Celebrating our most outstanding and newest citizens

On our day of national reflection, we recognise those who make us proud to be Australian

Our 2020 Nillumbik Australia Day Award winners were announced on 26 January at the Eltham Community and Reception Centre.

We asked the community to nominate those people who make us proud to be Australian, and we were pleased to recognise the efforts of some of Nillumbik's most dedicated volunteers.

While their experiences are diverse, they have a few things in common: they are community-minded, hard-working people whose efforts help make Nillumbik a wonderful place to live, work and play.



Citizen of the Year – Neil Marshall

Now living in Doreen after spending more than 60 years as a resident of Pantom Hill, Neil has devoted countless hours to community committees, groups and organisations.

Neil has been a member of the Pantom Hill Fire Brigade for 59 years, including 10 years as president and nine as secretary, and he has been Community Safety Coordinator for the past two years.

He is a life member both of the brigade and of the CFA. Neil is also a member of the CFA District 14 Headquarters East Brigade and works in the Incident Control Centre on Total Fire Ban days. He has

been a fire tower observer at Kangaroo Ground Fire Tower for 18 years.

Neil is known for putting in long hours, going above and beyond, and sharing his extensive knowledge to benefit others.

During Black Saturday, Neil worked continuously in the Kangaroo Ground Incident Control Centre to provide invaluable local data and input on the fires.

Among Neil's other community contributions are an eight-year membership of the Hurstbridge Probus Club, during which he served terms as president and vice president; membership of the Shire of Nillumbik Memorials Advisory Committee for three years; a former role as a Pantom Hill Scout Troop leader; former membership of the On the Hill Festival and Pantom Hill Art and Craft Show, and 14 years as a member of the Friends of Kangaroo Ground War Memorial Park advisory committee, where he is currently vice president.

He also takes on the role of Master of Ceremonies at Anzac Day and Remembrance Day services at the Kangaroo Ground War Memorial Park.

In 2019, Neil was presented with an Australia Day Award for the Federal Electorate of Jagajaga.

Senior Citizen of the Year – Tony Barbeta



Our 2020 Senior Citizen of the Year is Tony Barbeta of St Andrews. Tony has been fundamental to the establishment and success of the St Andrews Men's Shed.

He has been involved with the group since its inception, including serving as president, and has worked tirelessly to develop the group.

Tony, 67, is the first to arrive at the Men's Shed, and the last to leave. He has devoted countless hours to the shed over the years. He helps keep a focus on men's health, actively recruits members, deals with grant bodies, manages the budget and assists members to complete projects.

Among the many community groups to have benefited from Tony's Men's Shed efforts are the St Andrews Community Centre; Eltham Living & Learning Centre; the Ceramics Collective; Landcare groups; Eltham traders; youth theatre groups, and other Nillumbik Men's Sheds.

Described as reliable, honest and dedicated, Tony has often flown under the radar and not received accolades for his commitment to his community. Council is pleased to celebrate Tony's achievements and acknowledge his admirable contributions to the community.

Volunteer of the Year – Carol Jenkinson



Cottles Bridge resident Carol Jenkinson is Volunteer of the Year for 2020.

Carol's role at the Panton Hill Football Club includes organising the canteen on match day; coordinating Auskick; arranging committee meetings; being the club's secretary and planning club events.

Those who know Carol appreciate the role she plays in assisting the club to engage with the community. The club gets involved in the annual Panton On the Hill Festival, and it functions as a social hub that fosters healthy activity and exercise.

In 2019, Carol was named Volunteer of the Year by the Northern Football Netball League. In addition to Carol's football club commitments, she is also Diamond Valley College Council President; coordinates the running of the annual Hurstbridge Wattle Festival, and is involved with the Diamond Creek parish of St John's Anglican Church where she sits on the parish council.

At St Michael's Yarrambat, she is involved with worship and works with a team to coordinate school holiday programs for children.

Carol also sits on the board of the Bendigo Community Bank – Valley Community Financial Services, which runs the Hurstbridge, Diamond Creek, Eltham, Mernda/Doreen and Kinglake Community Bank branches. Carol chairs the marketing committee, working at a state and national level to deliver promotion for Bendigo Community Bank, which ensures more outcomes for local communities.

