 more a month to ensure we have this particular facility?" This is done regularly in other countries such as the US. I am happy to do it. Others, I am sure, would be happy to do this. You should at least explicitly ask if this is the case.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 2? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2?

There is more to protecting our environment than giving people more space in which to exercise. We also need areas where our plant and animals neighbours have the space and peace in which to successfully live according to their cycles. Their presence isn't just about our direct mental well-being, it's also about planetary well-being. Cities need to breathe. The whole planet needs to breathe. If we keep on building on fertile land because the yards are greener, if we keep on clearing away forests for farming because the fertile land has been taken over for housing, if what remaining forests we have are landscaped for children to play in, dogs to be walked, and people to run through, soon we will not have sufficient trees and plants to properly sequester our carbon footprint

and generate clean air.

Goal 2 does not sufficiently address its environmental dimension.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3?

This statement is worrying: "It acknowledges that native plants and animals have intrinsic value but there is also a need for balanced outcomes. Maintaining a healthy natural environment is vital but creates a complex challenge to find the right balance between protection and how we use the land."

So what is the right balance? How have you determined this? This statement seems to put forward a position whereby protecting the environment and our use of it are at odds with one another, thereby suggesting that in a choice between nature and human endeavour, at various times nature must be the loser. Our existence relies on nature. We cannot rely on such vague statements.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Strongly do not support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4? Goal 4 is antithetical to all goals to do with the environment, liveability, and respecting an aboriginal presence.

From page 36 you state that you will create a prosperous economy for Nillumbik by:

- * supporting and promoting growth within the existing business base,
- * promoting growth by attracting new investment and businesses and
- * facilitating liveability and sustainable communities.

Our Earth has a limited amount of space and a limited amount of resources. Nillumbik Shire takes up 435 km². Compare that to the 510 million km² of our planet and 7.69 km² for Australia. How much growth can we afford before we essentially eat ourselves out of house and home? Continuous growth is what a cancer does before it destroys a body. Economic growth from the industrial revolution onward is measurably the cause of our climate crisis.

We should be supporting the well-being of our local business base and ensuring our residents have all they need to live relatively comfortable and contented lives. How

contented can anyone be if the goal is always to have more than your neighbour? We all need to learn how to enjoy our lives while doing with less. We need to let go of a comparative lifestyle and learn how accept ourselves and one another. Wouldn't we all feel a lot less anxiety this way?

This document suggests that we should create growth through new investment. Investment is not free money. It is not the same as a Federal or State grant. It always comes with strings attached. A certain amount of money is put in, so that more money can be taken out. Investment can in fact be a financial drain on a local economy. It only works for a local economy when we can financially drain our neighbours. When we pay State or Federal taxes, when we pay council fees, that is a local investment. The residents agree to pay that money because they want the services it supplies. We are the shareholders of our shire and the council are our board members.

If we in fact need particular businesses in our shire to function, then we need a clear cut means to determine the nature of those businesses and how we can support their local foundation by local residents. That will create more jobs than relying on outside corporations with dubious intentions.

Yes, we do need a certain amount of circulation of funds to keep our shire functioning. But have you asked how much that is really? What you have proposed does not include safety limits to ensure we don't destroy the very things that have brought us prosperity in the first place: a healthy and abundant environment.

You state that we have "a mission to get our economy and society working together for the benefit of all Victorians – by creating more jobs for more people." Your propose to do this by "connecting people and businesses."

This assumes that businesses are our sole employers.

You in fact are also an employer. So is the State, so is the Federal government.

Businesses will only pursue those activities that will make them a profit. Many things need doing that do not accrue a profit: like land care, cleaning up rubbish, support services for the poor, the elderly, and the disabled, motherhood. Sometimes these things can be made profitable when the government pays a company to do them. However, then another layer of oversight and accountability has to be added to ensure these companies do the right thing, rather than finding ways to cut corners in order to make more profit. This is when, for instance, we have issues with the elderly living with abuse and in squalor, because the goal of the company providing their care was profit and not the well-being of their charges.

Some work must be provided by our government. Essential services must always be provided by our government to ensure the well-being of ALL Australians regardless of their financial status. Those services must be provided at a standard that ensures all

people's ability to live productive lives. For instance people die from septic tooth infections. Dentistry must be made publicly available via government programs.

"Big" government is only a problem when too much power accrues to too few people, especially without the moderating force of fair democratic processes.

Businesses have this same problem: too much power accrues to too few people without the moderating force of fair democratic processes.

The innovation I would like to see come out of this council is providing training and support for local cooperative nonprofit businesses. I would also like to see a council bold enough to be a local employer in order to provide more essential services. We are going to need them!

Nillumbik has a growing number of retired residents. Those residents will not be in a position to work jobs, but will need support services. We do not want to put them in such desperation that they sell homes and farms to developers as a retirement plan.

According to the Australian Council of Social Service (ACOSS) 2018 Poverty in Australia Report and the Australian Bureau of Statistics the elderly (65+) are 15.7% of the Australian population and make up 14.3% of our country's poor. Do we have a plan in place to support these people?

Worldwide 2.25 million robots are currently in use. Up to 20 million manufacturing jobs could be lost to robots by 2030 according to the Oxford Economics 2019 Report "How Robots Change the World". When people think of robots and Als, they usually think in terms of Robbie the Robot or Bender from Futurama. When ATMs came into use numerous bank tellers lost their jobs. The same is true with the automated check outs at supermarkets. Predictions are strong for self-driving trucks taking over jobs in transport and delivery. I spent time helping a university friend with a poll he was taking, where one of the questions was whether or not people felt their jobs could be automated. People in white-collar jobs almost universally felt their positions were secure. However, I work in computing. The young friend is working on a degree in computing. We were both concerned how little people understood that machine intelligence could easily take over a wide variety of white-collar jobs.

According to the December 2018 Department of Employment, Vacancy Report: 2,864,200 Australians are competing for 183,900 job vacancies. The ratio of job seekers to job vacancies is 1 to 15.57. As industries become more efficient and mechanised, you would expect this. Each company would need fewer people to produce more product to sell to more people with fewer jobs. Industry cannot fill in the discrepancy. It's not how business works. Government has to do one of two things-preferably both: provide jobs and/or provide all citizens with a universal basic income. It is inappropriate to punish Australians for a lack of jobs. We are beginning to live in a Star Trek world and need to let go of the prejudices of nineteenth century toffs. Nothing says Nillumbik can't lead the way in managing for our modern world.

Another item that concerns me in the report has to do with this objective: "Encourage growth in the visitor economy through regional promotion and facilitation of new visitor experiences."

In 1970 the Shire of Eltham purchased Edendale, establishing an animal pound and small nursery. What that means is that people who were voted in by the residents of the Shire of Eltham purchased that property on their behalf with their council fees and whatever State monies were dispersed to them at the time. In the late 1980s a number of changes were made to the site to establish the area as a community farm for local residents. It has since become a Community Environmental Education Centre featuring an indigenous plant nursery.

This is a significant community asset—one that has been supported by nearly fifty years of council fees and regularly visited by many of our residents. This belongs to all of us.

If this asset is sold off, the question needs to be asked "for what purpose"? Is it to fill meagre council coffers? Are we that poorly off? Why? Is it to "boost" our visitor economy by handing off a community asset to a business operator whose purpose is profit, and only secondarily the maintenance of community services that Edendale provides? Under such an enterprise the farm would be focussed on tourists more than residents, and make this asset less available to the people who paid to have it developed. All that money, all that effort, gone and only available to the wealthier members of our community.

How many of us expected to be able to share Edendale with our grandchildren? How much guarantee would we have that the farm could only ever be a public farm, and not later sold off again to developers?

As council members you are in fact under the employ of Nillumbik Shire residents and are expected to act in the best interest of all its members, not just its business class. When members of the business class take up political systems and use them to hand public assets off to other members of the business class, that is kleptocracy. We the residents of Nillumbik Shire trust that our current council is above such behaviour and will adequately nurture our shared resources and community services.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Strongly do not support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5? "Nonetheless, regulation and enforcement is sometimes required and is one way of achieving objectives, but is not necessarily the most sustainable way. As techniques

they lie at one end of a spectrum. At other end are education, awareness, facilitation and ultimately empowerment. All techniques have their place but this plan envisages putting more emphasis towards the empowering end of the spectrum."

We need to know what the specifics are on the "balance" you are suggesting here. This looks to be leaning toward laissez-faire leadership. It sounds good, doesn't it? Talk about empowerment and facilitation...people love it. BUT we need certain limitations to live successfully together. Not everyone is a good citizen. Not everyone innately behaves in a safe, respectful, and pro-social manner. Assuming the market would sort itself out brought about the 2008 Global Financial Crisis. Trusting that gun owners would uniformly use their weapons responsibly has brought about the capacity for multiple mass shootings a year to happen in the US.

We need fair and reasonable regulations that are consistently enforced. People need to know what these regulations are and given help to follow these regulations. We need to ensure that bad actors are prevented from harming our community. We need a council who sufficiently cares about our shire that they are hands-on about protecting this rare and beautiful part of Melbourne, rather than making a show of being hands-off and in the process allow moneyed interests the freedom to dismantle all we value.

The objectives and key actions in this goal are all very weakly put and do little to reassure me that the council will be acting in the best interests of our shire.

With some reservations. In general I would agree with the propositions put forward by Nillumbik PALs . The adversarial and toxic relationship between Council and landowners needs to cease. If we define "landowners " as those owning more than 2ha, then this means the majority area of the shire. Essentially the important role of landowners needs to be recognised. Zoning and overlays need to take into account what landowners are doing. This means recognition of grazing, horticulture, gardening, small business amenity landscaping and other activities. Residents should be able to apply for exemptions to overlays or/and rezoning. This could mean micro-zoning for particular properties. For instance small farms, orchards, etc. should be able to be rezoned as farming zones with resultant removal of permit requirements for farm buildings, fences, drains and access tracks. In general the "Red tape" now constraining rural enterprises, should be reduced, and where possible, removed.

Do you have any comments about the Five Key Moves?

All this seems very vague and can be interpreted in almost any way. Each of the Moves should be undertaken only if some benefit would be assured. Considering Move 5. What are these assets and how would they be assessed ?Is this information available elsewhere? That is, would this be just a duplication ?For example. In my research and in 35 years of landholding experience in rural Nillumbik, I consider the main assets for rural areas to be soil microbiota, humus content and carbon retention. Are these near the top of council's list?Is there anyone available who would be qualified in such an assessment? Without this information there can be no concept of natural or, say, agricultural potential. From reports from Universities, Agricultural Departments and the CSIRO, we know in general, if not in all particular areas that carbon content in Australian soils has reduced from about 6% to less than 0.5%. Nillumbik is not an exception. This means less natural biodiversity, increasingly limited agricultural potential, lowered water content in and above soil and higher and hotter bushfire potential. We know this without any asset stocktake. What we need from Council is a strategy to do something about this deteriorating situation.

OK Agree 01.3 I have no idea what this means. A bushfire shelter? A bar?, A skating rink? A lookout? Public toilets?. It is impossible to comment on proposals when there is no proposal. 01.4. This is very poorly worded. There seems to be more than one proposal here. What has a general vision (enormously vague and usually impossible to achieve) got to do with housing and ageing? I do support efforts to support older people to stay in their own home. That's it. This means I would support dual dwellings on one title to be held within a family. 01.5 OK. There are limits. Which are? 01.6 This looks like the inclusion from 01.4. Same comment. 01.7. How? Trams, busses, trains, wider roads? What is being proposed?

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2? The idea of walking, cycling and horse tracks is great. Go ahead. I'm not sure what the rest means. I know a lot of artists who would not appreciate greater ease of public access. If you want to grade my driveway, go ahead. Seriously, objectives mean little without specific strategy agendas and specified and tangible endpoints.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3? Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3?

I'm not going through each of these items. This would be tedious and repetitive . I will make some general comments. Bushfires. All landholders should be able to remove hazards without permits. This would include mowing grass down to 10cm, removal of dry twigs and flammable plants up to 100 m from dwellings. Trees , such as eucalypts should have lower branches removed to a height of 2 m. Roadside growth should be removed up to 4m from road surface. I have not seen firebreaks reducing wildlife. Biodiversity. Riparian growth to 10m from streams should not be touched , Hedgerows and wildlife corridors should be encouraged. Deer must be removed in addition to cats and foxes. Of these 3 the most damaging would seem to be deer. They remove ground cover, ringbark trees , destroy bird nests, initiate erosion and more. Serious consideration should be given to the encroachment of eucalypts as weeds . In our area what was mixed forest, became, after the 2009 fires, almost a monoculture as eucalypts too advantage and covered the land with reduction of other species including orchids

and fungi. This is not a natural environment.

That's fine. There has been enough poverty in this area. Resilience and self-sufficiency should also be supported. Generally people do not require help to run their businesses from municipal authorities. They have their accountants and technical advisors. What they don't need is unnecessary interference, for instance in the acquisition of permits. These have, in the past, been delayed for no good reason, and finally been granted after many months and much expense. This has led to distrust of, and antagonism toward, councils.

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5? Landowners should have responsibility, helped and not hindered by Council or State regulations that have no benefit. I do not support unqualified leadership or leadership not informed by sound scientific and ethical principles.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

A satellite photo of the Nillumbik area show that much of the ground was once covered in orchard. Poor practices and competition has destroyed much of this but some apple orchards remain and some vineyards and olive groves have been introduced. If the soils, particularly along the Diamond Creek corridor, were appropriately repaired, and water holding capacity and fertility increased, these area could once again provide food, close to Melbourne. There has been directives to amalgamate holdings to make agriculture more viable. I would argue that the belief underlying this is erroneous. It has been shown, world wide, that small holdings produce the greatest amount of produce per area, and have the least negative impact on the environment. The large holding beliefs and practices of the 20th century proved highly destructive to the natural environment and caused significant soil degradation, turning much farmland into desert

and reducing nutritive value of food. I mentioned before the need to regenerate fertile and water retaining soils. I would now note that this is applicable to all Nillumbik's soils, forest, grassland or cultivated. This is our best contribution to wellbeing of humans and other life-forms in the face of population growth and the heating of the climate. Thanks for the opportunity to contribute

In general I support to intent and outcomes of this document.

I want to commend the process and authors in providing a document that truly reflects the demographic, landscape and interests in the Shires non-urban areas.

In particular, the acknowledgement of equine actives and keeping of horses is important as this entire community had been ignored in the previous plan. By recognising this major (and growing) use of rural land, its benefits to local businesses and to recreational health and wellbeing, the Plan can aid and further enhance the opportunities of the equine lifestyle and events in the Shire.

I also support the Shires Recreational Trails Strategy and the continued inclusion of horse and pony riding along the formal shared use trails and bushland reserve tracks.

People who choose to live in bushfire prone areas need be encouraged to appreciate and engage with the environment, understand the risks and be prepared to make the right decisions in times of extreme fire danger. They should not be encouraged to change the environment for safety's sake.

re clause O1.4 in objectives being inserted into the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan -"Where possible, encourage housing diversity to enable ageing in place." Supporting Ageing in Place in the green wedge was one of the key findings of the community consultations. This was not about building cluster housing in and around our rural townships that threatens our green wedge, it is about supporting people when they get older to stay in their own homes. I strongly do not support the inclusion of this clause that relates to housing diversity. The Hurstbridge community addressed this misleading use of the term 'ageing in place' when it was used by the previous Council to justify a development between the football ovals, along the creek side corridor in Hurstbridge. (Lot 1 Graysharps Road). The Hustbridge Township strategy in 2002 reviewed identified 9 potential areas of township expansion, 7 were rejected outright as not suitable. Of the two sites that the strategy identified that could support some further residential development, the Lot 1 proposed residential development by the previous council was rejected by the current council and the other which is housing consolidation along Heidelberg Kinglake road seems to be happening within the existing township zone. If people from rural areas want to "age in community" there is plenty of subdivisions happening within existing township zones - just have a look at Hurstbridge. The market is meeting the demand. Ageing in place refers to ageing in you own home. Some people require services and house modifications to do so. Converting the meaning of the terminology lays the ground for future justification of rezoning for residential development. Clause O1.4 is misleading and needs to be re-written because Ageing in place is ageing in your own home - it does not require "housing diversity", it requires housing support services. Statements in pages 22 and 23 used to justify this clause are not backed up by evidence. In particular the statement on page 22 which in essence says that we need to develop outside township zones to support aging in place. Ageing in place had been misconstrued in the report to ageing in community which is not the same thing, and is not supported by the consultative process outcomes. This is a clumsy attempt to support subdivisions and development of the Green Wedge by a few people who are also calling for rezoning RCZ land in contravention of State Govt. Policy. Will be the usual suspects and the usual pieces of land that would be developers will target using ageing in place if this misconstrued principle is adopted in the final plan-Wattletree road Hurstrbridge (Drapac), around Wattle Glen Station, between Eltham and Diamond Creek, Diamond Creek and Yarrambat (Nillumbik Ratepayers Association). It is pleasing that the Govt recently reaffirmed its intention to protect the Green Wedges. Objective 01.5 is excellent - "Recognise the limits on housing development in the rural areas." That is anything outside existing township planning zones...

The draft does not state this strongly enough, despite it being a Strategic Focus for the Shire. Appendix 1 of Council's draft quotes the State Government's 'Plan Melbourne 2017-2050', where the first priority for the Green Wedge is to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation." Furthermore, this Council is going backwards. Nillumbik used to be at the forefront of environmental issues, but is fast becoming supersceded by neighbouring councils in switching from the use of agricultural chemicals, to other more eco-friendly ways to control weeds, such as Weedsteamers. This council lags while it remains dependent on the use of petrochemical based means to cost cut and save money, while we residents, either property owners or renters pay a steep price to live in this area because we

choose to live in areas such as this because we care about the environment and enjoy sharing our habitat with the local wildlife, in their natural habitat which in this shire, we are very fortunate to have in tact.

- Council's initial community engagement clearly demonstrated that the large majority of Nillumbik residents cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it maintained, protected and enhanced. This view was also expressed by the majority report of the Community Panel. Council's draft fails to acknowledge strong enough, support for the Community's position.
- The GWMP must reflect the fact that Nillumbik's Green Wedge is the most environmentally intact of Melbourne's Green Wedges, is a significant part of the wider Green Wedge system, and is for the benefit of everyone, whether they live in the area or not.
- Climate change mitigation must be an overarching Goal for the GWMP and therefore must be addressed in the Vision. It must inform all objectives and actions such as regenerative agriculture, fire management, waste management, bush regeneration, education, and economic strategy. Throughout the draft, the repeated mention of just adapting to climate change leaves the reader with the impression that Council has basically thrown their hands up in the air suggesting there is nothing that they nor Nillumbik residents can do to tackle climate change. This is not true and must be part of every day action.
- It is vital that Nillumbik respects our cultural history which predates European settlement, Indigenous people, their cultural heritage and knowledge. This barely gets a mention in the GWMP despite the fact that Indigenous people have ensured the vitality of the area's biodiversity for tens of thousands of years.

This draft is vague and I would say very incomplete. A one line statement in reference to giving Indigenous groups a voice in this shire, is a joke. Suggesting the area be opened up for toursim is also not well thought out given the nature of the roads in the area - and this is not to suggest that I am asking for dirt roads to be replaced by bitumen. Dirt roads serve a purpose in slowing down traffic in areas of dense populations of wildlife exist. I found it very hard to respond to questions, given the lack of detail in this draft. This draft suggests to me, that council is very out of touch with the people who call the Green Wedge their home.

I agree with all of the statements below:

- 1. The overriding GWMP response from Council's Community Survey (Aug 2018) and its Community Panel (Nov. 2018) was that Nillumbik residents cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge; and they want it to be maintained, protected and enhanced. Council's draft will not achieve this.
- 2. In Appendix 1 of Council's draft GWMP is a quote from Plan Melbourne 2017-2050, for the first priority for the Green Wedge: 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation."

The draft GWMP ignores this priority.

3. The GWMP needs to properly discuss the values and needs of the environment, such as the importance of indigenous vegetation; habitat for wildlife and connectivity; biodiversity; ecosystem services; a 'systems view' (that all is interdependent); the global climate change and biodiversity extinction crisis; the need to transform to an ecologically sustainable society.

- 4. The GWMP needs to reaffirm the shire's conservation role. The council "Business as Usual" approach is not good enough.
- 5. Council's Draft is in denial that the natural environment continues to decline everywhere In Nillumbik and globally. Maintaining a "Business as Usual" trajectory is not good enough

The 2019 Victorian State of the Environment Report - painting a bleak outlook for the state's native plants and animals; concerning the impact on biodiversity of horses, grazing and bushfire protection on private land; that more private land needs to be conserved; and the two global crises of climate change and biodiversity extinction.

- 6. The Urban Growth Boundary is supported. However, the Council's draft presses the state government to change the zone, or the zone's uses, on the rural side of the UGB and around our rural townships. (Land Use Planning page 40 and A5.7) This has the potential to ruin the entrances to the Green Wedge, would degrade Green Wedge amenity and start increasing the size of our rural townships.
- 7. Council's Draft argues that to start farming in the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ), no permit should be required.

So that landowners can be consulted that a piggery for example may be about to start up next door, the need for a permit in this zone should remain.

8. We need a Green Wedge Management Plan that places the Green Wedge environment, biodiversity, and their restoration as the main priority in a way that fits the 21st century challenges facing us, for our children, and our children's children. Council's Draft GWMP is so poorly framed, and thoroughly fails the basics of what's required, that the GWMP 2010-2025 with all its objectives and actions, needs to be reinstated.

The plan must state more clearly that the Shire and Green Wedge areas have particular needs that are different to those in an area not established as a Green Wedge. The new plan presents an opportunity to highlight and expand the role of the whole community in stewardship of the land. This needs to be clearly stated and emphasised, as we ask ourselves, 'How can we maintain and reinvigorate the environment?', rather than 'What can we get out of the land?'.

The community as a whole must come together to ensure serious action is taken to mitigate climate change and draw down carbon emissions. This is a top priority for how we live together as a community – our collective wellbeing depends on it, as does the environment

Goal 2: Active and creative people

I agree that health and wellbeing is strongly linked to nature and natural environments, making it all the more important to be clear on what these assets are, their distribution and condition, and the extent and condition we want them to have in the future. There is no reasoning given for the action that proposes to allow prohibited uses.