Community Group of the Year – Nillumbik Youth Productions



The 2020 Community Group of the Year is Nillumbik Youth Productions (NYP). NYP is a committee of young volunteers who provide a safe and accessible space for young people aged 10–28 to express themselves in the arts through its program Nillumbik Youth Theatre.

NYP is open to all youth who live, work or play in the Nillumbik area and provides a space for young people who may be struggling within their own school environment.

We congratulate our Australia Day Award winners and nominees, and our newest citizens.

The volunteer committee contributes at least four hours each week to NYP, which increases to 40 hours per week in the lead-up to and during its annual production.

In 2019, NYP staged its first production independent of Nillumbik Shire Council, and the dedicated young people involved formed their own committee. Without committee experience, they managed all aspects including financial (grant application and fundraising) and practical, including hiring staff, casting, rehearsing and staging the musical *All Shook Up*.

Also cause for celebration on Australia Day was welcoming 78 new citizens during our Citizenship Ceremony.

VIPs and guests were also treated to musical performances by Ben Clark, Edendale Community Environment Farm's 'singing barista' and star of the 2018 season of *The Voice*, as well as renditions of *Advance Australia Fair* and *I am Australian* by Robert Dugdale and the Diamond Valley Brass Band.

Guest speaker on the day was Hurstbridge author Sabi Buehler. Sabi has lived in Nillumbik for 50 years and has spent 44 of those years as a Hurstbridge resident. Sabi was Nillumbik U3A's first official member and the inaugural president. She and the

founding committee worked to ensure the group encompassed the whole shire.

Sabi is also on Council's Positive Ageing Advisory Committee, has sung with community choir Chocolate Lilies for 25 years, and is on the Edible Hub committee in Hurstbridge.

Sabi has authored two books: *A Life in Two Suitcases*, which chronicled the life of her mother, Gundel, during the Nazi regime; and a creative memoir called *Fighting Dragons all on my Own*. She also contributed a story to the anthology, *Nillumbik Tales*.



Waste and recycling update

Change for soft plastics

Soft plastics can no longer go in your recycling bin. Instead, we encourage you to recycle soft plastics through REDcycle drop-off points at Coles and Woolworths.

Soft plastics include any plastics that can be scrunched into a ball such as plastic bags, food wrappers, bubble wrap, silver-lined chip and cracker packets, and squeeze pouches with lid on (eg yoghurt and baby food).

E-waste drop off

A new drop-off point for small e-waste items has opened at Community Bank Stadium, 129-163 Main Hurstbridge Road, Diamond Creek. There are also drop-off points at Hurstbridge Hub, Eltham Library and Diamond Valley Library.

Residents can drop off small items such as batteries, light globes, mobile phones, remote controls and other e-waste items smaller than a laptop that can fit through an 8cm x 40cm slot.

Coming soon

From July, Council will provide extra bin options for residents including a weekly 120-litre landfill bin collection, a larger 140-litre landfill bin and a larger 240-litre green waste bin.

These are in addition to the current options of an extra green waste bin, landfill bin and recycling bin. More information will be available closer to their introduction.

Wild about gardening

How to attract wildlife into your garden

Residents wanting to encourage native wildlife into their gardens have the opportunity to join an exciting new Council and community program.

Nillumbik Gardens for Wildlife is a partnership between Council and the community to create habitat gardens for local wildlife.

The free program involves trained volunteer garden guides in teams of two visiting private gardens and providing encouragement and advice on increasing habitat and food sources for local wildlife.

Participants receive a report on their garden, a voucher for 20 free plants from one of our partnering nurseries, a sticker for their letterbox and resources for further information about wildlife gardening.

Community members were recently invited to vote on a logo for the program and the winner was the brush-tailed phascogale.

Brush-tailed phascogales are nocturnal marsupials with distinctive black bushy tails and large eyes for seeing in the dark. They are found in dry open forests of northeast Melbourne including Nillumbik, but their numbers are declining. They feed on insects and spiders and need tree hollows to hide and raise their young in.