An additional Action must be to undertake a massive public education campaign about biodiversity, the value of ecosystems, care for natural landscapes, bushfire risk reduction through understanding the ancient role of fire in the landscape, the significance of the Green Wedge, climate change and their interdependence

Wording is incongruous – goal is "Safe and healthy environments", sub-heading is "Healthy and safe communities enjoy living in our iconic green wedge environment" – is it the health of the environment or the community that this goal is aimed at? Nowhere does it say that the natural environment needs to be made and kept healthy, let alone what that might look like

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Strongly do not support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4? Creating a prosperous economy is not the primary role of the green wedge, it is to protect biodiversity assets and support existing and potential agribusiness activities. In affording this protection, one can seek to enable viable businesses that contribute to the local economy, in particular those directly related to regenerative agricultural production and eco-tourism.

The draft suggests that to start farming in the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) no permit should be required if the land has been previously cleared and used for farming. This definition of 'cleared land' needs greater detail – much of Nillumbik has been cleared at some stage, but thanks to regeneration it holds significant environmental qualities. Permits are essential as they can ensure any agricultural activities respect the land.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5?

This Goal in its entirety must place much greater emphasis on the need to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation.' (Refer 1st item in Appendix 1 of draft GWMP - Plan Melbourne 2017-2050). It is Council's responsibility to make significant contributions to the education of residents for the protection and care of biodiversity. Alongside education, it is essential that appropriate resources are allocated to the enforcement of policy standards. Nillumbik's Biodiversity Report outlines the ongoing loss of native vegetation and part of the problem is inadequate enforcement.

There is some question as to the legitimacy of the draft GWMP as the process in arriving at the draft did not follow State Government policy requirements. Planning Practice Note 31 describes specific requirements which did not occur, including the establishment of a Project Steering Group, which includes representation of key stakeholders.

The five key moves do not place enough emphasis on the care of the natural environment. While some ideas are potentially useful, they do not go far enough, and each key move needs to clearly indicate how it will contribute to the protection and reinvigoration of biodiversity in the long term.

Under the current GWMP 2010-2025 it is much clearer how the Council and community will protect the Green Wedge, and yet net loss of vegetation continues. The new draft plan is less clear, so is highly likely to lead to greater net loss of vegetation and at a faster rate.

There is also no specific principle focused on preserving the environment and biodiversity. Given this plan is about managing Melbourne's most intact Green Wedge and that the majority of the community place a high value on the Green Wedge and want to see it protected and enhanced, one would expect to see a principle with the clear goal of maintaining and enhancing biodiversity and environmental values.

Creating an engaged and connected community is clearly an important goal, and there is a great opportunity to create a plan that provides leadership and brings the community together to deliver better outcomes for the environment. If the goal of the plan is to preserve and enhance the Green Wedge, then the plan needs to re-frame the way in which it engages the community so that everyone understands they have a role to play in caring for the land and nurturing it back to good health - not just for the sake of fulfilling a policy, but for the collective wellbeing of all people and future generations around the globe.

It is also needs to highlight more clearly, that Green Wedge areas have differing needs to those areas that are not Green Wedge and different priorities necessarily will apply.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 2? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2? Green space is an important determinant of health, both physical and mental. Goal 2 does not go far enough in prioritising biodiversity in Nillumbik. There also needs to be greater dialogue with the Traditional Custodians of the area to better manage the environment and for the health of the whole community.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3? Goal 3 is concerning because it does not articulate a strong position of protecting and prioritising the environmental values of the Green Wedge. Instead it talks about "balance". Balance suggests trading off environmental values for other, more utilitarian values, which is not in sync with the stated purpose of a Green Wedge area and is clearly out of step with international, national and state government reports which state we must prioritise the environment so we can become an ecologically sustainable society.

Again this is a missed opportunity where the plan could provide leadership and strengthen community understanding about the value of biodiversity and protecting ecosystems so that we create a landscape that is resilient and sustainable for future generations.

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4?

There is not enough detail in this goal to suggest that it will support a prosperous economy while also prioritising environmental protection. Too often, short-term economic gains override a longer-term, big picture environmental strategy. Everyone in the community wants a prosperous economy where residents, business and visitors thrive in Nillumbik, but this type of economy must not be created at the expense of the environment. The GWMP needs to support local agriculture by encouraging better farming methods that regenerate the land rather than degrade it.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5? Goal 5 does contain enough emphasis on the need to maintain and enhance the diversity of native flora and fauna. It could go further in providing education and advice to residents on how to tread more gently on the environment through many simple things such as avoiding plastics, buying local produce, using the car less, etc, etc. With regard to farming, the GWMP puts at risk many small pockets of flora and fauna scattered across the shire - these small pockets need greater protection not less, and the plan should be encouraging farmers to build on these small remnants rather than paving the way for their demise.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

The current draft GWMP does not reflect the community's level of commitment to the Green Wedge as demonstrated in the initial community consultation and the Panel Report. More importantly, the world is currently facing a global environmental crisis - none of this will matter if all of us don't start to act to turn this around. At this rate of species extinction and carbon pollution we are putting at risk our economy, our health and quality of life, not only for this generation, but for many generations to come. This is a big problem. But we can't wait for some magic international solution. The solution lies in what each individual community decides to do - do they act to protect their environment and try to turn around this problem, or do they ignore it, continuing on like before, hoping it won't be their problem, leaving a mess for future generations to fix?

The draft GWMP does not go far enough to protect and enhance what biodiversity we have left.

The draft GWMP does not go far enough to engage the community and lead the way to a biodiverse, sustainable future.

The draft GWMP does not clearly set out how to create a win-win sustainable economy where both business and the environment can thrive.

The current GWMP has much greater detail than this new draft, and should be used as a basis for improvement.

The community as a whole must come together to ensure serious action is taken to mitigate climate change and draw down carbon emissions. This is a top priority for how we live together as a community – our collective wellbeing depends on it, as does the environment

The plan must state more clearly that the Shire and Green Wedge areas have particular needs that are different to those in an area not established as a Green Wedge. The new plan presents an opportunity to highlight and expand the role of the whole community in stewardship of the land. This needs to be clearly stated and emphasised, as we ask ourselves, 'How can we maintain and reinvigorate the environment?', rather than 'What can we get out of the land?'.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 2? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2?

The Objectives and Key Actions for Goal 2 must clearly and strongly focus on ensuring Nillumbik's biodiversity is top priority. As stated in the draft plan, green space is an important determinant of health, not just because it enables physical activity but also because it has been shown to promote higher levels of mental wellbeing and social connectedness.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3?

The GWMP needs to more strongly acknowledge the importance of ALL indigenous vegetation and address the urgent need to conserve it THROUGHOUT the Shire, on private and public land. The community must work together to focus on increasing habitat for wildlife and connectivity; preserving biodiversity; valuing what ecosystems provide; developing a 'systems view' (that ALL is interdependent); address the climate change and extinction crises, and the need to transform to an ecologically sustainable society. This must become the underpinning ethos that guides the Actions and all other aspects of the plan, without compromise. The use of stocktakes and studies [see A3.1, p32] that describe some areas of vegetation as more significant or valuable than others is alarming as it can lead to greater degradation of the environment which is already under pressure. The majority of the Shire's ecosystems are already 'disturbed' because

of mismanagement, and this means we must change our ways. Every Objective and Action ought to aim for preservation and reinvigoration of the environment. One of the greatest threats to the Shire is 'death by a thousand cuts', where bit by bit land clearing and grazing leave our flora and fauna vulnerable to ever- increasing stress and disappearance. In turn this also places greater pressure on our community's overall well being.

An additional Action must be to undertake a massive public education campaign about biodiversity, the value of ecosystems, care for natural landscapes, bushfire risk reduction through understanding the ancient role of fire in the landscape, the significance of the Green Wedge, climate change and their interdependence.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4?

This section must clearly focus on overall environmental protection. Economic activities must be assessed and altered in response to latest science and the urgent need for environmental protections. This must be reflected in the title of the Goal, the Actions, and throughout the plan, for example, 'A prosperous eco-friendly Green Wedge economy'. The draft suggests that to start farming in the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) no permit should be required if the land has been previously cleared and used for farming. This definition of 'cleared land' needs greater detail – much of Nillumbik has been cleared at some stage, but thanks to regeneration it holds significant environmental qualities. Permits are essential as they can ensure any agricultural activities respect the land. It also means that residents will be informed about the piggery etc proposed for next door.

This draft must mention the fact that tourism developments in the Green Wedge need to be "in conjunction" with agricultural uses, as stated in Section 55 of the planning scheme. This clause of the planning scheme decreases the likelihood of inappropriate development.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5? Stewardship of the land is mentioned in the draft plan, and its role must be better defined in Goal 5, Responsible Leadership. It needs to explain that Nillumbik residents have an obligation to care for the land, not degrade it, and this must be for the entirety of their tenure. Responsible stewardship also asks that the land, its diverse ecosystems

and waterways, are passed on in a better state. Council must educate residents about these matters, and lead the way by increasing revegetation of indigenous flora throughout the Shire.

This draft plan suggests the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) is too restrictive of farming practices and this zoning should only be applied to land with higher conservation values. This suggestion puts at serious risk flora and fauna across a significant proportion of the Shire, whether as single trees in paddocks or scattered pockets of remnant bush. These are all vital and in need of greater care and protection, not less. Responsible Leadership should have a section dealing with climate change mitigation in accordance with the precautionary principle.

Council ought to provide education and free, easily accessible advice to residents on a range of topics such as 'avoid - reduce - reuse - recycle', reducing meat-consumption, buying local produce and growing your own, responsible waste disposal, reduction of car-dependence, benefits of native vegetation etc.

This Goal in its entirety must place much greater emphasis on the need to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation.' (Refer 1st item in Appendix 1 of draft GWMP - Plan Melbourne 2017-2050). It is Council's responsibility to make significant contributions to the education of residents for the protection and care of biodiversity. Alongside education, it is essential that appropriate resources are allocated to the enforcement of policy standards. Nillumbik's Biodiversity Report outlines the ongoing loss of native vegetation and part of the problem is inadequate enforcement. Key Action A5.6 and A5.7 [page 40 of the draft] propose changes to how land within the Green Wedge can be used. This has the potential to erode the values of the Green Wedge and effectively increase the spread of residential and commercial development outside the Urban Growth Boundary. The UGB must be treated as a hard boundary. The GWMP needs to recognise the leading role that Nillumbik can play; that we can be part of the solution, acting locally to address global problems. We're a relatively affluent population. Nillumbik is the perfect place to start turning things around. If not here and now, where and when?

Where is the detail?

It appears that Council has failed to follow State Government policy requirements in the preparation of the GWMP. This throws into question the entire document and associated processes. Planning Practice Note 31 describes specific requirements for the development of a GWMP, including the establishment of a Project Steering Group chaired by Council with key stakeholder representatives. This did not occur. This draft fails to clearly articulate an Implementation Plan based on clearly stated Objectives and Actions and the Council Department responsible for implementation. As stated in the State Government's Planning Practice Note 31, 'Each GWMP will set out a series of actions and measures that need to be undertaken, and identify resource requirements, roles and responsibilities, timelines, outcomes and evaluation.'The current GWMP has much greater detail than this new draft, and should be used as a basis for improvement.

The 'Five Key Moves' contain potentially useful ideas depending on how they are applied, and there needs to be much greater emphasis on the care of the natural environment.

The document needs to describe in much greater detail the ACTIONS to be taken, and each of these must prioritize best environmental practice, ensuring the protection of ALL native vegetation and fauna across the Shire.

Every descriptor needs to clearly indicate how it will contribute to the protection and re invigoration of biodiversity for the long term.

The current GWMP 2010 -2025 describes in much greater detail the ways Council and community will ensure the protection of the green wedge. However there has been consistent net loss of vegetation. This demonstrates that any new plan must be stronger and clearer about the actions which will be taken to reverse this ongoing decline. The draft GWMP does not achieve this.