Registrations for the Gardens for Wildlife program open in April. Numbers are strictly limited.

Plan gets green light

Following extensive community consultation, Council adopted the Green Wedge Management Plan (GWMP) on 26 November 2019.

The new plan provides direction for the management of the green wedge over the next decade. It includes a vision, principles, goals, objectives and key actions. Preparation of the plan was informed by extensive community engagement over the previous 18 months.

Council received 746 submissions in response to the draft GWMP. Council's Future Nillumbik Committee also heard 80 verbal submissions on 10 and 11 September 2019. The plan was further revised in response to the feedback received from the community.

Mayor Karen Egan said: "We appreciate your feedback and have listened to what you had to say."

Council made a commitment to review the 2010-2025 Nillumbik Green Wedge Management Plan when it was elected in 2016. Nillumbik's green wedge is one of 12 across Melbourne and covers 91 per cent of the Shire.

Now that the GWMP has been adopted, annual implementation plans will be prepared. Priorities will be determined every four years through the Council Plan and prior to the four-yearly review of the Nillumbik Planning Scheme.

Shooting goals for recreation

The redevelopment of the Diamond Valley Sports and Fitness Centre headlines a range of major infrastructure projects.

Four new basketball/netball courts will be part of the \$14.5 million upgrade to the Diamond Valley Sports and Fitness Centre.

Construction works on the Greensborough site are expected to start in the new financial year. The project is due to be completed in early 2022.

Diamond Creek will be a hive of activity in coming months with several major projects underway.

Mayor Karen Egan will soon turn the first sod on the much-anticipated Diamond Creek Regional Playspace. The restored Diamond Creek Rotary Tram, which was delivered in February, will operate as a community café. The playground equipment is expected to be delivered in autumn with completion anticipated mid-year.

Nearby, work is about to start on the Diamond Creek Netball Pavilion, while the Marngrook Oval Pavilion is finished and due to be officially opened soon. The Eltham North Pavilion was completed in late 2019.

Plans for the extension to the Diamond Creek Trail to Wattle Glen are tracking nicely with the scheduled completion of the trail and bridges this year. It will include a shared path for pedestrians and cyclists with recycled concrete as well as a separate horse trail.

In other parts of the Shire, works are due to start on the Greensborough Hockey Pavilion. Works are progressing on the second stage of the Eltham Central Pavilion (social rooms) and are expected to be finished mid year.

Shining a light on solar

Innovative farm proposal to offset carbon emissions

Council is leading the charge on climate action with a proposal for external parties to develop a solar farm on the former Plenty landfill site in Yan Yean Road.

The solar farm could provide up to 5MW of green electricity, capable of supplying all of Council's annual electrical power consumption requirements.

Mayor Karen Egan said: "Council is committed to being a leader in climate change action and supporting the renewable energy economy."

Council is now seeking to engage with the solar farm development market, including examining options such as battery storage, potential community investment opportunities and power purchasing agreements.

Big switch for sport

In great news for our sporting community, the lighting systems for both Yarrambat Memorial Park Oval and Eltham Tennis Court are set to be upgraded soon.

Yarrambat Park is the home ground of the Yarrambat Junior Football Club and the Plenty Valley Cricket Club, however, the existing lights at the oval did not provide sufficient light for junior AFL competitions.

A sports field LED lighting system has been designed and installed, which will reduce glare from the lights and allow clubs to train and play into the evenings.

An LED lighting system will also be installed on courts two, three and six at Eltham Tennis Club to accommodate use of the court in low-light or night time, and to comply with relevant regulations.

The Come Together Music & Arts Festival, at Edendale Community Environment Farm on Saturday 14 March, aims to raise awareness around suicide prevention, mental health and multiculturalism.

This free, family-friendly event offers a rare experience to connect residents and visitors with working farms, and the chance to meet local farmers and enjoy local produce.

For the first time, visitors will have the opportunity to spend the night in Nillumbik camping out under the stars in Hurstbridge before setting off on their farm adventure the next day.