Each Principle is a very broad statement and it is unclear how they will be interpreted and applied while ensuring care for the environment and they need to reflect the community's commitment to protecting the Green Wedge.

The GWMP must describe how the values of the Green Wedge will be prioritized in keeping with the State Government's policies Plan Melbourne 2017-2050 and Protecting Victoria's Environment–Biodiversity 2037, which is 'Victoria's plan to stop the decline of our native plants and animals and improve our natural environment so it is healthy, valued and actively cared for.'

An additional Principle that focuses on Preservation of Environment and Biodiversity, and describes the urgent need to reverse the decline of biodiversity and effects of climate change should be added to the GWMP. Biodiversity Protection should be given the status of a Goal in the Plan.

As with the 'Five Key Moves', the outlined Principles contain potentially useful ideas but there needs to be greater emphasis on the protection of the environment. For example, the principle that says, 'The green wedge is a changing environment and home to many people. Change will be managed to conserve its values and with a focus on long-term

stewardship.' could read, "The green wedge is a changing environment and home to many people. Change will be managed to conserve its biodiversity and environmental values and with a focus on long-term stewardship

The thrust of Goal 1, to engage the community, is important but must be framed in the context of the environmental protection aim as stated in 1994 when the Local Government Review Board declared that the new Shire of Nillumbik was to be a conservation Shire with the Green Wedge as its strategic focus.

The plan must state more clearly that the Shire and Green Wedge areas have particular needs that are different to an area that is not a Green Wedge area. The new plan presents an opportunity to highlight and expand the role of the whole community in stewardship of the land. This is a missed opportunity and needs to be clearly stated, as we ask ourselves, 'How can we maintain and reinvigorate the environment?', rather than 'What can we get out of the land?'.

The community as a whole must come together to ensure serious action is taken to mitigate climate change and draw down carbon emissions. This is a top priority for how we live together as a community, our collective well being depends on it, as does the environment.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2? We need to ensure that Nillumbik's biodiversity is top priority. As stated in the draft plan, green space is an important determinant of health, not just because it enables physical

activity but also because it has been shown to promote higher levels of mental well being and social connectedness.

In order to better manage the natural environment of the Shire, greater dialogue must be generated and maintained with the Traditional Custodians of the area. This is vital for the health of the whole community and the environment in which we live.

A Key Action of Goal 2 must focus on this.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

The GWMP needs to more strongly acknowledge the importance of all indigenous vegetation and address the urgent need to conserve it throughout the Shire, on private and public land. The community must work together to focus on increasing habitat for wildlife and connectivity; preserving biodiversity; valuing what ecosystems provide; developing a 'systems view' (that ALL is interdependent); address the climate change and extinction crises, and the need to transform to an ecologically sustainable society. This must become the underpinning ethos that guides the Actions and all other aspects of the plan, without compromise.

Goal 3 repeatedly uses the language of 'balance', and this needs to be amended as it indicates that our thinking is oppositional. It implies that there is a need to trade-off environmental health against other considerations, while international, national, and state government reports indicate that we must prioritize the health of our environment. For example, A3.12, p 33, speaks of balancing amenity, environmental considerations, private water extraction and community considerations. What needs to take place is a prioritization of environmental considerations, as without optimal environmental health, all other activity and considerations will be constrained.

The use of stock takes and studies [see A3.1, p32] that describe some areas of vegetation as more significant or valuable than others is alarming as it can lead to greater degradation of the environment which is already under pressure. The majority of the Shire's ecosystems are already 'disturbed' because of mismanagement, and this means we must change our ways. Every Objective and Action ought to aim for preservation and reinvigoration of the environment. One of the greatest threats to the Shire is 'death by a thousand cuts', where bit by bit land clearing and grazing leave our flora and fauna vulnerable to ever-increasing stress and disappearance. In turn this also places greater pressure on our community's overall well being.

An additional Action must be to undertake a massive public education campaign about biodiversity, the value of ecosystems, care for natural landscapes, bushfire risk reduction through understanding the ancient role of fire in the landscape, the significance of the Green Wedge, climate change and their interdependence.

This current draft does not achieve this requirement.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5? Stewardship of the land is mentioned in the draft plan, and its role must be better defined in Goal 5, Responsible Leadership. It needs to explain that Nillumbik residents have an obligation to care for the land, not degrade it, and this must be for the entirety of their tenure. Responsible stewardship also asks that the land, its diverse ecosystems

and waterways, are passed on in a better state. Council must educate residents about these matters, and lead the way by increasing revegetation of indigenous flora throughout the Shire.

This draft plan suggests the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) is too restrictive of farming practices and this zoning should only be applied to land with higher conservation values. This suggestion puts at serious risk flora and fauna across a significant proportion of the Shire, whether as single trees in paddocks or scattered pockets of remnant bush. These are all vital and in need of greater care and protection, not less.

Responsible Leadership should have a section dealing with climate change mitigation in accordance with the precautionary principle.

Council ought to provide education and free, easily accessible advice to residents on a range of topics such as 'avoid -reduce -reuse -recycle', reducing meat consumption, buying local produce and growing your own, responsible waste disposal, reduction of car-dependence, benefits of native vegetation etc.

This Goal in its entirety must place much greater emphasis on the need to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation.'(Refer 1st item in Appendix 1 of draft GWMP -Plan Melbourne 2017-2050). It is Council's responsibility to make significant contributions to the education of residents for the protection and care of biodiversity. Alongside education, it is essential that appropriate resources are allocated to the enforcement of policy standards. Nillumbik's Biodiversity Report outlines the ongoing loss of native vegetation and part of the problem is inadequate enforcement. Key Action A5.6 and A5.7 [page 40 of the draft] propose changes to how land within the Green Wedge can be used. This has the potential to erode the values of the Green Wedge and effectively increase the spread of residential and commercial development outside the Urban Growth Boundary. The UGB must be treated as a hard boundary. The GWMP needs to recognize the leading role that Nillumbik can play; that we can be part of the solution, acting locally to address global problems. We're a relatively affluent population. Nillumbik is the perfect place to start turning things around. If not here and now, where and when?

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

The strongest message from the initial community consultation and the Panel Report is that Nillumbik residents and the population of wider Melbourne cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. This must lay the foundation for any new GWMP. The current draft does not achieve this.

The Green Wedge Management Plan must reaffirm the Shire's conservation role with the Green Wedge as its Strategic Focus. This draft consistently fails to do this. It lacks detail and omits significant objectives, relevant actions, and accountability measures that would ensure the long-term health and purpose of the Green Wedge.

Declines in biodiversity are at critical levels, and there is urgent need for action by all levels of government and society. The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) states that, "The health of ecosystems on which we and all other species depend is deteriorating more rapidly than ever. We are eroding the very foundations of our economies, livelihoods, food security, health and quality of life worldwide. It is not too late to make a difference, but only if we start now at every level from local to global".

There is a worrying lack of detail throughout the document regarding the protection and enhancement of the Shire's biodiversity in all its forms and varying quality. Clearly defined actions need to be included which will address this problem to ensure the long term health of the Green Wedge.

The impact of invasive species –flora and fauna –is significant and this must be better addressed.

The draft speaks of polarised and diverse views and how conversations must be respectful and robust. It is vital that this is the case, and is supported by current science, particularly in relation to the need for environmental repair and preservation, and urgent climate change mitigation.

It is necessary that we uphold the highest of professional standards throughout the Shire and its leadership.

1. The state government's list of desired planning outcomes (Appendix 1) for each green wedge starts with "protect and enhance [the green wedge's] environmental and biodiversity assets". Yet the single-paragraph draft vision (page 5) entirely omits this desired outcome. Instead its focus in exclusively about people. This is more than a shortcoming in the draft GWMP, it is a fundamental and fatal error. 2. Under the draft vision are the words (page 5), "Opportunities to grow agriculture, tourism, recreation and local jobs and services will be actively sought." This is worrisome. Increasing the scale of human activities in the green wedge is the dominant threat to its environmental and landscape values. Therefore, to seek opportunities to expand such activities (with the exception of recreation) has no place in a plan to manage Nillumbik's Green Wedge.

An important principle is missing from the list, namely to focus on maintaining and enhancing the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieving a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation. This should be a major priority of the plan, as clearly enunciated in the state government's list of desired planning outcomes (Appendix 1).

The goal of engaging the community is appropriate, but some of the draft words are alarming. Most alarming is the statement that current plans to concentrate new housing within existing townships "may have to be re-examined ... to accommodate incremental growth [in Nillumbik's Green Wedge]". I strongly disagree. The paramount values of the green wedge and those that the community appreciate most, namely its environmental and landscape values, are being eroded by residential development. So a goal to accommodate more residential growth in the green wedge is entirely inappropriate.

Furthermore, such a goal is inconsistent with the State's planning framework which applies (page 23), "prioritisation of conserving and enhancing the landscape ahead of residential development in the [green wedge]". The pressure for residential growth due to the green wedge's proximity to metropolitan Melbourne (highlighted on page 9) must be resisted, NOT accommodated. To accommodate it undermines the whole rationale for the green wedge. As stated in the draft (page 19), the green wedge environment is an irreplaceable resource for the local and metropolitan community.

1. It is evident from recent studies that native vegetation continues to decline in Nillumbik, and that clearing is a leading and damaging cause. There is passing mention of efforts to conserve and protect biodiversity but I cannot find a single recommended action in the entire draft document aimed at actually enhancing the natural environment, or increasing the quality and quantity of native vegetation –outcomes that are required of a proper GWMP (Appendix 1). 2. On the contrary, there are worrisome statements such as "native plants and animals have intrinsic value but that there is also a need for balanced outcomes. Maintaining a healthy natural environment is vital but creates a complex challenge to find the right balance between protection and how we use land." The use of the word "balance" is inappropriate in this situation. The purpose of the green wedge is to "balance" (offset) urbanisation in the non-green wedge areas of Melbourne. The balance is NOT to be achieved WITHIN the green wedge. That would degrade its value to metropolitan Melbourne.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Strongly do not support

1. Economic activities within the green wedge are only acceptable if they, in no way,

reduce or put at risk the environmental and landscape values of the green wedge which are its raison d'etre. It is appropriate for the GWMP to seek to improve the quality, efficiency and sustainability of such economic activities, but it is entirely inappropriate to promote their expansion in the green wedge. The purpose of the green wedge is to provide a counter balance to the economic activity happening in the non-green wedge areas of Melbourne. To encourage or support expanded economic activities within the green wedge is not one of its functions: contrarily it threatens its primary function. 2. Visitors to Nillumbik's Green Wedge from metropolitan Melbourne should be welcomed, since that fits with the green wedge's function, but that is not the same thing as boosting the "visitor economy" (page 38). The difference is critical.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Strongly do not support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5?