Open Farm Day aims to foster a greater understanding of how food, wine and fibre products are grown and produced on Melbourne's fringe.

Nillumbik is home to a diverse mix of farms including fruit and veggie farms, livestock and animal farms, orchards and vineyards.

You can choose the farms you wish to visit and create your own trail of experiences, or follow one of the trails we have carefully put together.

Participating farms included Balashi Flowers, Edendale Community Environment Farm, Kings of Kangaroo Ground, Omaru Alpacas, Shaws Road Winery and Cider, Sugarloaf Produce, Weeping Grevillea Nursery, Yarra Valley Custom Meats, plus more.

Read all about it: library upgrade

The Diamond Valley Library is set to undergo a major \$850,000 upgrade. Council has received a \$500,000 grant from the State Government's Living Libraries Infrastructure Program for the project. Council will contribute \$270,000, with the library providing \$80,000.

Improvements to the library in Civic Drive, Greensborough, will include extending the children's area, introducing co-working spaces, adding a tech area, building a community meeting room with kitchen facilities and improvements to accessibility.

Mayor Karen Egan said the library was outdated and needed urgent upgrading.

"Our library is a vital, well-loved resource of our community. Since it was built, there have been significant global changes in how libraries are used, the use of technology, and our community's needs," Cr Egan said.



Yarra Plenty Regional Library CEO Jane Cowell said the upgrade was exciting news.

"We are one of the best library services in Victoria, delivering a wide variety of services, and we would love everyone in the Shire to join us and become a member," she said.

Mentors part of the family

Our dedicated volunteers can help with the challenges parents face

It's not easy raising kids, but for Louise Harper, looking after a young son and newborn twins while her firefighter husband was out on the job became not just a juggle, but a struggle.

Luckily help was at hand, with her Maternal and Child Health Centre suggesting teenage babysitter Melissa Sinclair could assist.

"She was a lifesaver," Louise recalls. "Mentally, it helped a lot and relieved a stressful situation."

Thirty years later, Louise and Melissa were reunited at a Christmas function for Nillumbik Shire Council's In-Home Family Mentoring Service.

Both women had become mentors with the service, offering advice and support to families. They are two of the Shire's many volunteers, whose generous contribution is being celebrated as part of National Volunteer Week from 18-24 May.

Louise says she was inspired to help other families because of the support she received as a young mum from Melissa.

Melissa, now a mum of five, has been a mentor for three years.

"It takes a village to raise a child. A lot of people don't have extra support for whatever reason," Melissa says.

The In-Home Family Mentoring (IHFM) Program is a free service for parents with babies or children under the age of six living in the Shire, who are experiencing challenges. Families are linked with a trained volunteer who visits once a week for two hours, for three to 12 months.

IHFM is recruiting new volunteers. If you think you can help, training will start in May.

A pet cause

Pet registration renewals are due by Thursday 9 April. Renewal forms were sent to Nillumbik pet owners in February – you can contact us on 9433 3111 if you haven't received your notice.

Registration fees contribute to animal management services including the pound, dog parks, and a free boarding service for pets of families experiencing family violence.

Registration is also vital in case your pet goes missing. Our Community Safety team aims to reunite lost pets with their owners within 24 hours if the pet is both microchipped and registered.

All cats and dogs over the age of three months must be microchipped and registered with Council.

Fight the flu

Don't get sick this winter. The annual flu vaccine will be available at Council immunisation sessions from May.

We provide the free government-funded flu vaccine for all children aged six months to under five, pregnant women and older members of the community. It is recommended people aged over 65 should see their doctor for medical advice prior to getting the vaccine.

Council also provides the flu vaccine to other members of the community at a cost of \$25 per dose, so the whole family can be immunised at the same time.

In exciting news, work will soon start on the extension of the Diamond Creek Trail from Diamond Creek to Wattle Glen. It will include a recycled concrete shared path for pedestrians and cyclists as well as a separate horse trail.