To encourage private landowners in the green wedge to use the land responsibly, the draft prefers education/empowerment over regulation/enforcement. To illustrate this preference, the draft is critical of the requirement of an owner of cleared land to get a planning permit before farming it. I disagree strongly. There is not a choice between education/empowerment and regulation/enforcement. Both are needed, and both need strengthening. An analogy is the manner in which private vehicle owners are encouraged to use the road responsibly. This is done through a combination of strong education coupled with decisive regulation/enforcement. The suggestion that obtaining a permit is an impediment to doing the right thing lacks credibility. It harks back to the outdated attitude that landowners should have unfettered rights to how they use their land. In today's world, successful and harmonious communities can only function if individual rights are subordinate to community rights. In view of both the decline in (net loss of) the green wedge's indigenous vegetation and its importance to Melbourne's growing population, Nillumbik's Green Wedge desperately needs tighter management and stronger Council leadership than is currently the case. The Government's Plan Melbourne 2017-2050 document states that the GWMP must aim to "achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation". The draft does not do this.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

There are some worthwhile sentiments expressed in the draft GWMP, but these are overshadowed by its serious shortcomings. In addition to the criticisms outlined above, I have the following general comments: 1. As stated about, the draft vision for the plan

focuses exclusively on people. The same is true of the first paragraph in the draft's introduction (page 7) which highlights firstly landscape values (and omits environmental values) and, secondly, the benefits to people (and omits the importance of and needed benefits for other species). The catch-phase "Living in the Landscape" is another example of this disturbingly narrow human-centric focus, 2. Important features of Nillumbik's Green Wedge are the diversity of its indigenous flora and fauna and the quantity and quality of native vegetation, yet the draft GWMP makes no attempt either to describe these features, or to report on their status, or to identify the threats to them, or to recommend measures to enhance them. All these matters are fundamental components and inputs to a proper plan of action. The draft fails to address any. The statistical analysis headed "The green wedge key data" on pages 16-17 is all about people, housing and employment. Where is the data describing all the wonderful native plant species, wildlife and the scenic vistas which are the essence of the green wedge? 2. Nillumbik's Green Wedge and its paramount environment values clearly need better protection. In fact, that is a requirement of its management plan. Instead the draft plan promotes the economic exploitation of the green wedge and the relaxation of environmental protections, both of which are diametrically opposite to what the plan is required to do. The most egregious instances are: that the green wedge should accommodate residential growth (page 22); and that a balance should be sought between protecting the green wedge's natural environment and how people use green wedge land (page 29). 3. As currently drafted, this proposed plan is a huge step backwards in proper management of Nillumbik's Green Wedge and, if implemented, will accelerate the demise of its irreplaceable and precious environmental and landscape values.

A5.1 Acknowledging the critical role of small and large landholders is fundamental to the sustainable management of the GW given that 80% of it is privately owned. A5.6 Agree that the RCZ is intended to support conservation and should be applied to land for which that is the primary purpose. However, there has been long-term disparity and tension between the existing RCZ Zoning, both the historic and existing landscapes and existing mixed land uses on the myriad of smaller 'lifestyle' properties or 'hobby farms'. Also, existing cleared grazing land is not recognized or valued under the RCZ, despite its prevalence throughout the Nillumbik Green Wedge and its fundamental role in supporting agriculture and rural lifestyles. By valuing and preserving existing grazing land for agricultural uses, this helps to ensure the conservation of areas of high value biodiversity.

This was the distinguishing characteristic of Nillumbik from its beginnings. It is the reason we live here. It should be the basis upon which we engage and connect.

As a resident of the Bend of Islands, I have come to understand the importance of environmental protection outside the Environmental Living Zone, and the importance of biodiversity throughout the Green Wedge, to help to protect our indigenous flora and fauna.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

I found the Green Wedge Management Plan to be painful to read. It is a terribly disappointing outcome of such widespread community consultation and activity, the strongest message of which was that we cherish high environmental values for the Green Wedge and want them maintained. This is the reason I moved here and choose to live here. The Green Wedge Management Plan must reaffirm the Shire's conservation role with the Green Wedge as its Strategic Focus. This draft consistently fails to do this. It lacks detail and omits significant objectives, relevant actions, and accountability measures that would ensure the long-term health and purpose of the Green Wedge.

The five key moves seem to have been written in haste by somebody with little understanding of environmental issues nor of actions needed to ensure the maintenance of the Green Wedge. Much more detail is needed in a much more thorough examination of indicators which show the true health of the environment and the causes of decline. A pretty poor effort all round for such an important plan. The council would do well to examine the content of the existing Green Wedge plan (2010 – 2025). This document, which did not need to be rewritten, outlines a much more comprehensive plan to ensure ongoing protection of the Green Wedge in terms of restoring areas where vegetation has been removed or for other reasons no longer exists due in some cases to climate change. As a bottom line any actions taken must ensure the protection of the natural environment. That is what the Green Wedge are about but that is not what this new version seems to be about. Apart from ignoring the community feedback the Council has also ignored proper process in not following State Government requirements in the preparation of the new plan and in its failure to establish a project steering group.

The principles lack knowledge of Nillumbik, its land, its people, and its history. And then proposes how Nillumbik should proceed based on what appears to be an homogenous plan lifted from a similar enquiry in another municipality. Again the simplistic and broadbrush approach to these principles speaks of a rush job and/or a lack of expertise in the preparation of major environmental protection documents. It also reflects the views of someone who sees everything in terms of an economic outcome.

The one underlying aim should be to educate the community about what a green wedge is and how it can be supported, maintained, preserved. Once that is done we can look at

further actions. The plan needs to make it clear that Nillumbik has needs which are very different to those in a non green wedge municipality. It should also be about mitigating the impacts of climate change.

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2?

I am concerned about some of the wording of the objectives: For example 02.6 Ensure that council owned heritage places are accessible and sustainable and make better use of our heritage assets to support cultural tourism initiatives and leverage further economic benefits for green wedge communities. What does 'leverage further economic benefits' mean and what about protecting existing environmental values? Also A2.7 Use the Nillumbik Planning Scheme as a positive means to encourage heritage conservation and management, including support of adaptive reuse of heritage places and allowing prohibited uses, if they help support the conservation of a heritage place and are in line with planning policy objectives. How does 'allowing prohibited uses' 'encourage heritage conservation'?

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3? Strongly do not support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3?

There are several points which refer to 'balance' as an objective which seems to suggest that protection of the environment needs to be balanced against the need for economic development in green wedge. I am concerned about the following in particular. Highly relevant is the Victorian Government's Biodiversity Strategy 2037 which sets out the roadmap to stop the decline of our biodiversity and achieve overall biodiversity improvement over the next 20 years. It acknowledges that native plants and animals have intrinsic value but that there is also a need for balanced outcomes. Maintaining a healthy natural environment is vital but creates a complex challenge to find the right balance between protection and how we use land. What is a 'balanced outcome' in terms of the intrinsic value of native plants and animals? Can native plants and animals become collateral damage?

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4?

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4?

The purpose of the Green Wedge is not to `facilitate economic growth'. Any further development of agricultural and tourism and other businesses in green wedges should not be at the cost of maintaining and sustaining and indeed improving the natural environment. The maintenance of the green wedge is paramount and not business development. Neither is it the job of the Shire of Nillumbik or any other municipal council in Australia to `create better conditions for economic growth and employment generation'. That is the role of State and Federal governments. If Nillumbik does not have enough money to manage the green wedge then it needs to either raise rates or lobby the State Government. Nillumbik is the custodian of one part of a system of green wedges across Melbourne and manages it for the benefit and use of all Melburnians and so it is incumbent on all Melburnians to pay for its maintenance. To suggest that Nillumbik should look to the green wedge to provide income is to forget what the green wedge is about. Should all municipal green wedge custodians take the view that the green wedges are some sort of cash cow to be exploited when councils are short of money then those green wedges do not have a future. The objectives are muddle headed. 04.2 wishes to encourage productive agriculture and A4.4 wants to ensure that land remains available for agriculture and discourage the further fragmentation of agricultural lands, while 04.4 wants to support the equine community, a community which has effectively locked away a significant portion of Nillumbik's agricultural land, introduced weeds and erosion to bushland and generally degraded the environment. Is it a surprise that the current Mayor is a horse riding lobbyist?

The current council has a poor record with regard to proper consultation with the community. That includes listening and acting . That sort of behaviour on a number of issues has undermined public trust in the council and the process and credibility of this whole draft GWMP Before proceeding with plans for economic development of the green wedge Council must show the community that perseveration of the existing environment is paramount and that any economic development must put the environment first.

Throughout the draft GWMP it seems clear to me that there is a hidden agenda. I say this because I know that the views of those chosen to represent the community were largely ignored. I also know that some councillors have a background in Liberal probusiness politics – including both current and former mayors - which sees exploiting the environment as being ok if there is a positive economic outcome. If there is some environmental damage along the way then that is the cost of creating jobs and economic opportunity, blah, blah, blah. In that sense I see the draft as a political document with an agenda that is obvious in some parts of the plan. I am also concerned that we still have a GWMP in place and so the council needs to explain adequately why a new one is needed.

This goal will take care of itself if the focus on ensuring Nillumbik's biodiversity is the top priority. Green space is essential in our increasingly busy lives in increasingly cramped suburban dwellings as over-development is rife, not just because it enables physical activity but also because it has been shown to promote higher levels of mental wellbeing and social connectedness.

All indigenous vegetation needs to b protected and conserved throughout the Shire, on private and public land. The community must work together to focus on increasing habitat for wildlife and connectivity; preserving biodiversity; valuing what ecosystems provide; developing a 'systems view' (the web of life - all is interdependent and no

species lives in isolation); address the climate change and extinction crises, and the need to transform to an ecologically sustainable society. This must become the underpinning ethos that guides the Actions and all other aspects of the plan, without compromise.

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4?

There will be no economy if we don't have a healthy environment and the protections to keep it from continual degradation. This goal is not a priority in it's current wording and should reflect 'A prosperous eco-friendly Green Wedge economy'. Support for local agriculture is important but must always provide for the continuing health of the environment. New systems that respect and promote regenerative farming including water conservation, Indigenous knowledge, and indigenous flora and fauna must be encouraged. The obvious link between sustainable agricultural practices, climate change mitigation and a healthy Green Wedge, must be central to the GWMP.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5?

It needs to explain that Nillumbik residents have an obligation to care for the land, not degrade it, and this must be for the entirety of their tenure. Responsible stewardship also asks that the land, its diverse ecosystems and waterways, are passed on in a better state. Council must educate residents about these matters, and lead the way by increasing revegetation of indigenous flora throughout the Shire. This draft plan suggests the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) is too restrictive of farming practices and this zoning should only be applied to land with higher conservation values. This suggestion puts at serious risk flora and fauna across a significant proportion of the Shire, whether as single trees in paddocks or scattered pockets of remnant bush. These are all vital and in need of greater care and protection, not less. This Goal in its entirety must place much greater emphasis on the need to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation.' (Refer 1st item in Appendix 1 of draft GWMP - Plan Melbourne 2017-2050).

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

It is clear from initial community consultation and the Panel Report that Nillumbik residents and the wider population of Melbourne want the Green Wedge protected to a much higher standard, focusing on high environmental values and controls. Any new GWMP must be based on these requirements and deliver them without fail. At the moment the draft GWMP lacks detail, omits significant objectives, actions and accountability measures that would promote environmental protection as being a priority. Declines in biodiversity are at critical levels, and there is urgent need for action by all levels of government and society. There is a worrying lack of detail throughout the document regarding the protection and enhancement of the Shire's biodiversity in all its forms and varying quality. Clearly defined actions need to be included which will address this problem to ensure the long term protection of the Green Wedge for the future health and benefit of our communities, including plant and animal communities.

Do you have any comments about the Vision?

I think the Vision has too much emphasis on people and not enough focus on the function of Green Wedges to conserve native vegetation and wildlife habitat. By making the whole emphasis of the vision about people and their ability to "live in the landscape" and not enough on the broader responsibility of Council other than through supporting the community living in the landscape to enact the Vision. I think the Vision as stated makes the whole plan entirely too dependent on individuals and does not reflect the contribution that the whole of the Shire and indeed all of Melbourne and Victoria need to make.