Part 2 of Amendment C117 to the Nillumbik Planning Scheme to rezone Lot 1, 44 Graysharps Road, Hurstbridge to Public Park and Recreation Zone is still under consideration. On October 29, Council resolved to request the Planning Minister to appoint a Planning Panel to consider this. The hearing was due to take place on 24 February and Council is awaiting its report and recommendations.

We have successfully concluded negotiations with Yarra Valley Water to now have access to a sewerage connection point for each property in the entire Eltham South area.

Council is liaising with YVW on their construction schedule which is anticipated to be completed in one to three years. YVW is undertaking the works.

Council has raised significant concerns with the Fitzsimons Lane/Main Road intersection project. The Planning Minister has taken control of the provisions in the Nillumbik Planning Scheme. The planning scheme now states that the upgrade of the intersection must be undertaken in accordance with the plans and documents approved by the Minister for Planning. This was recently gazetted. Council supports the upgrade of the intersection, subject to a more sensitive design respecting the Eltham Gateway.

The tram renovated by Diamond Creek Rotary was delivered to the Diamond Creek Regional Playspace in February, with playground equipment due to be installed in autumn. Marngrook Oval Pavilion is expected to officially open soon, and construction of the new Diamond Creek Netball Pavilion is due to start. Renewal projects on the go include an upgrade to the bowling club's kitchen.

Work is set to commence on extending the Diamond Creek Trail from Diamond Creek to Wattle Glen, and is due for completion later this year.

We're advocating for improvements to the Hurstbridge Line Upgrade Project Stage 2, including safe pedestrian crossings, upgrades to the Diamond Creek station and future removal of the Diamond Creek level crossing.

A 600m footpath will be built between Old Aqueduct Road and Old Diamond Creek Road by mid-year.

The last days of 2019 brought the national bushfire crisis to our front door, with a fire in Plenty Gorge threatening nearby homes, highlighting the need for everyone to have a fire plan and be prepared. Council provided assets to assist the CFA on the day and throughout the recovery effort, including a grader and two water tankers.

The Diamond Valley Library in Greensborough will undergo an \$850,000 upgrade, which will see new co-working spaces for micro businesses, an extension to the children’s area and a new community meeting room.

Works are planned to commence later in 2020 on the \$15 million Diamond Valley Sport and Fitness Centre redevelopment including four new basketball/netball courts.

The lighting and drainage upgrade at Yarrambat War Memorial Park has also recently been completed.

We are seeking offers from the market to possibly repurpose the landfill site in Plenty as a solar farm. This will be a tangible response from Nillumbik to climate change.

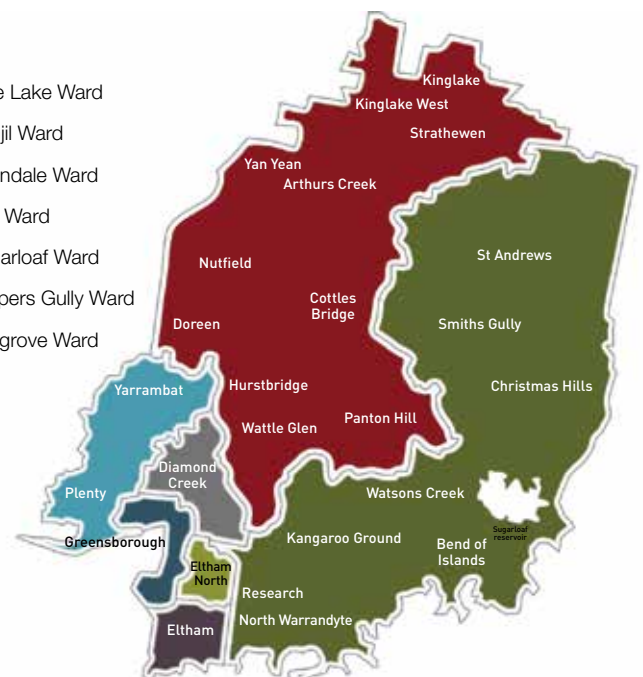
Some residents have raised concerns with Council around road access and overlays, and the potential difficulties in the event of a fire incident. We are taking these concerns seriously and looking into these instances.