I think the Vision should also reflect the role that the GWMP can play in mitigating against climate change, as well as adapting to it. The current draft acknowledges climate change but only seems to discuss options for adaptation, not mitigation. Preservation of vegetation generally, and tree cover in particular, contributes to both climate change adaptation and mitigation. This plan should identify a goal that sees reversal of the current trend of tree and vegetation loss seen across Nillumbik 2014- 2018 (RMIT 2019). The Vision should indicate mention climate change in support of this component.

I think the Vision should also acknowledge Indigenous Australians, although the introduction to the draft notes the stewardship of the land over thousands of years by the Wurundjeri-willam clan, there is insufficient discussion in the rest of the draft that acknowledges their knowledge and special relationship with the land. Including respect for this heritage in the Vision would help set the tone and provide for further consideration of the local Indigenous community throughout the plan.

I feel as though responding to this is almost a trick question. These Principles are important (to varying degrees to me) but it is how they are applied towards what outcomes that is important. I think there is evidence even within the process adopted for developing this draft plan that the Principles are one thing on paper but another in action. eg the "Leadership" shown when Council could not follow its own stated (and expensive) process for community consultation on the development of the plan called in to question the elements of respect and integrity. Accepting the minority report of five panel members undermined the whole process. So Adaptability as a Principle might seem worthwhile for example when it supports action towards a stated outcome in light of new information, however when it enables a change of plan in response to pressure

from lobby groups - not so great.

I think there should also be a Principle that reflects the importance of protection of biodiversity and habitat in its own right, not as the Principles currently have this linked with a general statement around "irreversible harm to the environment and the people who live in it".

I don't think the detail around sustainability and the precautionary principle provides clarity.

I think this Goal and its objectives need to be much more closely aligned with the purpose of the Green Wedges to conserve native vegetation and wildlife habitat, otherwise it is just a way of doing business, which could apply to any plan.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2? Yes active and creative people are important however in what context, what type of activity?

Again, I think this Goal and its objectives need to be much more closely aligned with the purpose of the Green Wedges to conserve native vegetation and wildlife habitat, otherwise it is just a motherhood statement.

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3? Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3? I support this Goal in general as I think it is the closest of the Goals to what I see the intent of the Green Wedge Management Plan should set out. However even here I don't think it sufficiently prioritises the importance of ALL indigenous vegetation, nor the urgent need to conserve it across the whole Shire, on both private and public land.

I am also concerned by the use of the word balance in relation to this goal as though we need to balance environmental health against other considerations. This provides an opportunity for unacceptable compromise.

For example, action A3.12 suggestions "balance amenity uses of our waterways with environmental considerations and balance private use of flows through extraction and diversion with community and environmental considerations." In this balancing in the context of community engagement is the voice for the environment. The GWMP needs to provide that voice and be the place where environmental considerations are prioritised. Noting too that without optimal environmental health, ultimately any opportunity for other activity and considerations will be lost anyway.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4? I don't think this Goal and its associated objectives and actions gives sufficient considerations to the mechanisms for environmental protections in the context of building a prosperous economy.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5?

Of course responsible leadership is important, but I don't think the summary of leadership provides sufficient clarity, nor are the objectives and key actions for this goal are sufficiently oriented to what I view as the key priority for a GWMP - protection of environmental and natural resources.

For example where stewardship of the land is mentioned it should explain the obligation Nillumbik residents have to care for the land, not to degrade it, and that this occurs throughout their tenure and is passed on to subsequent landowners in a better state. I think too much concern is given to living in the green wedge being a burden with demands, and something that people have to cope with. This thinking needs to be reframed and the opportunity, privilege and honour of being in a position to preserve and improve the environment in which one lives, needs to be given far greater emphasis.

For example the draft plan suggests the Rural Conservation Zone (RCZ) is too restrictive of farming practices and this zoning should only be applied to land with higher conservation values. We should be looking to increase the conservation values on more land not put the flora and fauna across a significant proportion of the Shire, including trees in paddocks, pockets of remnant bush, at serious risk by downgrading the zoning.

This goal should also make a clear statement about responsibility for leadership on climate change mitigation.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

At this critical point in history we have the opportunity to make decisions at the local level that will have long lasting and far reaching impacts. The Green Wedges will always be under pressure, particularly around the boundaries and on the fringes of abutting zones, there will be continual pressure to develop and small scale encroachment. Slowly, slowly if allowed these small incremental changes undermine the integrity of the whole. There will always be those that view the natural world as a limitless resource with infinite capacity to rebound, despite the evidence of history. Opportunities for personal gain for a few at the expense of the greater common good will be a recurring theme. Now more than ever people with power need to use it wisely.

It is important to note that stakeholders in the Nillumbik GW are not only the people who live in the green wedge part of the Shire, and that these people do not have sole rights to the decisions made in relation to their properties. Although this is a basic principle of living anywhere ie that we have to follow rules that may limit our individual freedoms for the benefit of the greater common good, this can be difficult to accept, particularly for

people who have acreage properties where much of the appeal is the sense of freedom and isolation from the world. As a resident in the GW zone I do understand that these properties are expensive to maintain and there are other associated costs as well, and that external regulations can be frustrating at times.

I hope that at this time the people in power at Nillumbik use it wisely and do not make decisions that cause irrevocable harm for all life in Nillumbik and beyond.

Leadership in demonstrating to the community the importance of working together to preserve and increase habitat for our indigenous species, the importance of connectivity (VEAC has done some excellent work in this space), protecting and valuing our existing ecosystems, making sure that

initiatives to address the impact of climate change are at the forefront. This is what this Plan needs to be about. I am particularly critical of the use of the term "balance" throughout this Goal, as if there needs to be a trade off in environmental values. State, Federal and International reports all stress the need to prioritise the health of the environment. The Plan attempts to justify, based on studies, areas with less significant vegetation should be not be subjected to the same levels of environment protection. This almost beggars belief, these are the areas in which the natural environment is already under the greatest pressure, and Council should be introducing measures to protect and enhance the biodiversity in these areas, not allowing them to be further degraded. I live in an area where there is significant native vegetation, and continue to be worried by the ever reducing number of observable species which have disappeared or are rarely seen. We need Council to show leadership in educating our communities in the critical importance of caring for our environment, our ecosystems, and ways to reduce the impact of climate change and the wonderful benefits of living in a Shire which has the highest values of all the Green Wedges.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4? Again, I do not support this goal because of the lack of detail. I have spent more than 35 years of my professional life in the economic development space, working in almost every municipality in Victoria. Economic Development is of great importance to all municipalities, however in some very different and varying contexts. Nillumbik was not established as, nor will it ever be, an economic development powerhouse for the State, with significant areas set aside for industry and business. The challenge for Council is to again show leadership and encourage economic development and a prosperous economy through the lens of environmental protection. This is a fundamental requirement for Nillumbik, and goes back to its establishment. Again, the Council appears to have ignored the essential guidance provided by the State in the Planning Practice Note on the preparation of Green Wedge management plans, under the requirement for a framework that encourages sustainable land management practices. Local agriculture in our Green Wedge is an important contributor to a prosperous local economy, however it must operate in the context of the continuing improvement in the health of the environment, and under the encouragement and leadership of Council in this regard. In "cleared land areas" of the Rural Conservation Zone, the retention of the requirement to obtain a permit to commence farming in the Rural Conservation Zone is critical. Council (and the public) has to be in a position to assess what is proposed for a new farming activity, and to ensure that land improvement and biodiversity regeneration works carried out are protected and enhanced. The Green Wedge provisions in the State section of the planning scheme make clear what is required in terms of linkages between existing agriculture and tourism opportunities. The State Government is

currently carrying out a review to possibly strengthen these controls, and Council needs to again show leadership and be in step in this regard.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5?

Again, I do not support this Goal because of the lack of detail. Responsible leadership is something that Council needs to adopt and demonstrate throughout this Plan. The Plan refers to "stewardship" of the land, and this needs to be better defined under this Goal, in the context of explaining to community members that they have a fundamental obligation in the Green Wedge to care for their land, and to improve its environmental values. Strong Council leadership is again required in the education of residents on the need to increasingly re vegetate with indigenous flora throughout the Shire. The suggestion that the Rural Conservation Zone is too restrictive on farming practices needs to be dismissed, again it is out of step with State government policies and recent VCAT decisions. Requirement for the retention of scattered trees, as specified under current State policy, has been upheld in recent VCAT decisions. What is required of Council under this Goal is a much greater emphasis on what is set out in Plan Melbourne "maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation". Council again needs to show leadership and allocate resources to enforce these policies. The proposed changes to allow other uses within the Green Wedge need to be dismissed. The entertainment by Council of changes to the Urban Growth Boundary/s around townships, to allow residential and commercial development again beggars belief. Council is aware of the extensive processes which was undertaken by the State and Councils to fix the current boundaries. Leadership by Council to show the way in respect of the future use, protection and enhancement of the Green Wedge is required, not a series of attempts to erode its values, to the detriment of our children, our grandchildren and all future generations.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

I find it difficult to come to terms with the fact that the Council has pushed on with its attempt to instigate and implement new policies and practices via this Green Wedge Management Plan, when the existing Plan reflects the demonstrated majority of views by residents, as evidenced by the initial community consultation and the subsequent Community Panel report. Further, and perhaps more importantly, the processes

undertaken by Council have generated the unquestionable message that residents and the wider population cherish the higher environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. My own local experience demonstrates to me the need for leadership from Council to educate our communities on the need to contribute to actions to reduce the impact of climate change. By proceeding down the pathway to implement this Plan, without significant revisions, I believe that Council leaves itself open to serious scrutiny by State and Federal Governments.

The current GWMP has much greater detail than this new draft, and should be used as a basis for improvement.

Even though I support much of the sentiment in what is written, I disagree that these principles as written can/will guide implementation of the GWMP Principles are the guiding rules or values that underpin decision-making around the GWMP and help decision-makers determine if potential actions are rightful or wrongful. Many of the listed 'principles', although their intent is good, are not written in a way that they can be used as principles, eg: "Aboriginal voice: we have much to learn from our first peoples, particularly about caring for country". Yes, we do have much to learn, but as written this is not a principle that can underpin decision-making. Each Principle is a very broad statement and it is unclear how they will be interpreted and applied while ensuring care for the environment.

Clear, shared goals for the Green Wedge land and landscape, consistent with the purpose of green wedges and coupled with a culture of shared custodianship across the community, is what is needed to effectively engage the community in management of the green wedge. Clarity of purpose is also essential when seeking to establish strategic partnerships with regional and state agencies. This draft GWMP does not deliver on this front.

Goal 2: Active and creative people

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2?

This goal struggles to have any logical connection to management of the green wedge, and again in the absence of a an agreed and shared view of what the green wedge land, landscape, natural environment and agriculture should be like in the future, and how the community are acting as custodians of the land, I cannot support the objective or key actions for Goal 2. 4 of the 7 actions are to implement other plans, 1 is to develop and implement a fifth plan, 1 is to justify a development in Eltham (outside of the GW), and the last action stupidly proposes to "allow prohibited uses"!

Goal 3: Safe and healthy environments

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 3?

This is the only place in the document where the natural environment gets a mention, and it still does not attempt to describe what the desired future for our natural environment in the green wedge should be. Until this is established and agreed on, we cannot know what outcome we are managing for. As such, I cannot support the objectives and key actions for Goal 3. Is it the health of the environment or the community that this goal is aimed at? Nowhere does it say that the natural environment needs to be made and kept healthy, let alone what that might look like.

Goal 4: A prosperous economy

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 4? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4?

Creating a prosperous economy is not the primary role of the green wedge, it is to protect biodiversity assets and support existing and potential agribusiness activities. In affording this protection, one can seek to enable viable businesses that contribute to the local economy, in particular those directly related to regenerative agricultural production and eco-tourism. I cannot support this goal, it objectives or actions in the absence of a clear and community-supported desired future for the natural environment and agriculture in the green wedge. This section must clearly focus on overall environmental protection. Economic activities must be assessed and altered in response to latest science and the urgent need for environmental protections. This must be reflected in the title of the Goal, the Actions, and throughout the plan, for example, 'A prosperous eco-friendly Green Wedge economy'.

Goal 5: Responsible leadership

To what extent do you support the objectives and key actions for Goal 5? Do not Support

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5? Council's leadership does need to be responsible, and its decisions need to be evidence-based and made in the interests of the state, wider Melbourne and our green wedge land and landscape, especially its natural environment, biodiversity and agriculture. It also needs to help develop a community culture of custodianship of these assets. Council needs to hold the big picture perspective and responsibly apply its position, influence and powers to ensure this is translated to the local and property scale. In the absence of a clear and agreed desired future for the natural environment and agriculture in the green wedge to guide decision-making, I cannot support goal 5 and its actions.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

1. The draft Nillumbik GWMP has lost sight of, or ignored, the purpose of green wedges, which is to, amongst other things, protect biodiversity assets, and support existing and potential agribusiness activities. 2. The draft GWMP makes no attempt to provide an analysis of the biodiversity, agricultural and other values of the green wedge, nor to articulate what is the desired future for the green wedge land and landscape, in fact the land and the landscape rarely get a mention. 3. The draft Nillumbik GWMP does not identify the values and features of the Nillumbik green wedge, the preferred future land uses, or the environmental and natural resources that should be protected. 4. This draft Nillumbik GWMP is shambolic in its structure and is lacking any clear logical framework to tie it all together. The context spiels are rambling, vague and unstructured, and the

actions are vague and at best only loosely connected to the objectives. This is in part due to the fact that the recommendations of the community panel have been inserted without any adjustment to ensure they fit the context they are inserted into.

Yes of course this is important but it should not override other avenues of information regarding the environment. There is also the concern and it has been the situation, that it is a cop out regarding responsible care of the environment for example - If you put the duty of care in the hands of aboriginal people then council doesn't have to take responsibility.

This is a complicated document and it would have been better the option for partially agree was included.

Community hubs such as St Andrews have a rental fee. Would utilizing the facility mean harassing people to rent the space? The concept of volunteerism is abused in Nillumbik. If you don't conform to agenda of the department, you can be bullied, victimized and defamed. Volunteer contribution is used as a weapon. If you have volunteered in the past - no acknowledgement is given for your participation. In fact repression of this information can be deliberately used against you.

Volunteerism should be about participating in a way you want to and not to justify the existence of a facility or agenda of the officer. In other organizations in which I volunteer the experience is positive.

The concept of identities and the use of community facilities is also abused, as an artist I have had my work promoted in a way that I didn't want. This was done without consent and because I wouldn't conform to the image that was thrust upon me I have experienced discrimination.

Community bus drivers are vital for the social necessities of of older people. They should not be volunteers but should be paid as they are by other councils.

The development of bike tracks should not impact on the environment as it has done in the recent past. There are now more and more "no go" places in the area as these tracks have been developed over the walking paths that served the needs of the locals. The only option being to walk on the road as often bike riders fail to take pedestrians into consideration.

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 2?

Again this section should have a partially agree clause.

Aboriginal cultural sites have not been protected. There are piles of middens everywhere and sadly recently a large tree stump of heritage significance was cut down in the sealing of of Rodger Road - this was not an obstacle or hazard, it was removed because it wasn't neat. Near it is a pile of artifacts on both side of the road reserve so the tree would have been of significance to aboriginal people also it is situated near a natural gully.

I think the public art program is a "let them eat cake" policy. It is a distraction from the issues that need to be addressed in the community. So much money is being thrown at Art and Culture to implement a policy that continues to be discriminatory, supports restrictive trade practice and encourages monopolies.

The Open Studios Program used to be fantastic but since 2012 has lost much of its

integrity. Some of the individuals involved are not averse to networking against and undermining the achievements of others, individuals can acquire your ideals and market themselves thus and there is no consideration of intellectual copyright.

Again I partially support this. But I believe that the bush fire threat is out of context and does not warrant the extreme measures that have been taking place. Black Saturday was a disaster because of the complete breakdown in communication. People in Ninks Rd, smelling smoke rang the CFA only to be told there was no fire in the area, only to be contacted later - too late. We had no fire warnings on the day in our area, were were watching the TV and listening to the radio we could see the smoke of Kinglake, but no fire warnings were on the media - they came the day later!

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4? Again I support some

Regarding the sale of produce. Quite often small growers that try and sell at markets experience difficulties due to food regulations and council licenses. The little back-yarder who has a few tomatoes to sell has no place now. Also people who sell at Markets have to stick to their main product - if they have a few tomatoes to spare they can't sell them. Price fixing is the norm with no competition available for the consumers benefit. This make for a very boring market and discourages market goers.

The Wineries may have to diversify - we are now told that one glass of wine is bad for us. Perhaps they could look to wine vinegar production or other products such as grape must preparations or dried fruit.

I think that there is an opening in our community for fire wood production - I don't men cutting down trees and harvesting fallen logs but in growing wattles for fire wood production. Our local species of wattle are quick to grow and are fantastic firewood, better than River Red Gum. They would provide temporary homes and food for birds, mammals and reptiles and could be grown with appropriate fire breaks around them. There growth would help to restore areas damaged by overgrazing.

The horse industry is not accountable. It should be subject to the same regulation that

other pet owners are subject too. We have to pay \$50.00 to register our tiny cat that is locked in all day, by size comparison horse registration should be well over \$1000.00 a year. Their global and environmental impact is huge - they are just not sustainable. You have only to look at the property next door to the Smiths Gully Store to see the environmental degradation that has taken place. Put on an unsuitable formally beautiful bush block, the horses have to be continually fed hay to sustain them. This is not the only property where this misuse has taken place. Riding club members have to clean up the manure that is dropped by their horses but outside these grounds horses can poo anywhere - on the footpath, in the bush - which creates weeds and impacts on the native flora and people have to walk in it. We are required to pick up after our dogs! Also there is no limit to the amount of horses that can be owned and put on such a block. The horse registration fee cold be used to support the work of the RSPCA.

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 5? I have already outlined my concerns in my previous communication. I do not want to encourage trails for cycling - they have happened at the expense of the environment and local community users.

I do not support Festivals, the Hurstbridge township has been distorted because of the Wattle Festival. The Panton Hill Festival is just another method of social engineering and the victimizing of individuals who don't conform to a marketed image that is thrust upon them.

I do support fairs and I think that an Antiques Fair would go particularly well in Panton Hill. Fryerstown Antiques Fair was closed by the CFA and has really left a gap. Panton Hill has the same vibe as Fryerstown. Anyone could sell their collectables, it could be held on the oval and its surrounds. People could sell food and the winery could still open.

For Example: A3.12, P 33, speaks of balancing amenity, environmental considerations, private water extraction and community considerations. What needs to take place is prioritisation of environmental considerations, as without optimal environmental health, all other activity and considerations will be constrained.

These are all vital and in need of greater care and protection, not less.

I fail to see why there is an 'economic' aspect to the GWMP. Surely we are attempting to protect and enhance the environmental landscapes within the wedge, not encouraging more businesses to set up in the area. Historically, business development and environmental protection are not good bedfellows. I do not believe the protection of the Green Wedge requires any economic development to be successful, in fact it is another unnecessary pressure on our natural places.

There are plenty of places within the shire, and within Melbourne, where economic development can be encouraged; a green wedge is not one of them. Besides, according to the ABS, Nillumbik is one of the wealthiest municipalities in Australia and also has one of the lowest unemployment rates. Therefore I believe that the economic aspect of the GWMP is of a very low priority.[

Move 1: I do agree that educating landowners on good land management practices is a sound idea. However, it is essential that improving 'habitat' and 'biodiversity' is an integral part of this educational process. There is no mention of that here.

Move 2: A 'whole of organisation approach' implies to me that all residents within the shire can have their input into decision making regards various GW issues. If this is the case, then I would support this model, as it is a very inclusive method of resolving 'difficult' issues.

Move 3: Having ongoing sharing of ideas amongst the stakeholders is in principle a good idea. Greater understanding of other people's perspectives could lead to a more conciliatory approach to decision making and it may bring the community 'closer' together in realising the overall benefits to the GW.

Move 4: A 'planning and place management service' for townships may have value if undertaken for the right reasons. If the planning is simply to increase tourism and increase the town's population, then I'm pretty sure that most GW township residents and other GW residents would be against this. Most residents of the GW are there because they love being surrounded by nature in a small rural environment. They are generally happy as it is now and I believe that the large majority would be against any planning to increase tourism or town populations.

At last, on page 29 of the draft we start talking about habitat, biodiversity and climate change. So far we have only talked about how the GW can benefit people, with only passing regard to how it can benefit native flora and fauna. This goal should be paramount, as recommended by the Community Panel.

A3.2 - I would be totally against any review that would lessen the environmental protection afforded by the Environmental Protection Overlays.

Do you have any comments about the objectives or key actions for Goal 4?

I fail to see how developing a GWMP involves encouraging investment and the establishment of new businesses in the GW. As already mentioned, according to the ABS, Nillumbik has one of the highest household incomes and lowest unemployment rates in the country. As suggested by the Panel, the GW should not be considered as a cash cow to be exploited by a small number of people for their own benefit. This type of activity can take place anywhere else in the country, outside of National Parks and Green Wedges. The value of a GW should be measured by the environmental health of the landscape, not by its economic potential.

I am therefore against any of the objectives or actions that encourage 'economic growth' within the GW.

Except for A5.6, I agree with the intent of these goals and actions.

A5.6 - So we change the zoning controls to better reflect the actual use of the land? So, the suggestion here is that people can use their land for whatever they wish and the zoning controls will be adjusted to fit in with them. To me, this is totally back to front. People need to comply to zoning controls, not the other way around.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

I find this Draft GWMP to be very anthropocentric, in that it concentrates on what people can get out of the GW, rather than how we can improve the environmental quality and biodiversity of our wonderful landscape. It's like it was written by a public servant hidden in the bowels of a finance department somewhere. It seems that the recommendations from the Community Panel have been changed to alter the emphasis of the different goals.

The fact that we are having this review at all, for a GWMP that was to run for another 5 years, says a lot about the current Council's objective of reducing the environmental protections within the Wedge, so that landholders have more freedom to do whatever they wish.

Green Wedges were originally introduced so that Melbournians would have natural open space close to where they live in the suburbs. The idea was that they would improve the liveability of Melbourne and be the 'lungs of Melbourne.' They were never intended to simply be another area for developers and businesses to exploit.

Fortunately, the GW in Nillumbik has largely been retained due to the historical support of previous generations of residents, who had a strong environmental appreciation of the landscape they lived in. As a result, they protected the GW with passionate fervour. We, the current generation, are now the custodians of the land, with a responsibility to continue the protection of Nillumbik's GW, so that future generations can enjoy the natural beauty of the area as we do.

The current Green Wedge Management plant is effective til 2025. This Draft says very little about why a new draft is required. If a review is needed there needs to be greater discussion around how the proposed draft improves on or builds on the previous version. The current draft involved a community panel who had made recommendations that the retention of the Green Wedge remain as it presently stands. The present Draft does not respect the panel's recommendation; instead it paves the way for the council to develop the Green Wedge in a way that retract what the existing Green Wedge Management Plan recommends. I'm also concerned about the way the report is written. It reads generic in tone and does not read as if the author/s has little understanding of the previous draft and the community this proposal refers to. The draft lacks a good structure, glossary and reference list. The universality of the report and lack of specificity in the new proposal weakens the integrity of this council consultations process. Three concerns stand our for me. Firstly, the emphasis on economic prosperity as being a dominant feature of the presence of the Green Wedge. The report fails to clarify and quantify who will benefit from this prosperity, and how this prosperity will be of value to the community? Secondly, the intention to rezone some aspects of the Green

Wedge(GW) to allow landholders a right to farm will undermine existing the GW. The plan should concern itself with improving and building on current biodiversity. Further increasing planting to increase the GW capacity as a carbon sink. Thirdly,the wish to build up the GW towns of St Andrews, Panton Hill and Hurstbridge, will intensify further development, congestion weakening the natural beauty of the area, as well as the integrity of the GW.

Environmental protection and reinvigoration must be central to the Vision for the Green Wedge. The draft does not state this strongly enough, despite it being a Strategic Focus for the Shire. Appendix 1 of Council's draft quotes the State Government's 'Plan Melbourne 2017-2050', where the first priority for the Green Wedge is to 'Maintain and enhance the diversity of indigenous flora and fauna habitats and species and achieve a net gain in the quantity and quality of native vegetation." • Council's initial community engagement clearly demonstrated that the large majority of Nillumbik residents cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it maintained, protected and enhanced. This view was also expressed by the majority report of the Community Panel. Council's draft does not reflect strong enough support for the Community's position. The GWMP must reflect the fact that Nillumbik's Green Wedge is the most environmentally intact of Melbourne's Green Wedges, is a significant part of the wider Green Wedge system, and is for the benefit of everyone, whether they live in the area or not. • Climate change mitigation must be an overarching Goal for the GWMP and therefore must be addressed in the Vision. It must inform all objectives and actions such as regenerative agriculture, fire management, waste management, bush regeneration,

education, and economic strategy. Throughout the draft, the repeated mention of just adapting to climate change leaves the reader with the impression that Council has basically thrown their hands up in the air suggesting there is nothing that they nor Nillumbik residents can do to tackle climate change. This is not true and must be part of every day action. • It is vital that Nillumbik demonstrates its respect of Indigenous people, their cultural heritage and knowledge. This barely gets a mention in the GWMP despite the fact that Indigenous people have ensured the vitality of the area's biodiversity for tens of thousands of years.

Planning Practice Note 31 describes specific requirements for the development of a GWMP, including the establishment of a Project Steering Group chaired by Council with key stakeholder representatives. This did not occur. • This draft fails to clearly articulate an Implementation Plan based on clearly stated Objectives and Actions and the Council Department responsible for implementation. As stated in the State Government's Planning Practice Note 31, 'Each GWMP will set out a series of actions and measures that need to be undertaken, and identify resource requirements, roles and responsibilities, timelines, outcomes and evaluation.' The current GWMP has much greater detail than this new draft, and should be used as a basis for improvement. Click here for Planning Practice Note 31 . For a comparison to the draft GWMP, Click here for the current GWMP . • Each of the 'Five Key Moves' contain potentially useful ideas depending on how they are applied, and there needs to be much greater emphasis on

the care of the natural environment. • The document needs to describe in much greater detail the ACTIONS to be taken, and each of these must prioritise best environmental practice, ensuring the protection of ALL native vegetation and fauna across the Shire. • Every descriptor needs to clearly indicate how it will contribute to the protection and reinvigoration of biodiversity for the long term. The current GWMP 2010 - 2025 describes in much greater detail (than the new draft) the ways Council and community will ensure the protection of the green wedge. However there has been consistent net loss of vegetation. This demonstrates that any new plan must be stronger and clearer about the actions which will be taken to reverse this ongoing decline. The draft GWMP does not achieve this.

We're a relatively affluent population. Nillumbik is the perfect place to start turning things around. If not here and now, where and when?

• The strongest message from the initial community consultation and the Panel Report is that Nillumbik residents and the population of wider Melbourne cherish the high environmental values of the Green Wedge and want it to be maintained, protected and reinvigorated. This message must lay the foundation for any new GWMP. The current draft does not achieve this. • The Green Wedge Management Plan must reaffirm the Shire's conservation role with the Green Wedge as its Strategic Focus. This draft consistently fails to do this. It lacks detail and omits significant objectives, relevant actions, and accountability measures that would ensure the long-term health and purpose of the Green Wedge. • Declines in biodiversity are at critical levels, and there is urgent need for action by all levels of government and society. The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) states that, "The health of ecosystems on which we and all other species depend is deteriorating more rapidly than ever. We are eroding the very foundations of our economies, livelihoods, food security, health and quality of life worldwide. It is not too late to make a difference, but only if we start now at every level from local to global". • There is a worrying lack of detail throughout the document regarding the protection and enhancement of the Shire's biodiversity in all its forms and varying quality. Clearly defined actions need to be included which will address this problem to ensure the long term health of the Green Wedge. • The impact of invasive species – flora and fauna – is significant and this must be better addressed. • The draft speaks of polarised and diverse views and how conversations must be respectful and robust. It is vital that this is the case, and is supported by current science, particularly in relation to the need for environmental repair and preservation, and urgent climate change mitigation. • It is necessary that we uphold the highest of professional standards throughout the Shire and its Leadership.

The NHAG specifically acknowledges Actions:

A1.1 Valuing people, not solely the environment – they are interdependent. We agree that residents within the Green Wedge have 'high regard for the natural environment and the rural lifestyle that the landscape provides and invest in its management.'

A1.6 We agree with Action 1.6, however small (undersized) lots with existing dwellings that may be lost through bushfire, should have the right to rebuild.

A1.11 The NHAG acknowledge council's recognition of the importance of unsealed roads that provide for horse riding and other recreational users when considering sealing a road. Consideration and provision must be given to all road users, not just cars.

Roadside verges play a key role in the safety of recreational road users in the provision of off-road trails.

O3.4 The NHAG supports this objective and advocates for a safe refuge where residents can take their animals in the event of a significant bushfire.

O3.5 The NHAG has always maintained that the equine pasture properties in the rural Green Wedge contribute significantly to the natural beauty and sustainability of the GW and advocate that they be given equal protection as bushland in the Nillumbik Planning Scheme.

A3.1 Acknowledging and understanding the elements / components that combined make up the Nillumbik GW, is critical to understanding and planning for it and its effective management. We need to work from a factual base, not an ideological one that does not acknowledge the 'what is', the here and now and historical framework.

We believe in the recognition and protection of existing cleared grazing land and treed pastures for agricultural purposes, animal keeping, for fire breaks and the rural scenic amenity.

A3.2 Should a review of the ESOs be undertaken, apply an overlay for existing rural cleared pasture to place a value on it and preserve it through the Nillumbik Planning Scheme.

A3.4 NHAG would support any initiative for pest plant and animal management.

A3.5 NHAG supports responsible land management on public and private land and can assist council in delivering targeted equine land management education to residents.

A3.9 In any future review of the Nillumbik Planning Scheme with respect landscape character, there should be acknowledgement of the role rural grazing properties play in landscape character and vistas.

O4.3 Valuing of small landholders' contribution to land management given that most of the Green Wedge is in private ownership.

The NHAG maintains that equine grazing properties in the rural areas contribute significantly to the economic sustainability of the GW, as pasture properties and equine activities both create and contribute to local businesses.

O4.4 The NHAG value the recognition and support offered to the local equine community, acknowledging its integral role in the financial viability of our rural areas.

A4.9 The NHAG endorse the finalisation and implementation of the Nillumbik Equine Strategy to provide the data that substantiates the value of the equine community to the Nillumbik Green Wedge.

A4.10 Acknowledging the importance of safe walking, cycling and horse-riding trail options.

A safe network of shared trails of local and regional significance will provide both residents of and visitors to Nillumbik, the opportunity to safely enjoy the shire's

wonderful natural areas and landscapes, while financially supporting rural GW townships.

A5.1 Acknowledging the critical role of small and large landholders is fundamental to the sustainable management of the GW given that 80% of it is privately owned.

Supporting and empowering residents on acreage is a vital step towards achieving this. The NHAG have a role in supporting council's leadership in developing an information and support service for land use and management, particularly involving equine.

A5.3 The NHAG would be happy to be involved in any productive Green Wedge Conversations Program that brings about a more cohesive GW Community and productive outcomes.

A5.5 The NHAG supports this action and already works actively in this space. Like our assistance with the Nillumbik Equine Activities Study, we believe that quality information supports better decision making and policy.

A5.6 We agree that the RCZ is intended to support conservation and should be applied to land for which that is the primary purpose. However, there has been long-term disparity and tension between the existing RCZ Zoning, both the historic and existing landscapes and existing mixed land uses on the myriad of smaller 'lifestyle' properties or 'hobby farms'.

Also, existing cleared grazing land is not recognized or valued under the RCZ, despite its prevalence throughout the Nillumbik Green Wedge and its fundamental role in supporting agriculture and rural lifestyles. By valuing and preserving existing grazing land for agricultural uses, this helps to ensure the conservation of areas of high value biodiversity.

Other comments

Do you have any other comments about the Draft Green Wedge Management Plan?

The 'Green Wedge' isn't just land, it includes the people who live and work here and the communities they are part of.

The shire's 'natural environment' isn't just the bush. Our existing cleared grazing land

and treed pastures are equally represented and should be valued and protected, as they support popular rural uses such as the keeping of animals and underpin all agricultural activity in the shire. This needs to be reflected in our Local Planning Scheme.

The equine community's contribution is significant and far reaching. Hence, the NHAG recommend that the data from the Equine Activity Study should be incorporated (where appropriate) in this Green Wedge Management Plan.

We suggest that grazing land which supports the keeping of animals, helps guarantee a sustainable Green Wedge now and into the future. Small property acreage (which is the predominant landholding in the Nillumbik Green Wedge) is primarily suitable for 'hobby farms' and 'lifestyle properties' and keeping some grazing animals is often a big part of the appeal of living here. On settling in, people become part of our vibrant communities, enjoy and usually work hard on their properties, thereby contributing socially, economically and environmentally to the ongoing sustainability of our Green Wedge.

We feel that 'horse keeping' is one of the largest (if not the largest) rural 'activity group' and rural economic driver within the shire, not only in the number of properties that are used for this purpose, but the broad reach of the dollar benefit through affiliated industries and activity.

Horse keeping is a legitimate rural land use and hence the value and importance of horse properties in the management of land within the Nillumbik Green Wedge should be

recognized, acknowledged and supported.

All aspects of the shire's rural character should be afforded the same significance in contributing to and sustaining the Green Wedge. Combined they create the quintessential 'Nillumbik Landscape' that is so valued.

To meaningfully protect and prevent grazing on land of actual, identified (ground truthed) 'high biodiversity value', we suggest an initiative where property owners can access a voluntary take-up of 'Trust for Nature' Covenants that are sponsored by council.
